Original story: Luck of the Irish: Stories of fortunes made and lost by South Dakota's Irish Immigrants by Ken Stewart for the Capital Journal

Two Bit, South Dakota doesn't sound like a kind of place that would attract much in terms of people or prosperity, but that it did. Named for a gulch that produced two bits—25 cents—in gold with every pan in 1877, prospectors found a good quantity of placer gold in the remains of an ancient river. The gold brought in a couple hundred miners, many of whom were of Irish descent.

Nestled along the gulch about two miles east of Deadwood, the placer gold was soon exhausted. The men were forced to start digging into the hillsides and going further afield in the hunt for elusive gold. Among these miners were men, women, and children from the Emerald Isle.

One of the most notable was James Hardin. James Hardin's family moved from Iowa to Two Bit in the 1870s. There they bought equipment to set up the area's first sawmill in 1878. They profited greatly producing lumber for sluice boxes, homes, mine shoring, and timbers.

Like so many others, Hardin's father was lured into gold mining and staked two claims in Two Bit gulch. It was about this time that Jim Hardin ascertained that raising money through investors was a better way of making a living than digging in the ground. He proved to be brilliant in that field and became one of two Irish millionaires in the area.

A big, affable Irishman with a dynamic personality, Hardin soon found he was able to curry favor with just the sort of people he needed. Those with lots of money to spend. They proved willing to believe in his dream and heaped thousands of dollars on him to invest in his mine.

The Two Bit townsite Company was incorporated in the fall of 1897. By 1899, the town boasted a three-story hotel, Hardin Co. business office and a post office, which was a fine, two-story stone structure. Hardin secured a government assay office, a livery stable, a general store, and several fine homes for the Hardin family.

All in all, James Hardin employed many men throughout his years in various businesses. Most were of Irish decent.

Hardin's empire began to crumble in the early 1900s. His Hardin Standard mine had run out of ore. His other mines were found lacking in payable amounts of gold ore. Galena was in the doldrums in the 1890s. But good times were on the horizon.

Jim Hardin found himself without much of a future by 1900. His Two-Bit mines were failing or had failed. The market for pyrite was limited. Then he found a golden opportunity to return to wealth.

In 1897-98, a group of capitalists from the east formed The Galena-Union Hill Mining and Smelting Company. The management of this venture was Francis Grable, who turned out to be a con-artist. Gable stole huge sums and caused the Galena-Union Hill Co. (cont. on pg. 2)

When this happened, Jim Hardin swooped in and bought the wreckage. He named his new concern the Branch Mint Mining and Milling Company and again set off for a trip back east to recruit investors.

He was very successful and soon the company had 2,500 acres of mining claims and a 3-mile-long private railroad to haul the Hoodoo ores down to Galena to be processed elsewhere.

Harding spent money like a drunken sailor as he continued to build and equip the 900-ton mill. He spent \$500,000 in 1903 dollars on his new mine and mill complex. Plus, there was the continued drain on his treasury for wages and supplies. His frequent trips to the Deadwood saloons didn't help, where he bought round after round non-stop. Then

it all came crashing down ... again. In 1909, the Branch Mint Mining & Milling Company went into receivership. It had produced close to \$500,000 gold, not nearly enough to cover all its expenses. Hardin, as usual, had overextended himself.



He died penniless, in the Galena Hotel,

where he lived for several decades with his wife. He is buried in the Two Bit Cemetery.

Anecdotes From The Archives


Seasonal postcards, as seen in this image, came into
