Archival Collection Grows in 2023

As 2023 winds down, it's a good time to reflect upon the happenings of the previous year. As of December, the City Archives received sixteen collections in the way of archival and archaeological material, books and reference materials, and motion picture and video archives. As part of accepting items into the City's collections, the contents of the donation or acquisition are first researched to determine their significance as related to the Historic Preservation and City's Archives mission statements. A donation form is then signed, and the collection contents are itemized and assigned unique identification number(s). Time is also spent on determining the special needs of the assemblage in the way of conservation and stabilization. This information is then entered into the City's collections management software. Finally, portions of the collections are uploaded onto the City Archives webpage https://cityofdeadwood.pastperfectonline.com/. Periodically, the collections are featured or exhibited via social media, display cases at City Hall or published in the City Historic Preservation office or Archivist at 605-578-2082.



Community Recycling Bins to be Removed

The City of Deadwood recycle bins in the Sherman Street parking lot will permanently be removed on January 2, 2024. The City would like residents to know that this decision was not made lightly. The lack of recycling



facilities in the area has created a significant rate increase from the provider and restricted what may be recycled. If the bins would remain, cardboard boxes could no longer be accepted. In addition, each City of Deadwood resident would have to pay an additional \$72 per year for garbage service to offset the increased cost of the community recycling bins. However, Deadwood residents may sign up for curbside recycling at their residence at no additional cost. We understand this significantly affects those who live outside of city limits and the businesses who use this service, but we cannot justify the increase to the City of Deadwood residents who would be paying for the service. At this time, alternative recycling locations can be found in Spearfish and Rapid City. The aluminum can receptacle will be relocated to the City of Deadwood street shop near the bottom of Sampson Street. Rise In Mountain Lion Sightings

Deadwood is located in prime mountain lion (*Puma concolor*) territory. These animals should always be considered unpredictable and potentially




dangerous. Although many times they may detect your presence and flee the area before you notice them, encounters may occur in developed areas as well as in the backcountry. Even at a distance, a brief glimpse should be cause for awareness. Though the mountain lion is most likely to leave the area, you should travel with caution.

- Hike during daylight hours and stay on established trails.
- Make your presence known. Make noise, sing, talk loudly, or wear a bell.
- * Avoid walking alone between dusk and dawn when lions are most active.
- Watch children closely and talk to children about lions and what to do if they meet one.
- Keep pets on a leash; they are easy prey and may attract mountain lions.
- Do not leave pets or pet food outside and unattended, especially at dawn and dusk. Pets can attract mountain lions into developed areas.
- * Stay far away from kittens, their mother is nearby.
- * If there are repeated sightings, be prepared to aggressively defend yourself and others. Be alert and on guard.

If you encounter a mountain lion and the animal is unaware of you, alter your route so that you will move away from its area. If it sees you, continue facing the mountain lion and maintain eye contact. Do not run. Remain calm. Hold your ground or back away slowly. Do all you can to appear larger; stand upright, raise your arms, raise your walking stick, open your jacket. If attacked, fight back! Use rocks or sticks to turn away the mountain lions. Report all sightings to SD Game, Fish & Parks Dept or local police dept.
