Wildland Fire Awareness Month

Mayor Turbiville has proclaimed May as Wildland Fire Awareness Month. This month is an important opportunity for Deadwood to reduce the risk of wildfire, increase firefighter safety, and enhance public safety and awareness through education of fire safety, preparation, and prevention.



The City of Deadwood is currently working with consultants from the Community Planning Assistance for Wildfire (CPAW) program to help our community identify the risks Deadwood has for wildfires. The CPAW team recently met with members of the Comprehensive Plan Committee, Deadwood Fire Department and Lawrence County Planning Department to conduct a goal setting exercise. From this exercise CPAW will identify and make recommendations on local planning measures and improvements to policies to include in our Comprehensive Plan.

As residents there are many ways you can help prevent wildfires. One way is to follow the rules when burning a burn pile in your yard. Before burning you must obtain a Burn Permit from the Fire Department. This permit is free but does require a site visit from the Fire Department. They also ask that residents enroll in the CodeRed program so they can be notified of burn bans. For questions or to obtain a Burn Permit please call the Deadwood Fire Department at 578-1212.

"Only you can prevent forest fires"

The next time you are driving up US Highway 14A and pass the Deadwood Volunteer Fire Department slow down and take a look at the new "Smokey the Bear" sign, compliments of Tim Peterson and Flat Earth Art Company of Spearfish. In August of 2017, the Deadwood Volunteer Fire Department was looking to replace its Smokey the Bear fire danger sign. "Smokey the Bear" has become a national trademark synonymous with wildfire awareness and prevention across America. The installation of the new "Smokey" sign came at a perfect time, since May is National Wildfire Awareness month.



Beside the "Smokey" sign is Deadwood's fire danger sign. This sign acts as an informational tool designed to update the public about the risk of wildfire within Lawrence County and the northern Black Hills. The sign is divided into five different levels, (low, moderate, high, very high and extreme) based on the National

Fire Danger Rating System (NFDRS). Each level on the fire danger sign factors in the local temperature, humidity, moisture, weather conditions and combustibility of materials found within the forest and designates the appropriate level. The fire danger sign is updated on a daily basis by city staff working at the fire station. Deadwood Animal Control Officers have been receiving complaints in reference to the removal of pet excrement in the area of Mickelson Trail near Claim Jumpers Trailer Park. The City of Deadwood would like to remind everyone that you have a responsibility to clean up any excrement left by your dog/cat. Those who do not abide by the Ordinance can be cited into court. Deadwood City Ordinance states as follows:



6.08.050 Removal of pet excrement.

It is unlawful for any person who owns, possesses, harbors or is in charge of any dog or cat to not immediately remove excrement deposited by the animal upon a common thoroughfare, street, sidewalk, play area, park or upon any other public property.



A Community Gathering Space - Bringing Back a Piece of History

Historic Deadwood had community gathering spaces in our early days with one located near the intersection of Sherman and Lee Streets, (today known as the Gallows). This public space was a bandstand which was constructed in 1891. The community gathered space was used for celebrations, fairs, dances and other events for twenty-one years until the initiation of Deadwoods first Community Park in 1912 on Sherman Street today known as Gordon Park. A broad-based community effort is working on the development of new public gather spaces within our community again and to bring this historic part of Deadwood back to life.



Deadwood is challenged with a variety of issues; the most critical is a loss of community. In 2017 the Revitalization Committee along with the Deadwood Historic Preservation Commission adopted the Main Street Approach to revitalization and reorganized as the Main Street Initiative. This initiative has determined, to be successful, Deadwood must create a community where families want to live, work and play. This includes building a locality that supports a robust

business district; creates public gathering places for the local residents and visitors within the historic district; and strengthens the performing arts, history, entertainment and recreation while acknowledging the need to create an environment so individuals once again call Deadwood home.

The Main Street Initiative has come up with a plan for a community gathering place located across from the Franklin Hotel, also known as the old city hall site. This space will celebrate the atmosphere and environment of Deadwood Gulch. The largest feature is multiuse greenspace, surfaced with grass or turf for convertibility and maintenance. This multi-use open space is designed for both unstructured use and for gatherings related to a small stage at its edge for performances and activities. In the off season, this space might be converted for ice skating or other winter activities.

Preliminary designs have been drawn up for this area. The Historic Preservation Commission and the Main Street Initiative Committee has held three public meetings to review and receive comment from the public on the design. February 28, 2018 was the initial plan review, the second meeting was March 28, 2018 and the third meeting was April 11, 2018. As you can see from the preliminary plan a bandstand or gazebo will be constructed similar to the one which once proudly stood in Deadwood and entertained the community for many years.

As part of the traffic pattern, Deadwood Street would be shifted to align with Shine Street which fixes major pedestrian and vehicular problems on Main Street. The area could be designed to create shared space by eliminating all or part of the curb. This could extend the open space of the park into the street for large gatherings with restrooms available to the public.

The Historic Preservation Commission and the Main Street Initiative Committee are bringing a part of Deadwood history back to life. They envision families and guests gathered by the gazebo for movies, educational events, winter and holiday festivals, traditional craft demonstrations such as blacksmithing, quilting and more.
