VINTAGE BASE BALL IN DEADWOOD

While our nation commemorates its 250th anniversary in 2026, the Northern Black Hills - particularly the communities of Deadwood and Lead - will be marking their 150th anniversary of establishment.

As part of planning for the community's year-long celebration, an idea was brought to light to host a city wide baseball game. This however, would not be any ordinary game of baseball but rather in conjunction with sesquicentennial celebration, organizing and playing a vintage baseball game using 19th century dress, equipment and rules.



Known as Vintage Base Ball, communities across the U.S. have formed and played the game mimicking the rules, dress, and equipment of the game that occurred in America over 160 years ago! As part of this exhibition, the game of base ball will rekindle the friendly rivalry between Deadwood and Lead. Using the rules printed in the 1886 Spalding's Base Ball Guide - *Playing Rules of the National League of Professional Base Ball Clubs*. Two vintage base ball games will be played at the Ferguson Football Field in Deadwood on Sunday, June 14, 2026 and Mountaintop Field, in Lead, on Sunday, July 5, 2026.


Event organizers decided on using 1880s rules due to the significance of this decade in the development of the Northern Black Hills Baseball. In 1885, Pennsylvania native and major league base ball playing, Charles Maskery, arrived and played for the Deadwood Metropolitans base ball club. Through their efforts, the first recorded base ball tournament was held at the Deadwood Driving Park during the Harvest Festival.

In order to make this event successful, the communities are looking for volunteers to play. Volunteers will need to commit to leading and playing 1886 rules and wear the period correct uniforms.

SETH BULLOCK STATUE UNVEILED

A crowd gathered on September 23rd, 2025, for the dedication and unveiling of Seth Bullock's statue in front of the Bullock Hotel. The new bronze honors

of Seth Bullock's statue in front of the Bullock Hotel. The new bronze honors the legacy of a key figure in law and as a prominent businessman in Deadwood Gulch, and stands as a permanent reminder of the values that have shaped this

community for generations.

The statue was created by a Deadwood native and sculptor, Edward Hlavka and was funded by The City of Deadwood, the Deadwood Historic Preservation Commission, and the Legends of Deadwood Public Art Initiative. This sculpture is more than just a beautiful piece of art; it's a powerful communication device that reflects the highest values of our community. 

The Deadwood Public Works Department reminds you that cars need to be removed from the street during snow removal. Residents will be notified of street cleaning via CodeRED and/or street posting one day in advance. If your car is not removed prior to snow removal it will be ticketed and towed.

Sidewalks need to be cleared within 24 hours after the snow stops falling. Failure to clear your sidewalk will result in it being cleared by the City at a rate of \$150/person/hour or a contractor hired by the City. Those fees will be passed on along with a \$50 administrative fee. Snow should not be shoveled or blown into the street after the street has been cleaned.
