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#### SOUTH DAKOTA PUBLIC PRODCASTING PRESENTS PREVIEW SCREENING OF LOCAL DOCUMENTARY "DEADWOOD PIONEER: A FACE FROM THE PAST"

The public is invited to a special preview screening of SDPB's latest documentary project, <u>Deadwood Pioneer: A Face from the Past</u>. The free screening will be held Tuesday, May 16, at 7pm at the Deadwood Mountain Grand in Deadwood, SD. A panel discussion and Q&A follows. The evening includes music provided by The Center of the Nation Brass Quintet.

In the five years since skeletal remains were uncovered in Deadwood's Presidential Neighborhood, historians and scientists have worked avidly to compile a social and genetic background on the individual unearthed during a home construction project.

Deadwood Pioneer: A Face from the Past chronicles the work of the archeologists, historians, and forensic experts who have pieced together the short life of a man whose skeletal remains were unearthed near what is now the intersection of Jackson and Taylor streets. The remains were left behind when the original cemetery was relocated to the hills above Deadwood in 1878. The remains were reinterred at Deadwood's Mount Moriah Cemetery in a 2016 ceremony.

A fascinating blend of science and history, <u>Deadwood Pioneer: A Face</u> <u>from the Past</u> reveals the likely history and ancestry of a young pioneer and puts a face on Deadwood's hardscrabble beginnings. Deadwood Pioneer: A Face from the Past premieres on SDPB TV on Monday, May 22 at 8pm (9 CT).

## **Historic Preservation Archives Moment: Solder Dots**



Over the past few years, the Maryland Archaeological Conservation (MAC) Laboratory has steadily built a partnership with the City of Deadwood while conserving a variety of historic artifacts from their archaeological collections. In September of 2016, the City of Deadwood sent three metal solder dot cans with paper labels to the MAC Laboratory for conservation treatment. The cans were discovered beneath the Fountain House in March of 2015 at the time the house was being moved and relocated. The cans had a corroded, rusty metal surface and dirt partially obscured the fragmentary and delicate paper labels that were still attached. The artifacts presented a unique conservation challenge, as the paper and metal

required a different approach to stabilize and clean the materials. Last week, a presentation was given at the Middle Atlantic Archaeology Conference in Virginia about the conservation treatment of the solder dot cans. The presentation discussed the unusual experience of using paper and metal conservation techniques in the same artifact and showed the step-by-step process used to carefully remove the paper labels from the cans so that each material could be stabilized and

cleaned separately. The conservation treatment is still ongoing; the paper labels have been stabilized by adhering a thin Japanese tissue to the back and the cans are still in a desalination solution to remove the harmful salts present in the metal. By the end of the treatment, the paper and metal will be clean and the labels will be reattached to the cans. My thanks to the City of Deadwood for the opportunity to share and present this information at the conference.

Swimming is the most popular summer activity. While the best thing you can do to help your family stay safe is to enroll in age-appropriate swim lessons, it is also important to follow these water safety tips whenever you are in, on or around water:

- $\cdot\,$  Swim in designated areas supervised by lifeguards.
- $\cdot\,$  Always swim with a buddy
- $\cdot\,$  Never leave a young child unattended near water
- Have young children or inexperienced swimmers wear U.S.
   Coast Guard-approved life jackets around water, but do not rely
- on life jackets alone.
  Establish water safety rules for your family and enforce them without fail.

 $\cdot\,$  If you go boating, wear a life jacket! Most boating fatalities occur from drowning.

 Avoid alcohol use. Alcohol impairs judgment, balance and coordination; affects swimming and diving skills; and reduces the body's ability to stay warm.

# Deadwood Volunteer Fire Department - From Ken's Desk

Recent events have raised some questions on smoke detectors: How many? Placement? Type? Special features?

### How Many?

National Fire Protection recommends that smoke detectors be installed:

- In all sleeping areas
- Outside of all sleeping areas, within 21' of any door to a sleeping room
- On every level of the residence including the basement
- In living areas

### **Types of detectors?**

Two Basic types - Ionization and Photoelectric

- **Ionization Smoke Alarms** are best at detecting the small partials of fast, flaming fires, but tested poorly for detecting smoky, smoldering fires. Ionization detectors are prone to false alarms from burnt food and steam, so do not install near bathrooms or kitchens. Standard ionization alarms have been found to react much slower, if at all, at elevations above 3,500 feet. They are less expensive to purchase.
- Photoelectric Smoke Alarms are best at detecting large particles typical of smoky, smoldering fires, but poor at detecting fast, flaming fires. They are less prone to false alarms from steam and burnt food, so these are recommended for kitchen and bathroom areas.
- Dual-Sensor Smoke Alarms combine ionization and photoelectric technology to detect fast, flaming fires and slow smoldering, smoky fires. Generally one of the sensors is more sensitive than the other and consumers do not know if the ionization or the photo-electric.

#### Features to Consider

- **Power source:** hardwired require an electrical professional to install. Battery only alarms are simple to install and they work when power fails, but need batteries changed on a regular basis unless they are new ten-year lithium batteries that last the life of the detector. Plug-ins are available, but generally do not allow proper placement.
- **Battery back-up:** A battery back-up for hardwired smoke alarms offers security if power fails, as long as the batteries are working. Battery operated have a warning that batteries are getting low and need serviced
- **Interconnectability:** You can link all smoke detectors so that if one sounds they all sound. Hardwired homes are generally wired for interconnectability. In home without wiring alarms can be purchased that are wireless interconnected.
- **Hush Buttons:** Most detectors have a hush/test button that will silence a nuisance smoke alarm without disabling the alarm.

#### Special Types alarms

- Strobe lights alarms: Some smoke alarms have integral strobe lights and some have add-on strobes lights for the hearing impaired.
- Voice alarms; many pre-teenagers who slept through a tone alarm awoke to a pre-recorded message from loved ones.
- Safety lights: some alarms are equipped with a light that lights the exit path for help in exiting.

Now you can go home and decide if you have the adequate fire protection for your family within your residence. Next time we will visit proper placement and maintenance of smoke detectors, but if you have any questions feel free to contact Ken at the Fire Hall, 578-1212. Remember to check the batteries on your detector at least 2 times a year and test your detector once a month.
