ITEMS FROM CITIZENS ON AGENDA

Audit

Al Schaefer with South Dakota Dept. of Legislative Audit appeared to update Commission on the 2018 closing conference. He stated that there were no written findings. The report contained some oral comments, which were: annual report contained some classification and accrual type errors that were adjusted; transfers between BID Funds and General Fund, Parking and Transportation Fund and General Fund for administrative and other services but are not tied to a specific expenditure; and a policy has not been established by the Commission as to what procedures should be followed for the collection of unpaid parking fines and at what point they should be written off. The report contained some immaterial violations which were: Municipality incurred expenditures in excess of appropriations contrary to SDCL 9-21-25; the 2018 annual report was not filed with the Department of Legislative Audit by May 31, 2019 as required by SDCL 9-22-21; and annual salary publication did not list all the potential compensation employees could receive. Schaefer thanked Finance Office staff and department heads for their cooperation and assistance. Commission thanked Schaefer for his time.

TIF #11

Public hearing was opened at 5:24 p.m. by Mayor David Ruth Jr. Mayor stated project developers and Tobin Morris with Dougherty and Company are here to answer questions. Business Owner, Mike Trucano, spoke against the TIF. He believes this gives a competitive disadvantage to small businesses. Commissioner Todd questioned why this Grant TIF instead of a traditional TIF. Tobin Morris replied this type of TIF is more of a risk to the developer if the City does not appropriate annually, it will expire. Morris also stated if the city should not appropriate, it is classified as non-constitutional debt. Todd would like a guarantee that TIF will not go towards the City debt. City Attorney Riggins stated several emails have been exchanged and at this point the TIF will not go against the city debt. Todd stated his duties as a Commissioner are to protect the interest of residents and would like to be able to tell them what the City got out of a 3 million dollar TIF. Commissioner Martinisko believes the City will benefit from the TIF with updated curb and gutter, Wild Bill Statue upgrade, and archeological. Commissioners Johnson and Struble questions have been answered and support the TIF. Caleb Arceneaux stated Tin Lizzie's has put a lot of time and effort working with Historic Preservation to develop a façade on first floor and create a connection between what is now an empty parking lot between Mineral Palace and Tin Lizzie, and believes the connection will be is a benefit to the city. Historic Preservation Officer Kuchenbecker stated the National Programmatic Agreement was executed in August of this year with the U.S. Department of Agriculture – Rural Development, State Historic Preservation Office, Deadwood Historic Preservation and the developer. The agreement included a Historic Preservation Treatment Plan which outlined the archaeological investigation for the proposed development but did not address the ownership of the artifacts. Kuchenbecker also stated several City and Historic Preservation Commissions expressed their feelings if the TIF funds were going to be used to pay for the archaeological work then the ownership of the artifacts should be retained with the City and should be a separate agreement between the developer and the City. After discussion, hearing closed. Martinisko moved, Johnson seconded to approve request for TIF 11. Roll Call: Aye-Johnson. Martinisko, Struble, Ruth. Nay-Todd. Motion carried.

NEW BUSINESS

Project Plan

Martinisko moved, Johnson seconded to approve Project Plan for Tax Increment Finance District #11. Planning and Zoning recommended approval on September 4, 2019 with conditions of adding more details of proposed expenditures and questions on appropriate disbursements. Roll Call: Aye-Johnson, Martinisko, Struble, Ruth. Nay-Todd. Motion carried.

Agreement

Martinisko moved, Johnson seconded to allow Mayor to sign agreement for Development with Deadwood Hotels, LLC. Roll Call: Aye-Johnson, Martinisko, Struble, Ruth. Nay-Todd. Motion carried.

Resolution

Johnson moved, Struble seconded to approve Resolution 2019-31 to create Tax Increment Finance District #11. Roll Call: Aye-Johnson, Martinisko, Struble, Ruth. Nay-Todd. Motion carried. Resolution published September 20th in the Black Hills Pioneer.

Ordinances

Martinisko moved, Todd seconded to approve second reading of Ordinance #1299 Amending Title 17 – Zoning. Roll Call: Aye-All. Motion carried.

Finance Officer McKeown stated current fund balances (section two of ordinance) has been updated to reflect additional bill that will be paid in 2019. The transfers in/out line item was also updated, as directed by Legislative Audit. Martinisko moved, Struble seconded to approve seconded reading of 2020 Budget Appropriation Ordinance #1300. Roll Call: Aye-All. Motion carried.

Findings of Fact

Todd moved, Struble seconded to Act as Board of Adjustment and approve Findings of Fact for Conditional Use Permit for Tattoo Shop at 470 Main Street. Planning and Zoning Commission approved on September 4, 2019. Roll Call: Aye-All. Motion carried.

Public Works Director Nelson Jr. explained the plat. Martinisko moved, Struble seconded to approve to Act as Board of Adjustment and approve Final Plat of Railroad Avenue. Legal Description: Lots 10, 11 and 12 of the Meverden Addition; Formerly a part of Railroad Avenue and being a part of M.S. 81 and 283, City of Deadwood Lawrence County, South Dakota. Commissioner Struble thanked city staff for assistance with Deadwood Jam.

Commissioner Todd explained his concern about the TIF. He stated the total growth was \$31,000.00 as far as tax base from last year, and feels the major projects going on in the town that are not taxable will affect our school district. Todd encourages commission to start working on the tax basis in the future.

Commissioner Martinisko thanked the staff on the audit process and congratulated Finance Officer McKeown on her first audit with the City.

Attorney Riggins requested Executive Session for legal matters per SDCL 1-25-2(3), union negotiations per SDCL 1-25-2 (4), and personnel matter per SDCL 1-25-2(1) with possible action.
