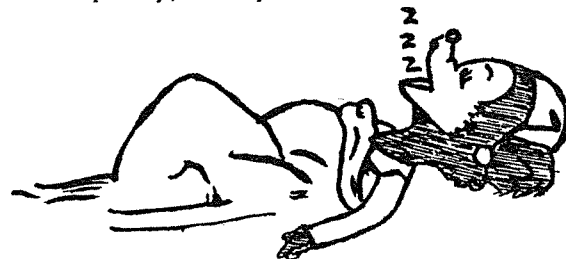

April 13, 1931–October 3, 1951

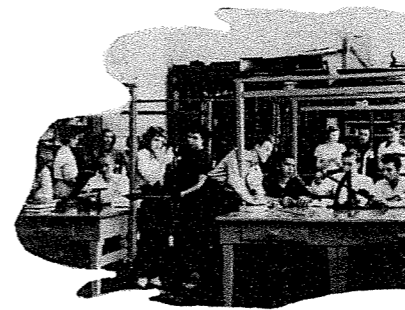
Bertie Rotter graduated with the Class of 1949 from D.H.S.

All the qualities admired in a young girl, Bertie possessed. We all miss her greatly.

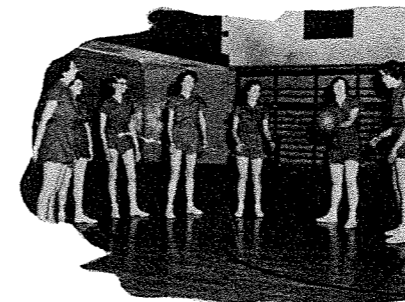

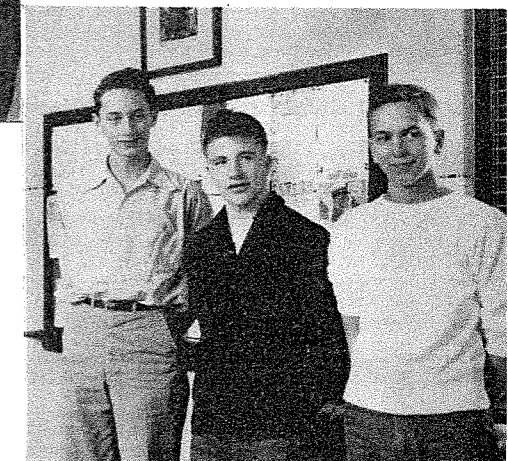
STUDENT ADMINISTRATION

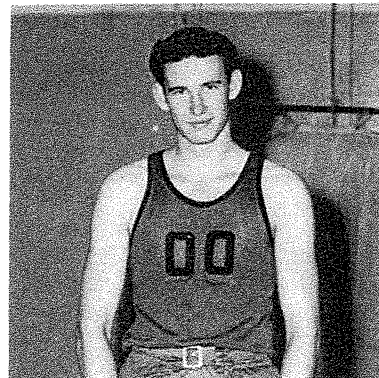


TO STATE IN '52

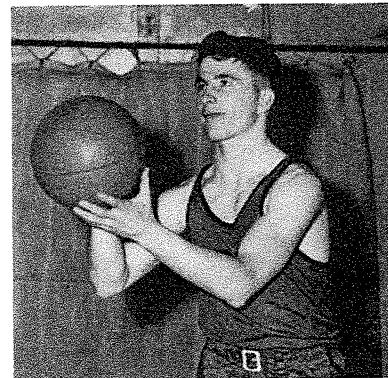
