# Join us for the Grand Opening of the new Deadwood Welcome Center 501 Main Street, Deadwood at High Noon, Thursday, June 15, 2017

Please join the City of Deadwood, Deadwood Chamber of Commerce, and South Dakota's Lieutenant Governor Matt Michels in the Grand Opening and Dedication of the brand new Deadwood Welcome Center, located at 501 Main Street in Deadwood (Lower Main Street parking


Ground was broke on this structure on January 4, 2016. It was a 3-year planning process leading up

to that date. The new Welcome Center is 9,246 square foot, which includes more than 2,200 square feet of exhibit and display space; 2,100 square feet of 24-hour space including information areas and public restrooms, and an indoor trolley waiting area and transit turnaround area.

The facility also houses the Deadwood Chamber of Commerce & Visitor's

Bureau. A portion of the project also included improved access to Whitewood Creek, which runs adjacent to the Welcome Center.

The Dedication will begin at noon and will include remarks by Deadwood Mayor Chuck Turbiville and Lt. Governor Matt Michels, a building blessing and stone placement by the Masonic Deadwood Lodge #7 and a ribbon cutting. For more information, contact the Deadwood Chamber at 578-1876.

# Masons to Dedicate Celestial Lodge Marker and Interpretive Panel At Deadwood's Mt. Moriah Cemetery

You are cordially invited to attend the installation ceremony of the Masonic Celestial Lodge marker and interpretive panel at Mt. Moriah Cemetery by the Grand Lodge of South Dakota on Wednesday June 7th, 2017 at 5:00 PM at the Deadwood Masonic Temple, 715 Main Street.

We will take the Deadwood Trolley up to the Celestial Lodge for the ceremony and return to the Masonic Temple for a reception afterward.

The Deadwood Masonic Lodge formed in 1877. In 1878, Lawrence County purchased land for the development of a cemetery, naming it Mt. Moriah Cemetery. The cemetery's name and the street



names David, Darius, Boaz, Jachin, Solomon, Jabez and Hiram have direct connections to Mount Moriah in Jerusalem and the history surrounding King Solomon's Temple. The Deadwood Masons purchased 1.5 acres in 1887, which would become known as section 10. This section is indicative of a masonic lodge layout consisting of a large oval on an east/west axis.

In 1914, the Deadwood Masonic Lodge embarked on a beautification project including sidewalks, low walls, and a granite altar. Deadwood Granite and Marble Works who designed and installed the original 1914 altar, is designing and installing the granite marker. This embodies the physical representation of a Masonic Celestial Lodge. Masons know of very few Masonic Celestial Lodges in existence today in the United States.

The Masons are the world's largest and oldest fraternal organization, celebrating their Tercentennial this year.

## Deadwood Volunteer Fire Department - From Ken's Desk

Smoke alarms have played a key role in reducing deaths resulting in home fires; however, like any warning device, if they are not properly located, installed, and maintained the alarm can fail. Last month we informed our citizens about the requirements, types, and amount of residential smoke detectors needed to protect a typical home. This month we will cover the needed number, placement and maintenance of smoke detectors. Proper placement and maintenance of detectors reduce false alarms and add to the efficiency of the detector.

#### Placement:

- **Bedrooms:** detectors should be installed in each bedroom on the ceiling or on the wall 4" to 12" from the ceiling. If detector is equipped with a light it should be placed above the path of escape when ceiling mounted or wall mounted to light up escape way exit.
- Hallway: centrally located near the sleeping area on the ceiling or on the wall less than 12" from the ceiling, but not closer than 4"to the ceiling.
- **Kitchen:** mounted ceiling or wall at least 20' from cooking stove.
- Bathroom: ceiling or wall mounted at least 10' from shower/bath or sauna.
- All other general areas: centrally located in the area that you wish to cover, general ceiling mounted, but can be wall mounted.

### Areas that should be avoided if possible:

- Within 20' of combustible heat sources such as hot water heater, stoves, and space heaters.
- Air flow patterns near the kitchen.
- Very damp, humid or steamy areas. At least 10' away from dishwashers, showers and saunas.
- Location that has temperatures below 40 degrees F or above 100 degrees F on a regular basis
- Dusty, dirty, and greasy areas need to be avoided.
- Near fresh air vents, ceiling fans, or very drafty areas.
- In insect infested areas, as insects will clog detector.
- Within 12" of fluorescent fixtures.
- Dead air spaces, as smoke may never reach detector.

#### Maintenance:

- Test weekly... Pressing and holding the test/silent button until the alarm sounds. If it doesn't sound check power source and retest, if it still doesn't sound replace as soon as possible. If testing detectors that are interconnected make sure that all are tested and that all alarms sound.
- Clean Monthly... Gently vacuum the outside with a soft brush. Never use water or cleaning solvents or chemicals. Retest after each cleaning.
- If detector becomes contaminated and uncleanable, replace immediately to reduce false alarms.
- When batteries become weak a chirping sound will be heard, signaling that batteries need to be changed. Chirping will be spaced about one minute apart and can last up to seven days if batteries are not changed.
- Painted detectors adversely affect the operation of the alarm and should be replaced.
- Smoke detectors have a service life of ten years and should be replaced every ten years. (If in doubt change it out)

#### Limitations:

- Alarms may not awaken all individuals. Practice home escape drills at least twice a year and make sure everyone is involved from the kids to the grandparents. If alarms
  are found not to wake everyone, make adjustments like moving the detector closer to those sleeping through alarms, varying the type detector to a voice command and/or
  lights, or even different pitched horn.
- · Alarms cannot work if their power supply is not working. If there are missing batteries or if commercial power is turned off, the smoke alarms will not work.
- Alarms cannot sound if smoke does not reach them due to a closed door; therefore, a detector is required on each side of a bedroom door. Smoke inside walls, chimneys, roofs and crawl spaces are a few examples where smoke may not reach the detectors.
- Distance the smoke must travel to reach a detector may increase the alarm time and so not allow time to escape the fire, thus the requirement of a minimum of one detector
  per floor and sleeping areas. Even with detectors on each floor, if they are not interconnected they may not allow enough time to escape or trap your loved ones, so have
  two ways out and practice them.
