## City of Deadwood – 2013 Drinking Water Report

<u>Water Quality:</u> Last year, the city of Deadwood monitored your drinking water for possible contaminants. This brochure is a snapshot of the quality of the water and we provided last year. Included are details about where your water comes from, what it contains and how it compares to Environmental Protec6tion Agency (EPA) and state standards. We are committed to providing your with information because informed customers are our best allies.

<u>Water Source:</u> We serve more than 1270 customers an average of 392,000 gallons of water per day. Based on the industry standard, an equivalent use for a population of 3,020 per day. Our water is surface water that we purchase from another water system. The state has performed an assessment of our source water and they have determined that the relative susceptibility rating for the Deadwood public water supply system is medium. <u>Additional Information</u>: The sources of drinking water (both tap and bottled) include rivers, lakes, streams, ponds, reservoirs, springs and wells. As water travels over the surface of land or through the ground, it dissolves naturally occurring minerals and picks up substances resulting from the presence of animals or from human activity. Contaminants that may be present in source water include:

•Microbial contaminants, such as viruses and bacteria, which may come from sewage treatment plants, septic systems, agricultural livestock operations, and wildlife

•Inorganic contaminants, such as salts and metals, which can be naturally-occurring or result from urban storm water runoff, industrial or domestic wastewater discharges, oil and gas production, mining or farming.

•Pesticides and herbicides, which may come from a variety of sources such as agriculture, urban storm water runoff, and residential uses.

•Organic chemical contaminants, including synthetic and volatile organic chemicals, which are by-products and industrial processes and petroleum production, and can also, come from gas stations, urban storm water runoff, and septic systems.

•Radioactive contaminants, which can be naturally-occurring or be the result of oil and gas production and mining activities. In order to ensure that tap water is safe to drink, EPA prescribes regulations that limit the amount of certain contaminants in water provided by public water systems, FDA regulations establish limits for contaminants in bottled water which must pro-

vide the same protection for public health. Drinking water, including bottled, may reasonably be expected to contain at least small amounts of some contaminants. The presence of contaminants does not necessarily indicate that water poses a health risk. More information about contaminants and potential health effects can be obtained by calling Environmental Protection Agency's Safe Drinking Water Hotline (800) 426-4791.

Some people may be more vulnerable to contaminants in drinking water than the general population. Immuno-compromised persons such as persons with cancer undergoing chemotherapy, persons who have undergone organ transplants, people with HIV/AIDS or other immune system disorders, some elderly and infants can be particularly at risk from infections. These people should seek advice about drinking water from their health care providers. EPA/CDC guidelines on appropriate means to lessen the risk of infection by Cryptosporidium and other microbial contaminants can be obtained by calling the Environment Protection Agency's Safe Drinking Water Hotline (800) 426-4791.

If Present, elevated levels of lead can cause serious health problems, especially for pregnant women and young children. Lead in drinking water is primarily from materials and components associated with service lines and home plumbing. The City of Deadwood public water supply system is responsible for providing high quality drinking water, but cannot control the variety of materials used in plumbing components. When your water has been sitting for several hours you can minimize the potential for lead exposure by blushing your tap for 30 seconds to 2 minutes before using water for drinking or cooking. If you are concerned about lead in your water, you may wish to have your water tested. **Detected Contaminants:** To receive a copy or view a table which lists all the drinking water contaminants that we detected during the 2011 calendar year, contact Donovan Renner by calling (605) 578-3082.

The presence of the contaminants in the water does not necessarily indicate the water poses a health risk. Unless otherwise noted, the data presented in this table is from testing done January 1 – December 31, 2011. The state requires us to monitor for certain contaminants less than once per year because the concentrations of these contaminants are not expected to vary significantly from year to year. # **Library Happenings**

"Drawn to the Land: Homesteading Dakota", a traveling exhibit from the South Dakota State Historical Society, arrived at the Deadwood Public Library located at 435 Williams Street and will be on display from June 1 - August 1, 2014.

From 1860 to 1920, thousands of homesteaders poured into Dakota from across the country and oversees. Many stated, making a home for themselves and their descendants. Others came for only a short while before selling out and moving on. For many South Dakotans, homesteading is an intimate family memory and stories referencing the "home place" are passed from generation to generation. *Drawn to the Land* uses fifteen panels in five pop-up kiosks with historic photographs, artifact images, and text to tell the story of homesteading experience in Dakota.

*Drawn to the Land* was funded by the Cutler Family honoring Judge Alden and Elizabeth Cutler and the South Dakota Future Fund.

## **REMINDER: Building Permits**

With Summer in full force, both residential and commercial projects are taking place throughout Deadwood.

This is a reminder that under ordinances duly

passed by the Deadwood City Commission, it is the owner and/or contractors responsibility to check with the building official to obtain a required building permit.

A building permit is required for any activity which involves or causes any such work to be done to construct, enlarge, alter, repair, move, demolish, or changes the occupancy of a building or structure, or to erect, install or enlarge, alter, repair, remove, convert, or replace any electrical, gas, mechanical, or plumbing system. The fee for such permit is established based upon the value of the project for which a permit is requested as established by the ordinances of the City Commission.

# PUBLIC SERVICE ANNOUNCEMENT: US Hwy 85 Reconstruction (Sherman & Charles Streets)

In preparation for the scheduled highway 85 reconstructions this fall utility companies located in the Sherman and Charles Street corridor will be installing underground conduit for their facilities during the months of July, August, and September.

Work is anticipated to start at the Cemetery and Sherman Street intersection the week of July 7th and work will move south along highway 85 with expectations to reach the Stewart Street intersection prior to the Sturgis Motorcycle Rally. Work will be shut down during the Sturgis Motorcycle Rally and resume after that event continuing south with expectations to reach the Walnut Street Bridge by the end of September. This work is expected to only cause minor traffic delays as the work is being done in the sidewalk and boulevard locations on the west side of Sherman Street and the north side of Charles Street.

Sidewalks that are removed as a result of this construction will be replaced with asphalt surfacing by the City of Deadwood as the contractor moves through the project to keep the businesses and residents in the construction area minimally impacted. Throughout this project there are four major road crossings for the utilities and anticipated lane closures during the installation of these crossings. At no time during this construction will the road be closed to traffic.

# Rotary Park: Renovated and to be Re-dedicated as "Martha Bullock Memorial Park"



On June 16<sup>th</sup> the Deadwood City Commission approved the construction of a trolley stop at Rotary Park on Charles Street in Deadwood along with the reconstruction of the park. After many meetings with the Capital Improvement Committee, the Parking and Transportation Committee as well as a public meeting on April 3, 2014 to seek input of the community as to what would take place on this property, it was determined that the City of Deadwood provide a facility that would have a tennis court/pickle ball court, a new playground area, picnic space, trolley stop with plaza, and maintained green space for summer with a sledding hill for the winter.

You will notice the existing equipment and fencing has been removed and construction should begin in a few weeks with a projected completion in September.
