October 8th declared Jerry 'Arthur' Pontius Day

Jerry Pontius started volunteer service with the Deadwood Volunteer Fire Department in 1963. He has served as a firefighter for 60 years, where he was elected Secretary-Treasurer of the department, handling finances and membership records more than once. During his time as a volunteer fireman he spent much of his time promoting teamwork and cooperation. Following in his father's footsteps, Jerry served as Fire Chief for Deadwood from 1971-1975 with distinction. He served in all capacities within the Fire Department, doing anything from washing dishes to fixing equipment, putting his engineering knowledge to use. Not only has Jerry served 60 years on the Deadwood Fire Crew but he to continues to serve the Deadwood Volunteer Fire Department. At 80 years young, Jerry is still going strong.

Jerry has seen many changes over the years, from the years of wearing old WWII gas masks to the present day SCBA breathing apparatus. The fires that stick out the most for him are the Deadwood School fire and the Syndicate fire. Jerry spent long hours at both. He proudly recalls the professionalism shown by not only the DVFD, but also the state boards he served on.

Mayor Dave R. Ruth, Jr. proclaimed October 8th as Jerry 'Arthur' Pontius Day. Burlington & Missouri Roundhouse Unearthed



In September staff from the South Dakota Archaeological Research Center and Historic Preservation Office worked together to locate the remains of the Chicago Burlington & Quincy Roundhouse, constructed in 1895 (todays Sherman Street parking lot). Armed with a backhoe, pick, shovel and trowels, archaeologists located and identified both exterior north and south walls, a partial floor, and corner of the roundhouse.

Research by city staff identified the year of construction and demolition. In June of 1895, the B & M Railroad Company began laying out a five stalled roundhouse.

Upon its completion, the roundhouse cost \$10,000 to construct (\$365,507 today's value). The B & M Roundhouse was in service for 57 years until October 31, 1952 (cont. pg. 2)

The Deadwood Public Works Department reminds you that cars need to be removed from the street during snow removal. Residents will be notified of street cleaning via CodeRED and/or street posting one day in advance. If your car is not removed prior to snow removal it will be ticketed and towed.

Sidewalks need to be cleared within 24 hours after the snow stops falling. Failure to clear your sidewalk will result in it being cleared by a contractor hired by the city. Those fees will be passed on along with a \$50 administrative fee. Snow should not be shoveled or blown into the street after the street has been cleaned.

when it was dismantled.

According to the newspaper, diesel trains had placed steam locomotives and there was no need for the building.

Interesting to note was the large amount of silts deposited against the south wall. This may have been deposited during the May 1904 flood that Deadwood Gulch and took out bridges, buildings and sections of track. A file report will be submitted to the City of Deadwood discussing the project and the archaeological findings. Once this portion of the project has been cleared, work will commence on replacing the retaining walls along Whitewood Creek.

October 12: Preservation Thursday: Prostitution in the American West: Brief Notes on a Long History

History is all about stories. Whose stories do we tell? How do we tell them? Especially when it comes to a topic like prostitution, where the seller is often cast as either a harlot or a victim, how do we tell stories about those individuals who sold sex for a living? In American lore, men went west when gold was discovered to find adventure and seek their fortunes. They saw opportunity for land, wealth, and independence. What we often don't hear is that women went west for the same reasons, not as wives or daughters, but as fortune seekers themselves. Except the fortune they were seeking wasn't embedded in veins in mountains but in the pockets of the men who literally struck gold - and they earned their wages by selling sex. Women and sex work were an integral part of how the American West was built. Associate Professor of Sociology Dr. Kayla Pritchard from the South Dakota School of Mines and Technology will focus on Deadwood, but she will also highlight other interesting stories and women from the region. November 2: Preservation Thursday: From Problem to Prizewinning

An exterior support ring for the polar neutrino experiment, known colloquially as the Davis ring, is visible to all who drive by the Sanford Lab Homestake Visitor Center in Lead. This ring is merely one section of a 100,000 gallon tank that was placed at the 4,850 level of what was then the Homestake Mine. Just as this structure is one piece of the much larger solar neutrino experiment, so too, was Ray Davis only one of the scientists involved in this multidecade experiment. The presentation by Sanford Lab Homestake Visitor Center Director Kelly Kirk will explore the partnership between John Bahcall, Ray Davis, and others, a collaboration that eventually led to a Nobel Prize and a place in physics history.
