Deadwood Volunteer Fire Department Receives First Dedicated Rescue Truck



In July 2016, the Deadwood Volunteer Fire Department took delivery of their first Light Duty Rescue Truck from Heiman Fire/Rosenbauer of America. Although Rescue duties are not new to the Department, a truck dedicated to rescue is. The new Rescue replaces a 1988 Engine which was a first out Pumper that was retired to a back-up Pumper/Rescue truck.

The Rescue carries rope rescue equipment, cribbing and struts, hand tools, air lifting bags, a full range of cordless powered cutting saws and drills, com-a-longs and chains, first aid supplies, backboards, stokes basket, and heavy hydraulic rescue tool to include cutters, spreaders and rams (jaws of life).

The truck features an on-board generator which powers the

hydraulic pump for the heavy rescue tools and provides lighting for the scene through a remote controlled light tower mounted on the roof. Firefighters are able to start the generator from the cab, thus allowing the light tower and heavy rescue tools to be put to work as soon as they arrive on the scene. A 9000-pound winch is available to firefighters that will operate from all four sides of the Rescue Truck. The Rescue Truck also has a small high pressure pump with foam

capabilities for car fires, just enough to protect firefighters during an extrication.

The Rescue Truck contains a three person crew compartment equipped with breathing apparatus. Prior to the arrival of the accident, first responders can don this equipment and be ready to work, saving precious time and providing better service to our communities.

The Rescue Truck was sold by Heiman Fire Equipment from Sioux Falls, S.D. and built by Rosenbauer of America from Lyons, S.D. The Ford F550 chassis was purchased from State bid and then the rescue/crew body built and mounted on chassis.




