There are over 15 ghost signs within the Downtown Core District. The Champion Spark Plug sign was selected as a pilot project, sponsored by the Deadwood Historic Preservation Commission. Tim Peterson, of Flat Earth Sign Company, brought the ghost sign back to life from 15% condition to 60% restoration in the month of June. Bringing Ghost Signs Back to Life


Ghost signs, also referred to faded ads and brick ads, are old hand-painted advertising signs that have been preserved on a building for an extended period and downtown Deadwood is home to many. The signs speak of the people who ran the business, shops and firms; they reflect the City's personality and speak to the present in ways that buildings themselves do not. These historic signs are archeological layers that reveal different periods of human occupancy and use and provide continuity to public spaces, becoming part of the community history.

Deadwood Volunteer Fire Department - From Ken's Desk

Now that summer is here and camping is on many of our plans this summer, it may be a good time to review a little fire safety for campfires. Campfires are one of the best ways to create lasting memories; let's make sure they are fond memories.

Campfires are the nation's leading cause of children's camping injuries and the leading primary catalyst for damaging forest fires. Campfire building may be safely undertaken if you practice proper burning techniques and safety measures to protect yourself and the Black Hills, State and Federal Parks and Forests

- Check the weather forecast. Weather fluctuations, such as sudden gusts of wind, could cause it to burn larger and not in the planned location.
- A safe burning site will be far away from power lines, overhanging tree limbs, building, automobiles, equipment, rotten stumps, shrubs, dry grass, leaves or pine needles. The fire will need a vertical clearance of at least three times the size of the fire flame lengths, as heat extends far past the actual flames that you can see.
- The ground around the fire or burn site should be surrounded by soil or mineral soil (dirt) for at least 10 feet in all directions. Keep the surrounding area watered down.
- Keep the fire in a contained unit such as a burn barrel, BBQ unit, hibachi or small pit with rocks around it. Building a fire directly on the ground can allow the fire to spread underground through a root system or decaying material.
- When building a fire, start with dry twigs and small sticks. Add larger sticks as the fire builds up Put the largest pieces of wood on last, pointing them towards the center of the fire, and gradually push them into the flames.
- Never use flammable liquids to ignite or keep the fire burning. Avoid gasoline, diesel fuel, lighter fluid and other dangerous fuels.
- After lighting the fire do not discard the match until it is cold and placed in water or the campfire.
- Keep campfire small and don't let them get out of hand. A 2', X2', X2' is a manageable size
- Stack extra firewood upwind and 10' away from the fire.
- Never allow children or pets near the fire and do not leave them unsupervised.
- Teach children to STOP, DROP, and ROLL if their clothes catch on fire.
- Keep plenty of water nearby and have a shovel for throwing sand /dirt on a fire if it gets out of control.
- Never leave a campfire unattended, even the smallest of breeze may cause the fire to spread quickly.
- When extinguishing the fire, drown it with water. Make sure all the embers, coals, and sticks are wet and cold. If you don't have water mix plenty of soil and sand with the embers. Continue adding and stirring until all material is cooled to bare hand touch.
- Do not bury your coals, they can smolder and start to burn again.
