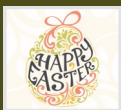

The City of Deadwood will have an election on April 14, 2015 for two (2) City Commissioners. The polling place will be the Deadwood City Hall and polls will be open from 7am - 7pm. Deadline for voter registration is March 30, 2015. Absentee ballots will be available at the Finance Office no later than **March 30** and proper Identification must be presented. The following candidates are running for two (2) positions: Gary Todd, Mark "Spiro" Speirs, Gregory M. Vecchi and Georgeann Silvernail. Registered Deadwood voters may vote for up to two (2). In addition, voters will be voting on Initiated Measure #1 to require a majority vote of the public prior to moving, demolishing or destroying any historic property listed on the State or National Register of Historic Places, and Initiated Measure #2 to permit diagonal parking on Main Street Deadwood. Please practice your right to vote at the City Hall on Tuesday, April 14, 2015.

PUBLIC NOTICE: Hwy 85 Reconstruction Progress

Weekly public meetings on the Hwy 85 Reconstruction Project continue to be held at Deadwood City Hall every Tuesday at 11am unless otherwise noted. These meetings are open to the public; all are welcome and encouraged to attend.

As of April 6 temporary signals will replace the four-way stop and traffic will be reduced to one lane at the junction of Cemetery Street and Highway 85. Phase 2, which consists of total reconstruction, including removing and replacing old road surfacing, sidewalks, utilities, and storm sewer, is anticipated to begin on April 27.

The Project Team would like to thank business owners and Deadwood residents for their efforts in communicating openly with the team; input from the community has helped resolve traffic issues and mitigated many of the side effects often occurring throughout the reconstruction activities. City of Deadwood – 2014 Drinking Water Report

Water Quality: Last year, the city of Deadwood monitored your drinking water for possible contaminants. The following is a snapshot of the quality of the water and we provided last year. Included are details about where your water comes from, what it contains and how it compares to Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) and state standards. We are committed to providing you with information because informed customers are our best allies.

Water Source: We serve more than 1,270 customers an average of 382,000 gallons of water per day. Our water is surface water we purchase from another water system; the City of Deadwood public water system purchases 100% of their water from Lead-Deadwood Sanitary District (0190). The state performed an assessment of our source water and they have determined that the relative susceptibility rating for the Deadwood public water supply system is medium. For more information about your water and information on opportunities to participate in public meetings, call (605) 578-2600 and ask for Mary Jo Nelson.

Additional Information: The sources of drinking water (both tap and bottled) include rivers, lakes, streams, ponds, reservoirs, springs and wells. As water travels over the surface of land or through the ground, it dissolves naturally occurring minerals and picks up substances resulting from the presence of animals or from human activity. Contaminants that may be present in source water include:

- Microbial contaminants, such as viruses and bacteria, which may come from sewage treatment plants, septic systems, agricultural livestock operations, and wildlife;
- Inorganic contaminants, such as salts and metals, which can be naturally-occurring or result from urban storm water runoff, industrial or domestic wastewater discharges, oil and gas production, mining or farming;
- Pesticides and herbicides, which may come from a variety of sources such as agriculture, urban storm water runoff, and residential uses;
- Organic chemical contaminants, including synthetic and volatile organic chemicals, which are by-products and industrial processes and petroleum production, and can also, come from gas stations, urban storm water runoff, and septic systems;
- Radioactive contaminants, which can be naturally-occurring or be the result of oil and gas production and mining activities.

In order to ensure that tap water is safe to drink, EPA prescribes regulations that limit the amount of certain contaminants in water provided by public water systems, FDA regulations establish limits for contaminants in bottled water which must provide the same protection for public health. Drinking water, including bottled, may reasonably be expected to contain at least small amounts of some contaminants. The presence of contaminants does not necessarily indicate that water poses a health risk. More information about contaminants and potential health effects can be obtained by calling Environmental Protection Agency's Safe Drinking Water Hotline (800) 426-4791.

Some people may be more vulnerable to contaminants in drinking water than the general population. Immuno-compromised persons such as persons with cancer undergoing chemotherapy, persons who have undergone organ transplants, people with HIV/AIDS or other immune system disorders, some elderly and infants can be particularly at risk from infections. These people should seek advice about drinking water from their health care providers. EPA/CDC guidelines on appropriate means to lessen risks of infection by *Cryptosporidium* and other microbial contaminants can be obtained by calling the Environment Protection Agency's Safe Drinking Water Hotline (800) 426-4791.

If present, elevated levels of lead can cause serious health problems, especially for pregnant women and young children. Lead in drinking water is primarily from materials and components associated with service lines and home plumbing. Deadwood's public water supply system is responsible for providing high quality drinking water, but cannot control the variety of materials used in plumbing components. When your water has been sitting for several hours you can minimize the potential for lead exposure by flushing your tap for 30 seconds to 2 minutes before using water for drinking or cooking. If you are concerned about lead in your water, you may wish to have your water tested. Information on lead in drinking water, testing methods, and steps you can take to minimize exposure is available from the Safe Drinking Water Hotline or at <http://www.epa.gov/safewater/lead>.

Detected Contaminants: To receive a copy or view a table which lists all the drinking water contaminants detected during the 2014 calendar year, contact Donovan Renner by calling (605) 578-3082.

The presence of the contaminants in the water does not necessarily indicate the water poses a health risk. Unless otherwise noted, the data presented in this table is from testing done January 1 – December 31, 2014. The state requires us to monitor for certain contaminants less than once per year because the concentrations of these contaminants are not expected to vary significantly from year to year. Historic Preservation Programs Available to Deadwood residents

For the past several years the City of Deadwood's Historic Preservation office has supported and provided programs to assist in funding the preservation, restoration and rehabilitation of homes and businesses throughout our historic community. With a duty to meet the standards put forth by the South Dakota State Historic Preservation Office and to keep Deadwood's National Historic Landmark status, our goal is to help our Deadwood community preserve the historic structures making up a large amount of our beloved city. In doing so, the Historic Preservation Office feels public education of the programs would be helpful for those who are not aware of what funding is available.

Most Deadwood residents and business owners may qualify for a Historic Preservation Program. If interested in scheduling a one-on-one consult with the Historic Preservation Officer and the Building Inspector to determine your eligibility and to receive a list of programs available to you, please contact the Historic Preservation office at (605) 578-2082.
