Deadwood's CodeRED Notification System

The City of Deadwood uses CodeRED, a high-speed mass notification system, to keep residents informed. The system delivers general and emergency massages to residents via phone, text message and email.

General messages are used to communicate non-life safety matters such as community events, planned road closures, water main repairs and power service interruptions.

Emergency messages notify residents of emergencies such as an evacuation notice, utility outages, fire, floods, severe weather or other emergency situations.

Residents who have not yet registered to receive these free alerts can register by

going to the City of Deadwood website, cityofdeadwood.com, then click the CodeRED Signup button at the top. If you do not have access to the internet you may register at the library or call 605-578-2082 and City Staff can register you over the phone. There is also a free CodeRED Mobile app for your smartphone available at iTunes or Google Play.

City of Deadwood's Newest Donation



In January of 2018, longtime Deadwood resident William "Bill" Beshera of Rapid City donated to the City of Deadwood the Eureka Safe & Lock Company safe. Across the face of this beautify safe is painted the name *"Frank S. Peck"*. According to a records search performed staff at the Kenton County Public Library in Covington, Kentucky, the Eureka Safe & Lock Company originated in Cincinnati, Ohio and moved to Covington, Kentucky after 1895. Based on business directories, this company manufactured the donated safe sometime between 1895 and 1897. After 1897, there were several lawsuits brought against the Eureka Safe & Lock Company. It is unknown how and when this safe made its way to Deadwood before being acquired by civil engineer, Frank S. Peck. The safe is on display at Deadwood City Hall.

Frank S. Peck was born on December 19, 1861 in Nodaway, Missouri before moving with his family to the Black Hills in 1878. Peck received a formal education in civil engineering while working with his father on numerous projects throughout western South Dakota including subdividing government townships in Fall River County and mapping the northern state line for the newly formed South Dakota.

With the advent of the automobile in the Black Hills, Peck became instrumental in surveying roads throughout Lawrence County. In 1917, South Dakota Governor Peter Norbeck, State Engineer Homer M. Derr, and Deadwood resident and Lawrence County Highway Engineer Frank S. Peck formed the South Dakota Highway Department. Under this newly created state agency, all road and bridge construction along state highways became standardized. During his tenure, Peck became one of the foremost authorities on road construction in South Dakota. His success and life were cut short on September 6, 1926.



On September 6, 1926, an attempt on Peck's life occurred in the early morning hours. An air pump containing a stick of dynamite was placed beside Peck's Studebaker on Charles Street. Upon detonation, Peck was severely injured from the explosion. Three days later, Peck died at the St. Joseph's hospital in Deadwood resulting from the injuries inflicted by the explosion. A full criminal investigation was conducted to bring Peck's perpetrator to justice. After exhausting all potential leads, no one was convicted of Peck's murder. Today, Peck's untimely death has become one of Deadwood's unsolved murder cases.

Winter Reminder

The Deadwood Public Works Department reminds you cars need to be removed from the street during snow removal. The streets will be posted one day in advance. If your car is not removed prior to snow removal it will be ticketed and towed. Sidewalks need to be cleared within 24 hours after the snow stops falling. Failure to clear your sidewalk will result in it being completed by the City. A fee of \$71.50 per man hour will be charged if the City is required to clear the sidewalk. Snow should not be shoveled or blown into the street after the street has been cleaned. Thank you for your cooperation.

Passport Parking

The City of Deadwood offers a mobile payment parking service called Passport Parking. Passport Parking works for all of Deadwood's on and off street parking. This service allows you to pay for parking right from your phone instead of feeding quarters into the parking meter. Passport Parking will also notify you, via text message or phone call, before your parking time is up and gives you the ability to extend your parking time without having to

return to the parking meter. There are three ways to register and use Passport Parking; online at m.ppprk.com, download the Passport Parking app from the App Store or Google Play, or by calling 605-231-4063. The parking meter will not show time remaining and customers will not have to display proof of payment, enforcement officers are able to view payments on handheld devices.


