Historic Preservation Check Presentation



The Deadwood Historic Preservation Commission presented a \$10,000 check and plaque to the Pierre/Fort Pierre Historic Preservation Commission on Wednesday, January 17, 2018 at Fort Pierre Chouteau, a 34-acre site on the northern edge of Fort Pierre. Keeping Historic West River Trails Alive

Deadwood Historic Preservation was recognized at the State Capitol on Thursday, January 18, 2018 by the South Dakota Hall of Fame during the Acts of Excellence Celebration for their part in Roy and Edith Norman restoration of trail signs project.

Early settlers traveling through South Dakota from the Missouri River west to the Black Hills followed one or another of several old trails, such as the Fort Pierre to Deadwood Trail. River boats and railroad trains brought travelers and freight to Fort Pierre. From there, the journey continued by ox-drawn wagon train, by saddlehorse or on foot across the plains. In the 1970s, a Stanley County ranch couple determined that the old trails should not be lost to history. Roy and Edith Norman created signs that marked the various trails taken by Indian tribes, military units and west-bound settlers. The Normans, now deceased, studied surveyors' maps from the 1800s to locate the trails that crisscrossed the west-river country. They researched the paths, and Roy created signs by burning letters into pine boards. He recorded the location of each sign on a home-made map. In recent years, a project has been

underway to refurbish those signs, which are much the worse for wear after 40 years of South Dakota snow, rain, hail, sun and wind. The Second Century Development Corporation of Midland, S.D., received a grant from Deadwood Historic Preservation to restore the old signs, and Lynn Briggs has been directing the project to recreate the nearly 400 signs the Normans originally placed along the trails. "This is something that shouldn't be lost," Briggs says. The signs help keep history alive for any traveler willing to leave the main highways and follow the trail signs down section lines and over fields and pastures.

February 8: Preservation Thursday: Calvin Coolidge in the Black Hills - On August 2, 1927, President Calvin Coolidge shocked the nation by announcing he would not seek reelection. The declaration came from the Black Hills of South Dakota, where Coolidge was vacationing to escape the oppressive Washington summer and to win over politically rebellious farmers. He passed his time at rodeos, fishing, meeting Native American dignitaries, and kick-starting the stagnant carving of Mount Rushmore. But scandal was never far away as Coolidge dismissed a Secret Service man in a fit of anger. Was it this internal conflict that led Coolidge to make his famous announcement or the magic of the Black Hills? Veteran South Dakota journalist Seth Tupper chronicles Coolidge's Black Hills adventure and explores the lasting legacy of the presidential summer on the region. 

Interpretive Panels



In 2017, the South Dakota Department of Transportation partnered with the Deadwood Historic Preservation Commission to create six (6) new outdoor interpretive panels to be placed near the junction of US Highways 85 and 385. As part of the state highway renovation project, state and city officials incorporated a small "pocket park" adjacent to the Mickelson Trail with off-street parking, public restroom, drinking water for the trail and interpretive signs focusing on historic Pluma.

These six signs provide insight into the Pluma area and focus on the Belt Cities Power & Light Company, 1908-1909 Whitewood Creek Floods, Cheyenne & Deadwood Stage Route, brief overview of Pluma, Lawrence County and the Good Roads Movement, and the Mickelson Trail. Several of the historic images included on these panels originated from the Black Hills Mining Museum in Lead, the Lawrence County Courthouse and Annex Building, the Centennial Archives, Deadwood Public Library and the City of Deadwood Archives. The signs are scheduled for installation in the spring of 2018.
