Powerhouse Park

The City of Deadwood and the Deadwood Historic Preservation Office unveiled their newest park, Powerhouse Park, with a ribbon cutting and open house on September 8, 2016. The park was named after the electric coal-fired power plant that was constructed there in 1902 and operated until 1927 providing power to the Trolley system which transported people from Deadwood to Lead. When the powerhouse was no longer needed it was deconstructed leaving remnants of the foundation and the smoke stack.



Powerhouse Park features a gravel walking path that leads to an elevated boardwalk connected to a deck and stairs that take you down to Whitewood Creek. While you are at the park view the remains of the old smoke stack and building foundation and read about the history of the area. An aggregate path will lead you to the picnic area and viewing area of the Powerhouse smoke stack replica. Take an adventure right in Deadwood and visit the newest park at the Mickelson Trailhead accessed from the Sherman Street parking lot.

Winter Reminders for Residents and Businesses

With winter and snow fall around the corner, the City of Deadwood would like to remind residents and businesses of the Snow Removal Policies, to ensure the safety of all residents and guests. The City is asking all residents and businesses that have recently had new concrete sidewalks and driveways installed, adjacent to their property, to please refrain from using ice/snow melt or salt on the new concrete for at least one year. These products can be very harmful to new concrete and should be avoided if possible. The use of sand to prevent slips and falls is recommended.

The Deadwood Public Works Department reminds you that vehicles need to be removed from the street during snow removal activities. The streets will be posted one day in advance, please take advantage of the public parking lots during the snow removal activities. If your vehicle is not removed prior to snow removal, it will be ticketed and towed.

Sidewalks need to be cleared within 24 hours after the snow stops falling. Failure to clear your sidewalk will result in it being cleared by the City. A fee of \$71.50 per man hour will be charged if the City is required to clear the sidewalk. Snow should not be shoveled or blown into the street after the street has been cleaned. These policies will be enforced for all areas of Deadwood.

The Public Works Department appreciates the cooperation of the citizens to assure our streets are passable and our sidewalks are safe. If there are questions please feel free to contact us at 578-3082.

October is Fire Prevention Month

The U.S. Fire Administration reports that fires kill more than 4,000 Americans each year and approximately injure 20,000 more. U.S. fire departments respond to nearly 2 million fires each year, with three-quarters of them occurring in residences.

A home is often referred to as a safe haven. This month, make sure your home is protected from (and your family is prepared for) a fire. Here are 10 simple tips to help you avoid fires and reduce the risk of injury should one occur:

- 1) **Smoke Alarms** – These are still a very important addition to your home. Smoke alarms are widely available and inexpensive. Install a smoke alarm on every level of your home and test it monthly.
- 2) **Prevent Electrical Fires** – Don't overload circuits or extension cords. Cords and wires should never be placed under rugs or in high traffic areas. Avoid loose electrical connections by checking the fit of the plug in the wall outlet. If the plug loosely fits, inspect the outlet right away. A poor connection between the plug and the outlet can cause overheating and can start a fire in minutes.
- 3) **Keep Plugs Safe** – Unplug all appliances when not in use. Follow the manufacturer's safety precautions and use your senses to spot any potential disasters. If a plug is overheating, smells strange, shorts out or sparks – the appliance should be shut off immediately, then replaced or repaired.
- 4) **Alternate Heaters** – Make sure there is ample space around any portable heating unit. Anything that could catch fire should be at least three feet away. Inspect your chimney annually and use fire screens to help keep any fires in the fireplace.
- 5) **Fire Safety Sprinklers** – When combined with working smoke alarms, home fire sprinklers greatly increase your chance of surviving a fire. Sprinklers are affordable and they can increase property value and lower insurance rates.
- 6) **Create An Escape Route** – Create and practice your escape plan with your family from every room in the house. Practice staying low to the floor and checking for hot doors using the back of your hand. It's just like a routine school fire drill – but in your home.
- 7) **Position Appliances Carefully** – Try to keep TV sets, kitchen and other appliances away from windows with curtains. If there is a wiring problem, curtains can spread a fire quickly. Additionally, keeping your appliances away from water sources (like rain coming in from windows) can help prevent wiring damage which can lead to a fire.
- 8) **Clean Dryer Vents** – Clothes dryers often start fires in residential areas. Clean the lint filter every time you start a load of clothes to dry or after the drying cycle is complete. Make sure your exhaust duct is made of metal tubing and not plastic or foil. Clean the exhaust duct with a good quality dryer vent brush to prevent blockage & check for lint build up behind the dryer at least twice a year.
- 9) **Be Careful Around the Holidays** – If you fill your home with lights during the holiday season, keep them away from anything that can easily catch fire. Check all of your lights prior to stringing them up and dispose of anything with frayed or exposed wires.
- 10) **Conduct Regular Inspections** – Check all of your electronic equipment and wiring at least once a month. Taking a little time to do this each month can really pay off.

Following these simple tips could potentially save your life or the life of a loved one. Pass this list on to your friends and family and make this fire prevention month count.

DEADWOOD HISTORIC PRESERVATION COMMISSION RESIDENTIAL REHABILITATION PROGRAM

The City of Deadwood Historic Preservation Commission is once again offering a program to residents in the City of Deadwood to help stimulate the quality restoration and protection of buildings contributing to the historic integrity of the City of Deadwood. The recipient of the program will receive grant funds for the restoration or rehabilitation of the historic exterior, roof, siding, foundation, windows and life safety issues to include plumbing, electrical, HVAC, retaining wall and drainage. All costs associated with the restoring or repairing of exterior and life safety issues will be paid 100% by the Historic Preservation Commission with a cap of \$100,000.

The recipient must first be nominated for the program by a neighbor or resident. The application will be reviewed by the Neighborhood Block Club Council and recommendations will be made to a selection committee for final nomination to the Historic Preservation Commission for approval or denial. The Historic Preservation Commission may approve up to two contributing buildings for 2017 based on the extent of rehabilitation costs.

To be eligible the building must be located on a primary street, easily viewable from the right of way and listed as a contributing historic property. The building must be a residential property and the building must be owner occupied for at least ten years. A non-contributing building may be eligible if the removal of inappropriate alterations or the reconstruction of missing details will reverse the listing to a contributing resource.


