History of Labor Day

The first Labor Day was celebrated in New York City on Tuesday, September 5, 1882 by the Central Labor Union. In 1884, the Central Labor union urged similar organizations to hold a "workingmen's holiday" on the first Monday in September. The idea spread with the growth of labor organizations and in 1885 Labor Day was celebrated in many industrial centers in the country. Then from 1887 through the end of the decade several states passed legislation recognizing Labor Day as a holiday, including Oregon, Colorado, Massachusetts, New Jersey, New York, Connecticut, Nebraska, and Pennsylvania.




Illustration from the first Labor Day Parade, New York City, Sept., 1882

In the late 1800s, at the height of the Industrial Revolution the average American worked 12 hour days, seven days a week just to eke out a basic living. Many worked in unsafe conditions. During this time labor unions grew more prominent and vocal. They began strikes and rallies protesting poor conditions and to compel employers to renegotiate hours and pay. Many of these events turned violent.

In Chicago, May 11, 1894, Pullman Place Car employees went on strike. A few months later in June, the American Railroad Union boycotted all Pullman Railway cars, crippling railroad traffic nationwide. The federal government sent troops to Chicago to break the strike. This unleashed a wave of riots resulting in the death of more than a dozen workers. One thing the labor organizations were united in asking for was the observance of the Labor Day holiday be uniform so workers could enjoy vacation privileges on the same day. Senator James Henderson Kyle of South Dakota introduced S. 730 to congress to make Labor Day a national holiday. President Grover Cleveland signed the bill on June 28, 1894.

Over a century later we still celebrate Labor Day on the first Monday in September. Labor Day is a yearly national tribute to the contributions workers have made to the strength, prosperity, and well-being of our country. It also represents the end of summer and we celebrate with a day off of work, picnics, barbecues and parades.
