All About Voles

Does your yard look like a racetrack after the snow melted? Blame the voles.

Voles, also known as field or meadow mice, have furry, stocky bodies with short legs and tails. There are 23 species in the United States but two of the greatest consequences to gardeners are the meadow and pine voles.

Meadow voles are about five and a half to seven and a half inches long and live mostly above ground, traveling in one to two inch wide runways in meadows, orchards and old fields. The trails are predominantly noticeable right after the snow has melted.





Pine voles reach the length of four to six inches and are subterranean rodents that create extensive networks of underground tunnels. Their typical habitat is the shrubby edge between woods and meadows.

Voles do not hibernate and are active day and night year round. They breed year round as well with a gestation period of only three weeks. Litters can yield up to nine offspring resulting in rapidly increasing populations.

Their immense appetite for vegetation garners the attention of gardeners. Voles feed on both the above ground and below ground parts of plants like grasses, seeds, fruit, roots, tubers, and bulbs. Fragments of sharp stone may be added to soil to deter some tunneling. The surest way to protect tulips, crocuses and other valuable bulbs is to plant them inside a wire mesh box made of hardware cloth.

Because voles avoid exposed areas, keep the grass mowed, remove weeds and pick up litter to reduce vole habitats.



Discovering Deadwood's Past

On May 15, 2020, construction crews working at Jacob's Brewhouse (79 Sherman Street) made an interesting discovery when drilling footing holes for a new outdoor patio. In one of the holes the auger cut through a buried utility.

The City of Deadwood Streets Department was called in to investigate. Based on their assessment, the utility consisted of copper wires incased in a lead sleeve that was then placed inside a clay pipe used as conduit.

After some research and consulting with a former telephone company employee, it was determined the utility was an early phone line, circa 1920 to 1930.

This discovery and the coordinated effort to retrieve the data is a good example how different municipal departments work



together to preserve Deadwood's rich and amazing past.

Curbside Services Now Available at the Deadwood Public Library!

Beginning May 18, 2020, books and DVDs can be put on hold by phone (578-2821) from 12:00 pm - 4:00 pm Monday through Friday or through our online catalog at deadwood.blackhills.bywatersolutions.com 24/7.

Search the catalog and when you find the item you are searching for click "Place Hold". Only items in the Deadwood Library collection are available for loan at this time.

To access your account, sign in with your library card number and password. You may also choose to email us your requests at deadwoodlibrary@outlook.com 24/7. One pick-up per day per patron is allowed.

Please provide the following information on phone calls or emails: name attached to your library card, best phone number where you can be reached, and title/author of the items requested.

Library staff will call or send you an email when the materials are ready for pick-up. You may then park in front of the library anytime between 1:00 pm - 4:00 pm, Monday through Friday. If you are on foot, please let us know, we will make arrangements for this too!

Upon arrival, call the library at 578-2821, let us know whose books you are picking up and what vehicle you are driving. Library staff will leave materials in front of your car (please allow the staff to re-enter the building before retrieving materials).
