The City of Deadwood would like to alert residents and visitors of upcoming changes to the paid parking areas throughout town.



The first significant change you will notice will be at the Broadway parking ramp, where you will find new Pay by Plate kiosks located at key exit points of the garage. When a customer arrives, they will park and then pay at any of the four kiosks located throughout the garage. Transactions take only a few seconds and the kiosks will accept credit cards and coins.

Urban Trail System

The City of Deadwood in partnership with the City of Lead, Northern Hills Recreation Association and the Main Street Initiative collaborated together to create an urban trail

> system. Multi-modal trails have been identified in Deadwood, Lead and the surrounding area. These trails are identified by urban trail markers and an informational brochure with map.

> The Deadwood Trail System will initially consist of ten urban trails of varying lengths and connections. Universal directional signage is being installed along the trails to assist in providing a safe and informative hiking experience.

> In addition to traversing historic Deadwood, the trail system provides scenic views, possible up close and personal encounters with wildlife and the opportunity to enjoy some of the charming historic neighborhoods within Deadwood.

> The informational brochure and map was designed and printed

by the Northern Hills Recreation Association with funding by BID 8. The brochures are available at the Deadwood Welcome Center, History and Information Center, Deadwood City Hall and the City of Deadwood website.

Utility Rates

Effective January 1, 2021, City of Deadwood utility rates increase 5% due to on-going infrastructure maintenance and repair costs.

The new rate for trash/recycling collection is **\$22.25** plus applicable taxes.

WINTER FIRE SAFETY

Winter holidays can be a joyous time for all, but nearly 50% of civilian fire deaths occur throughout the winter season; November -February. Most heating fires in South Dakota involve fireplaces and chimneys. The most dangerous place to be, with regard to fire, is your own home. Your home can be a cozy warm place away from a harsh winter, but it can also become dangerous if you don't take special precautions.

Tips to Eliminate Winter Fires:

- Safety around heating equipment and appliances is an important first step in reducing the threat of fire. Keep children and loose clothing at a safe distance.
- Use a yardstick to measure the distance between heating equipment and combustible material. Unless you have three feet of clearance, you are at risk.
- Always turn off portable heating appliances when leaving home or retiring for the evening. Be sure the fire in the fireplace is out before going to bed.
- Have chimneys, fireplaces, and other heating devices inspected by a qualified professional at the start of every heating season.
- Use a sturdy screen or glass closure in front of your fireplace, and burn only clean fireplace wood. Never burn treated lumber.
- Install smoke detectors on every level of your home, including the basement, and test them monthly.
- If you smell gas in your home, contact your local utility company or qualified professional heating contractor and follow their advice.
- Inspect heat tape before using it. Never thaw pipes with an open flame.

Winter Safety Tips:

- Protect neighborhood homes this winter. Keep your nearest fire hydrant clear of snow.
- After holiday parties, check wastebaskets and furniture for smoldering cigarettes.
- Place holiday decorations well away from heat sources. If you have a tree water it daily.
- Do not burn holiday wrappings in a fireplace; it may cause a chimney fire.
- Pay attention when cooking. If a pan is on fire, cover it with a lid. Water will spread a fire.
- Turn off and unplug lights and decorations before going to bed or leaving your house. Buy electrical decorations approved by a national testing laboratory. Don't overload outlets.

Candle Burning Safety Tips:

- Place candles on a secure surface in sturdy noncombustible holders which won't tip over. Make sure the holder is large enough to catch drippings.
- Keep candles away from children and pets. Candles should be out of children's reach.
- Keep candles away from combustible items such as curtains, books and paper. Remember the "three-foot rule" anything combustible needs to be kept three free from a heat source.
- Keep candles away from flammable liquids. Do not use a candle for light when fueling a kerosene heater or lantern. The flame may ignite the fumes.
- Avoid using candles during a power outage. A flashlight is a safer option. Don't carry a lit candle.
- Remember to extinguish candles when leaving the room or going to sleep. Never leave children or pets unattended in a room with a lit candle.
