A Message From the Public Works Department

As winter gets closer and closer, it is time to be reminded of Deadwood's snow removal policies and procedures. Please take the time to read the policies and procedures to be aware of the responsibilities of the landowners of Deadwood in regards to snow removal from sidewalks, parking during snow removal efforts, and the process the city takes to remove snow.

Sidewalks

Snow and ice permitted to gather upon the sidewalks of Deadwood is dangerous to the safety of its citizens and others using such sidewalks and is declared a public nuisance.

The record owner of any building or ground, within the city, fronting upon or adjoining a street where a sidewalk exists in front of or adjoining such premises shall clear or make arrangements to clear the sidewalk in front of or adjoining such buildings and ground to the width of the sidewalk within twenty-four (24) hours after snow or ice has fallen or formed. Where it is impossible to take the snow and ice from the sidewalk by reason of it being frozen to the sidewalk the record owner shall sprinkle or spread some suitable material upon the same to prevent the walk from becoming slippery and dangerous to travel.

If the record owner of any building or lot fails or neglects to remove snow and ice from the sidewalk adjoining the property within twenty-four (24) hours after the same has fallen or formed, or who deliberately or intentionally places snow or ice on a public street or right-of-way in such a way as to obstruct the normal flow of vehicular or pedestrian traffic, the city public works director or his or her designee may arrange for an independent contractor to remove the snow and ice. The city may also, at its discretion, remove the snow or ice if it deems such action appropriate. In either case, the city shall be entitled to a fifty-dollar (\$50.00) fee for the costs of arranging the removal plus the actual cost paid to the contractor or, in the event the removal is done by city employees, the sum of seventy-one dollars and fifty cents (\$71.50) plus material per hour for each employee. Such sums shall be recoverable by the same legal means as for the recovery of other nuisance abatements, including, but not limited to, direct billing of the property owner, assessment of the sum against the property itself, or by bringing an action against the property owner.

Parking for Snow Removal

The Public Works Department takes pride in the level of service it provides to the community during snow events throughout the winter. The efficiency and quality of the snow removal can be improved with the help of the community. We ask that during the winter months please look for posted snow removal signs in your neighborhood during and after snow events which will indicate when vehicles must be removed from the roadway for snow removal efforts. In addition to posting neighborhoods, the city utilizes a public notification service, Code Red. Please take a few minutes and enroll in Code Red to be notified of snow removal efforts. To enroll in Code Red a link has been provided on the City of Deadwood's website, stop by City Hall and ask about Code Red, or simply call City Hall and staff will assist you with your enrollment.

By City ordinance no vehicle shall be parked in such a manner as to interfere with snow removal by the city; and if parked on any street where the public works department is removing snow, the owner or person in charge of such motor vehicle shall move it at once upon request of the city. Vehicles interfering with snow removal will be towed at the owner's expense if not removed prior to posted and/or notified snow removal activities.

Snow Removal Policy

Your Public Works Department, during snow events, makes every effort to provide a level of service which allows for safe travel throughout the City of Deadwood and each snow event has many variables that affect the conditions of the roadways and our ability to provide the expected level of service. The amount of snow, the rate of accumulation, duration of the event, and temperature are just a few of the factors at play. The information provided here is intended to provide you with expected operations during and after snow events in the City of Deadwood.

PLANT PONDERINGS

For those of you removing Canada thistle from your property, MAJOR KUDOS!!! This invasive species is incredibly noxious. Here are a few fun facts about this nasty beast:

Canada thistle is a non-native, deep rooter perennial which spreads by seeds and aggressive creeping roots called rhizomes. It produces about 1,000 to 1,500 seeds **PER PLANT** and may be dispersed by wind. Seeds can survive in the soil for up to **20 years!**



Canada thistle can grow 2 to 4 feet in height. The leaves are oblong, spiny, bright green, and slightly hairy on the undersurface. Unlike other biennial thistles, which have a solitary flower at the end of each stem, Canada thistle flowers occur in small clusters of 1 to 5 flowers. The flowers are about 1 cm

in diameter, tubular shaped, and vary from white to purple in color. The key to controlling Canada thistle is to eliminate seed production and to reduce the plants nutrient reserves in its root system. Hand pulling can create root fragments and stimulate the growth of new plants. Source: Colorado Department of Agriculture



I have been working diligently, over the past three years, to reduce the number of plants on city property by flower/seed removal followed by hand pulling the remaining plant. This process has been working but one must follow up every year.

Proper disposal of the plant material is critical! The flowers, seeds and green material must be placed in a black garbage bag and placed in the trash. **DO NOT** put these in the yard waste dumpster or your personal compost. The yard waste dumpster material is chopped and composted for future use and the noxious, invasive Canada thistle can then be spread to non-suspecting folks.

A Message From the Public Works Department continued...

As a snow event begins and snow accumulations begin to impact travel by vehicles or pedestrians, crews will begin to keep travel paths and lanes open and sanded. Emergency snow routes will be maintained during large snow events; ALL roads will be maintained during non-emergency snow events. When snow accumulations are expected to stop, crews will begin snow removal in various parking lots across town to provide parking for residents as operations move to clearing roadways curb to curb. The order or process in which roadways are cleared will be determined by the Public Works Director and the Street Superintendent on a storm by storm basis and conditions may require crews to clear some streets more than one time before completing snow removal of the entire city.

Typically during snow events of four inches or more our crews will prepare for curb to curb snow removal and residents should look for snow removal signage in their neighborhoods. Neighborhoods are posted at least 24 hours prior to street cleaning and Deadwood offers parking in various parking lots to relocate your vehicles during snow removal efforts.



After a street has been cleared, NO snow can be pushed, plowed, blown, or shoveled into the street. Any vehicle not moved from an area posted for clearing prior to starting time will be ticketed AND towed at owner's expense. In addition, please refrain from adding snow to a cleared travel lane; while we understand sometimes there is no place to store snow when clearing private property, please refrain from adding snow to the roadway unless a snow removal effort is scheduled or in process.



Again, we encourage you to enroll in the City of Deadwood's Code Red Notification System to improve communication not only for snow removal but other emergency and non-emergency notifications. In advance, thank you for helping out in the upcoming snow removal effort.
