Asteroid Named in Honor of Deadwood

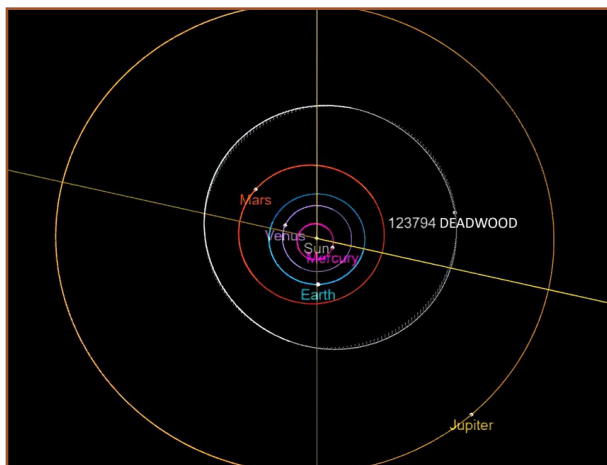
During the City Commission Meeting on July 6, 2021, Ronald Dyvig, the Director of the Badlands Observatory in Quinn, South Dakota, honored the community of Deadwood. Mr. Dyvig, in behalf of his graduating class of 1961, revealed that a main belt asteroid has been officially named for their beloved hometown.

Mr. Dyvig's interest in Astronomy began over sixty years ago as an 11-year old student in Deadwood. This has culminated in the construction of Badlands Observatory and an active asteroid observing program the past twenty years. On

the night of January 25, 2001, Dyvig observed and recorded a main belt asteroid approximately one to two miles in diameter between the orbits of Mars and Jupiter. This discovery was recorded and later confirmed by the Minor Planet Center (MPC). The MPC is located at the Smithsonian Astrophysical Observatory, and operates under the auspices of the International Astronomical Union, and NASA. It is the international clearing house for all observational data pertaining to asteroid discovery and research.


Once confirmed, Dyvig was granted the privilege of suggesting a name for his discovery, Asteroid (123794). During a Deadwood High School alumni reunion, several of his fellow classmates suggested the discovery be named in honor of the beloved community they grew up in during their adolescence – Deadwood, South Dakota.

Mr. Dyvig presented the Deadwood City Commission with a plaque honoring this amazing discovery.

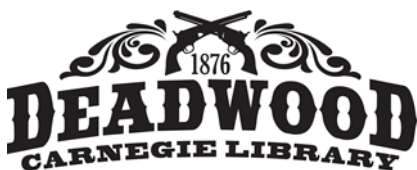

August 27: History on the Lawn: *Sitting Bull and the Events Leading to the Battle of the Little Big Horn* – In 1874 Lieutenant Colonel George Armstrong Custer led an expedition into the Black Hills where his prospectors discovered gold in French Creek, setting off a stampede to the Black Hills and leading to violent confrontations with the Lakota and other tribes. But before that happened there had been constant warfare with those tribes which had not signed the 1868 Fort Laramie Treaty. Sitting Bull was one of those leaders. When railroad survey teams passed through their hunting grounds in Dakota and Montana Territories, Sitting Bull and others fought to expel them. One of the military leaders assigned to protect the railroad surveyors was Custer. What happened during those clashes? What was Sitting Bull doing as prospectors invaded the Black Hills? What were Sitting Bull's actions leading up to and during the Battle of the Little Big Horn? Join Bill Markley, South Dakota Humanities Council Speakers' Bureau Scholar, author, and historian, as he discusses these questions and similar topics. Bring a lunch and enjoy the Historic Adams House lawn; 12:00 p.m.; free for members and \$5 for non-members. In case of inclement weather, the lecture will be moved to the Homestake Adams Research and Cultural Center (HARCC).
