Donation from the Black Hills Mining Museum

On Wednesday September 12, 2018 the Deadwood Historic Preservation Commission, during its regular scheduled meeting, formally accepted a substantial collection of archival materials from the Black Hills Mining Museum of Lead, South Dakota. The collection, in way of a donation, consists of a wide assortment of historic photographs, stationary, business receipts, promotional brochures, voter registration and school records pertaining to Deadwood. City staff and two city volunteers have begun the task of sorting, organizing, and transcribing portions of this amazing collection. Longtime city archives volunteer Judy Farris of Belle Fourche has entered over 2,800 names from the 1934 to 1954 poll books as part of special school elections. The names listed in the poll books act as a mini census of men and women who once lived in Deadwood. Another amazing find was a folder containing photographs from the 1924 Days of 76 Parade and Pageant. 2024 marks the 100th anniversary of the Days celebration, and these photographs will be invaluable in commemorating the Days celebration.

Over the next year, city archival staff will continue to process the collection and post portions on the Deadwood Historic Preservation Facebook page. City staff encourages the general public to check out its Facebook page at <https://www.facebook.com/deadwoodhistoricpreservation/>

Winterizing Reminders

Before we know it cold weather and snow will be here. The City would like to remind residents and property owners that by winterizing you are being proactive in protecting your property. Here are a few helpful tips:

- Detach outdoor hoses from faucets and insulate pipes or faucets in unheated areas
- Seal off access doors, air vents and cracks; cover unused windows to prevent drafts
- Vacant properties - keep the property heated or shut off the master water valve and then drain the pipes to keep them from freezing
- Have your sprinkler systems blown out
- Change the furnace filter
- Clean your fireplace
- Clean your gutters
- Install draft guards to keep heat from escaping under doors

City of Deadwood Warning Sirens

The intent of the outdoor warning system is to warn the public of imminent life threatening danger. It is not meant to be used as a sole warning device but to alert the public to seek more information, through the National Weather Service, your local radio and television reports, or weather radios. Deadwood will also use Code Red for emergency and non-emergency notification. Sirens are not designed to be audible inside structures.

Emergency Services work with the National Weather Service to utilize their network for issuing warnings for life threatening incidents like large fires, hazmat incidents, civil unrest incidents and other life threatening incidents. If necessary, the sirens will be activated. Siren will sound one continuous blast for two to three minutes minimum. This may be repeated as necessary to get warning out. NOT all signals will be activated.

Deadwood's sirens will not be activated for all weather conditions, only if there is potential life threatening conditions such as those listed below.

- If winds are predicted to be more than 80 mph
- If hail is predicted to be greater than 1.5 inches in diameter
- If a tornado has been visibly confirmed by a weather spotter
- Weather Watches will NOT activate sirens.
 - * A Weather Watch is issued when there is a potential for significant weather and recommends you monitor the conditions and prepare for a Weather Warning that may follow.
 - * A Weather Warning is when significant weather is occurring or imminent.



Sirens tests will be conducted on Wednesdays between 11:30 a.m. and 12:30 p.m., which will consist of an activation of less than 2 minutes.

National Weather Service will send notifications to all local News outlets (TV, Radio and newspapers). You can purchase weather radios that will receive the notifications the same time the news outlets receive them. There are also free apps for your cell phones that can receive the notifications as well.

Many of the notifications issued through National Weather service and Deadwood Code Red are not life threatening but may be important to you.

CODE RED has two options for receiving notifications, EMERGENCY or GENERAL which can be set on your phones.

- EMERGENCY mode you will receive only potential life threatening announcements.
- GENERAL MODE you will receive all announcements to include garbage pick-up changes, snow removal, water shut off for repair and road closures.
