

## Mount Theodore Roosevelt Friendship Tower

On July 6, 2019 the US Forest Service, City of Deadwood, the Deadwood Historic Preservation Commission, Historic Lodge #07 of the AF&AM and the Northern Hills Trails Association are rededicating Mount Theodore Roosevelt, the first monument in the nation erected in the memory of the late US President. In recent years, the tower has taken on a new roll, symbolizing the twenty-seven year friendship between Bullock and Roosevelt. The idea for the Roosevelt Tower was conceived by Seth Bullock upon the death of Roosevelt in January of 1919. One month after his passing, Bullock presented his idea to the Society of Black Hills Pioneers during their annual meeting. Bullock's idea was approved and work on the tower began in April. Two months later, the tower, constructed of native Black Hills stone, was ready for the dedication. Despite an overcast day with intermittent rain, a parade of over 200 automobiles and countless people converged on Mount Theodore Roosevelt in the afternoon of July fourth for the dedication ceremony. During the ceremony, U.S. Colonel Leonard Wood, South Dakota Congressman Eben B. Martin, and South Dakota Governor Peter Norbeck delivered speeches on the significance of Roosevelt's life and his accomplishments. Though the Roosevelt family did not attend the dedication, Kermit Roosevelt sent a heartfelt letter dated July 4, 1919 thanking Bullock for contributing to the memory of his late father. Two months after the dedication, Bullock died in his home in Deadwood, South Dakota on September 23, 1919.

Throughout the 20th and 21st century, Mount Theodore Roosevelt and the Roosevelt Tower grew in popularity as a local and regional tourist attraction. In the 1960s, the Society of Black Hills Pioneers transferred ownership of the tower and grounds to the United States Forest Service. Society members, including Seth Bullock's grandson Kenneth Kellar, helped facilitate the transfer and began planning the rededication ceremony on July 4, 1968. In 2005 and 2012, the Deadwood Historic Preservation Commission and the US Forest Service worked on the restoration and interpretation of the tower. As part of the century celebration, the City Archives developed an eight part exhibit commemorating the friendship between Roosevelt and Bullock. This exhibit is on display at Mount Rushmore National Monument in Keystone, South Dakota this Summer. Today, Roosevelt Tower is a silent reminder of the friendship between two prominent men who helped shaped this nation and western South Dakota.
