Deadwood's Days of '76 Wins 12th Straight PRCA Rodeo of the Year Award



That's an even dozen. Deadwood's Days of '76 Rodeo brought home its 12th consecutive PRCA Medium Rodeo of the Year award during the Professional Rodeo Cowboys Association's (PRCA) National Convention Wednesday night (Dec. 2), in Las Vegas. The rodeo, billed the "Best Rodeo. No Bull." Has won the award annually since 2004. Prior to that, it had won the PRCA Small Rodeo of the Year award four times, as well as the Badlands Circuit Rodeo of the year. 2016

will mark the 94th annual Days of '76 Rodeo in Historic Deadwood. The event, July 26-30, includes five days of rodeo action along with historic parades. Days of '76 Committee members, including 2015 Chairman Jim Mattson and 2016 Chairman Ron Burns, both of Deadwood, were on hand to accept the award. Nominated alongside the Days of '76 in the Medium Outdoor Rodeo category for 2015 were rodeos in Estes Park, Colorado; Lufkin, Texas; Sidney, Iowa; and Stephenville, Texas.

Ground Breaking Ceremony for the New Deadwood Welcome Center

Construction will begin with a Ground Breaking Ceremony on Monday, January 4, 2016, 4:00 p.m. at the Lower Main Street parking lot south end and the estimated completion date is May 2017. When complete, the facility will include interactive displays on Deadwood’s history as well as an information center, and house the Deadwood Chamber of Commerce.

During the construction of the Welcome Center, parking will be limited and may not be available at times in the Lower Main parking lot. You are encouraged to find alternative parking during the construction.



Changes in Snow Removal Ordinance

The Deadwood Public Works Department reminds you that sidewalks need to be cleared within 24 hours after the snow stops falling. If an owner of any building deliberately or intentionally places snow or ice on a public street or right of way in such a way as to obstruct the normal flow of vehicular or pedestrian traffic, the City Public Works Director may arrange for an independent contractor to remove the snow and ice. The city may also, at its discretion, remove the snow or ice if it deems such action appropriate. In either case, the city shall be entitled to a fifty-dollar (\$50.00) fee for the costs of arranging the removal plus the actual cost paid to the contractor or, in the event the removal is done by city employees, the sum of seventy one dollars and fifty cents (\$71.50) plus material per hour for each employee. Each day the owner fails to remove the snow and ice, after notice, the owner will be subject to a civil fine in an amount not to exceed one hundred dollars (\$100.00) per day for each separate violation.

Any individual or business that fails to remove snow and ice or arrange for removal of snow and ice within the period shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and subject to a maximum fine of five hundred dollars (\$500.00).

January is the Deadliest Month for Carbon Monoxide Poisoning

According to a [new study](#) by the federal Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, the first month of the year is the worst for carbon monoxide poisoning. At least two people die each day from carbon-monoxide poisoning in January—three times the fatality rate recorded in August and July. Unintentional carbon monoxide exposure accounted for 15,000 emergency room visits annually between 1999 and 2004, with an average of 439 people dying each year.

Fatalities were highest among men and senior citizens: Men because they are engaged in more high-risk behaviors such as working with fuel-burning tools or appliances and seniors because they are likely to mistake the symptoms of CO poisoning (headaches, nausea, dizziness or confusion) for the flu or fatigue. It should come as no surprise that CO deaths are the highest in winter (December is the second highest month). Cold weather increases the use of gas-powered furnaces as well as the use of risky alternative heating and power sources (portable generators, charcoal briquettes, propane stoves or grills) during power outages. It's also understandable that the highest CO death rates are in colder states: Nebraska, Wyoming, Alaska, Montana and North Dakota. By contrast, California has the lowest fatality rate.

With these sobering facts it's a good time to remember the following safety tips to prevent CO poisoning:

- Have your heating system, water heater and any other gas, oil or coal-burning appliance inspected and serviced by a qualified technician every year.
- Install battery-operated CO detectors on every level of your home.
- Don't use a generator, charcoal grill, camp stove or other gasoline or charcoal-burning device inside the home, basement or garage or outside the home near a window.
- Don't burn anything in an unvented stove or fireplace.
- Don't let a vehicle idle inside a garage attached to a house, even if the garage door is left open.
- Don't heat a house with a gas oven.

If a CO detector sounds, leave your home immediately and call 911 from outside. Seek prompt medical attention if you suspect CO poisoning and if you or someone in your household is feeling dizzy, light-headed or nauseated.
