

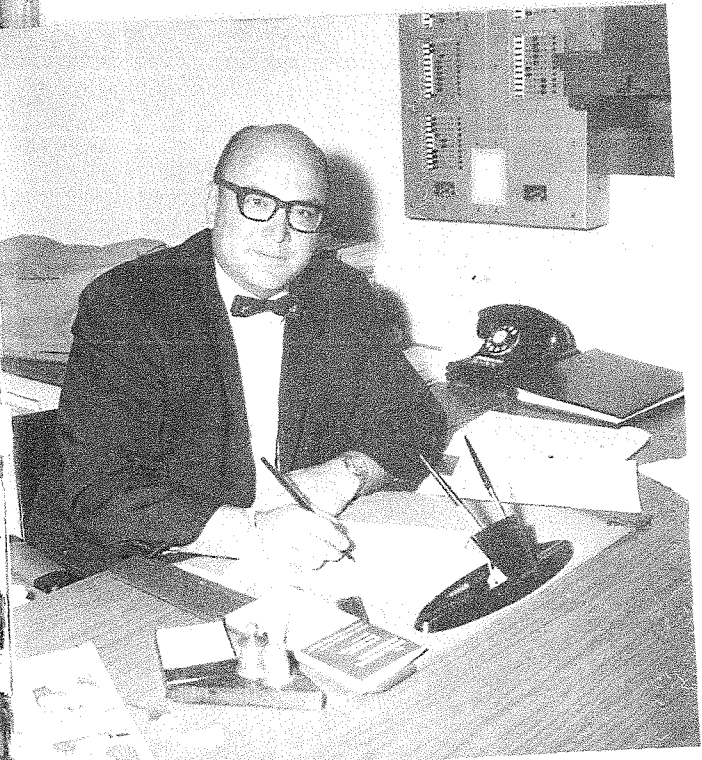

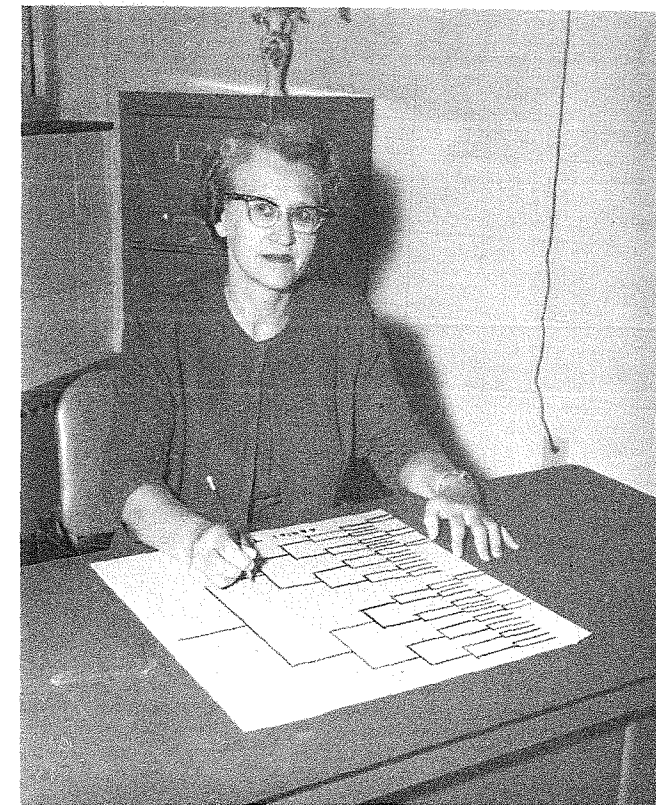


MR. DALE HALL

Mr. Krug, principal of our high school and advisor of the student council, received his MA degree in school administration from North Central College, Naperville, Illinois.



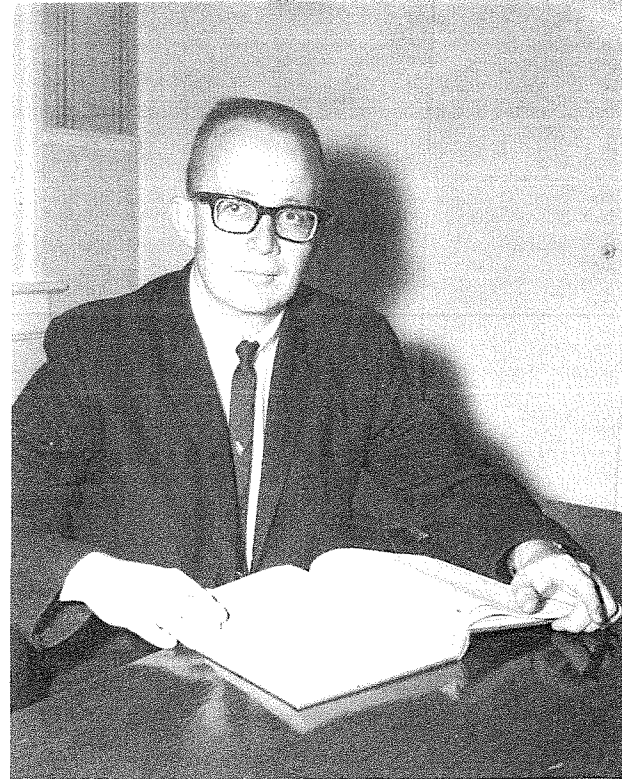
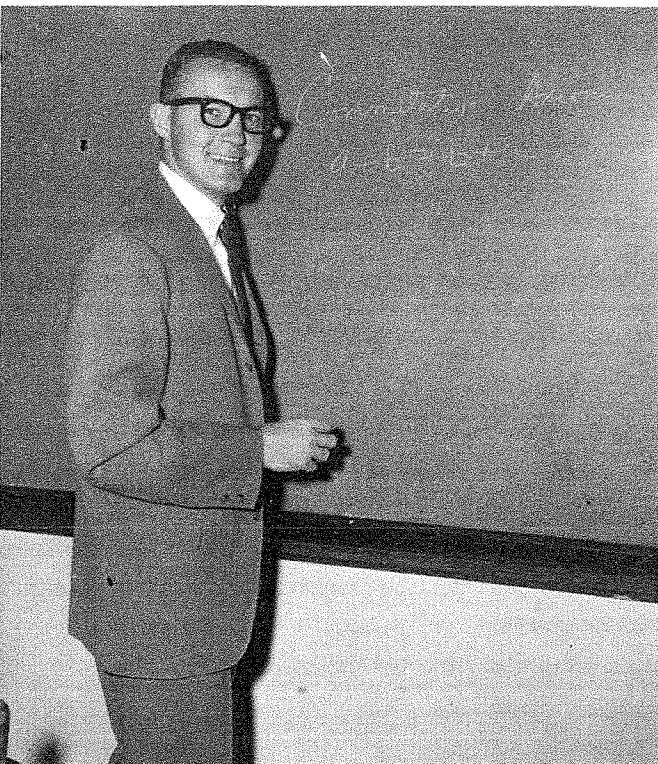


MISS JEAN VAN HEUVELEN

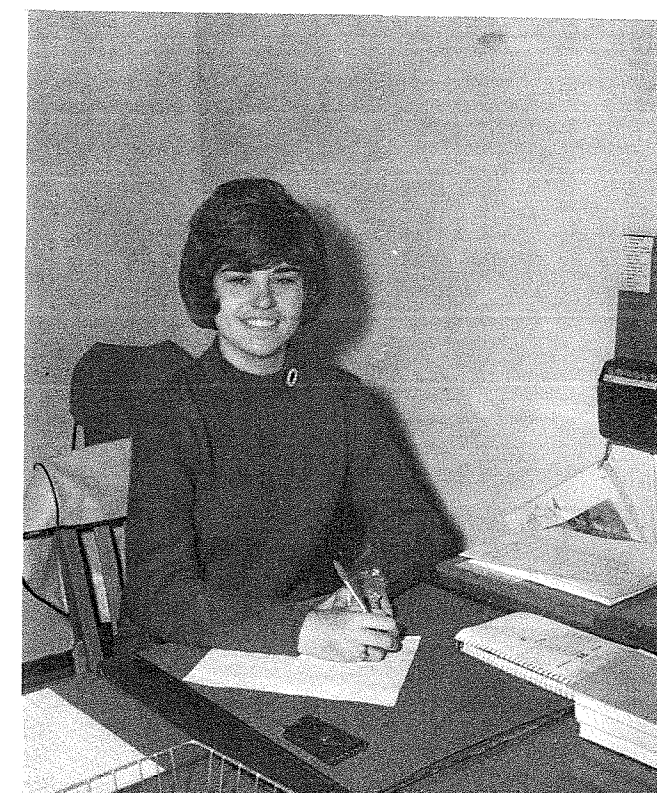


MR. J. ORA HORSFALL

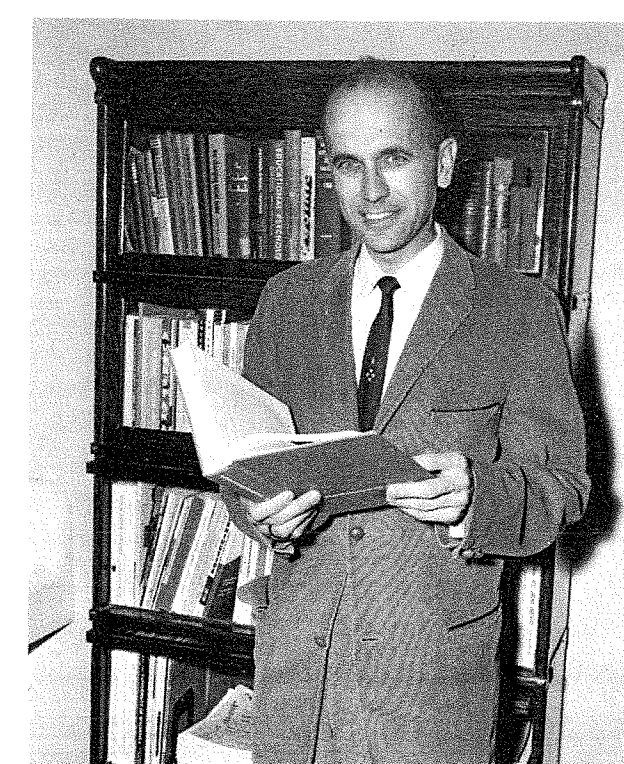


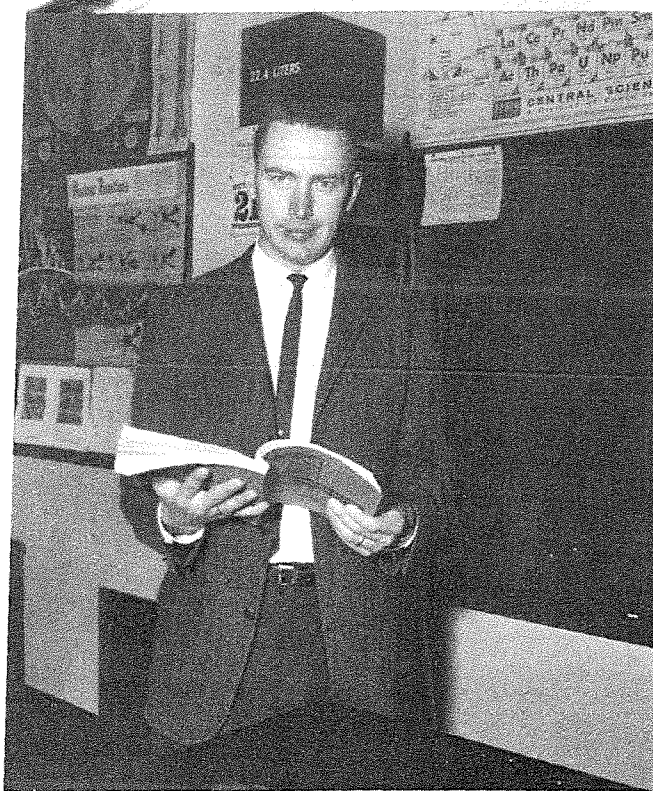
MISS LYNN WHITELOCK

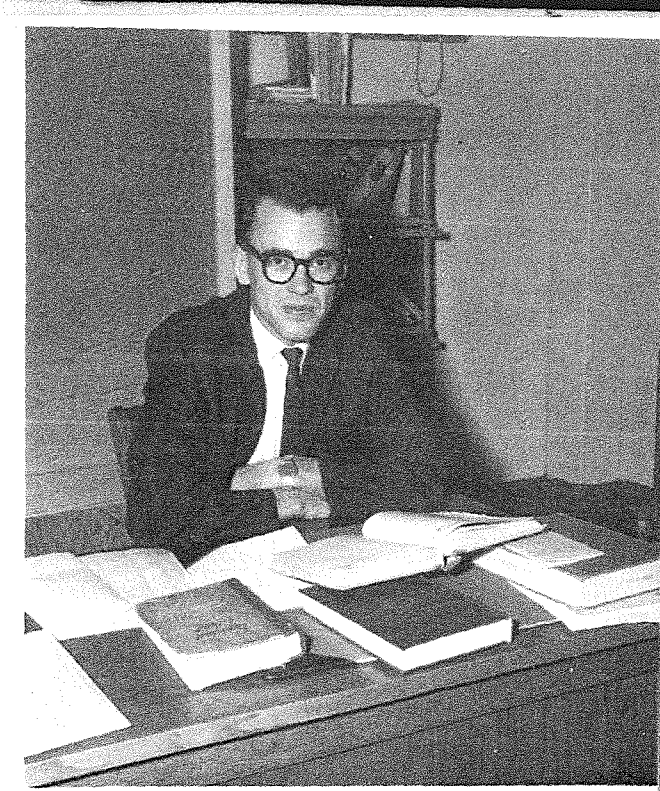
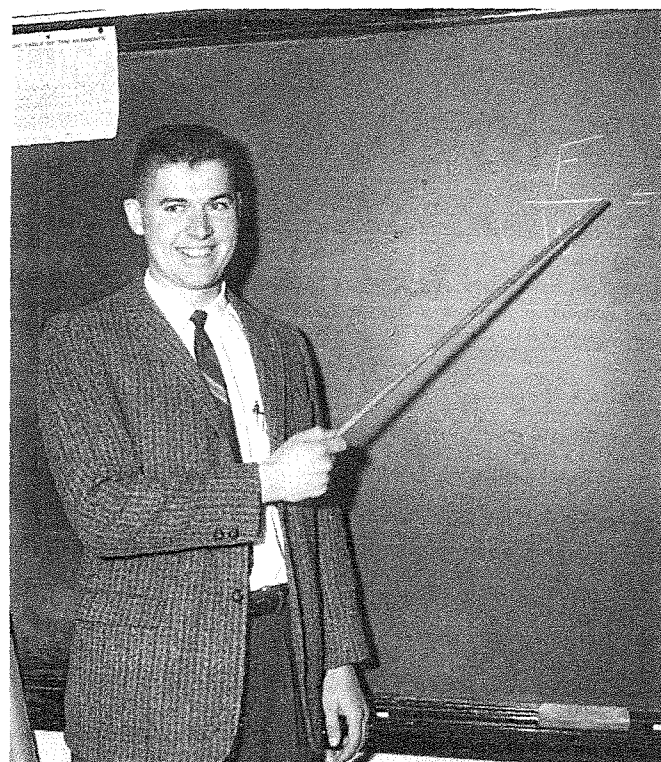


MRS. EDNA ROBINSON

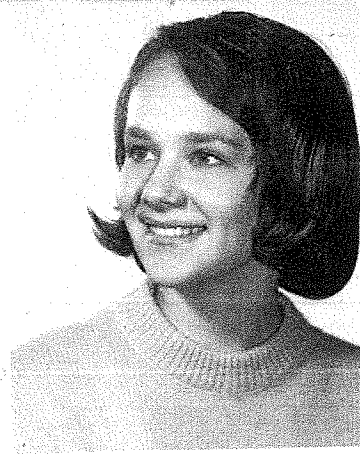
As the Seniors finish their last year of high school they look back on their school days with fond recollections. They find there are happy times, and sad times. There are times to remember, and times to forget.

The class sponsors were Mrs. Williams and Mrs. Robinson. The class is grateful for their guidance.

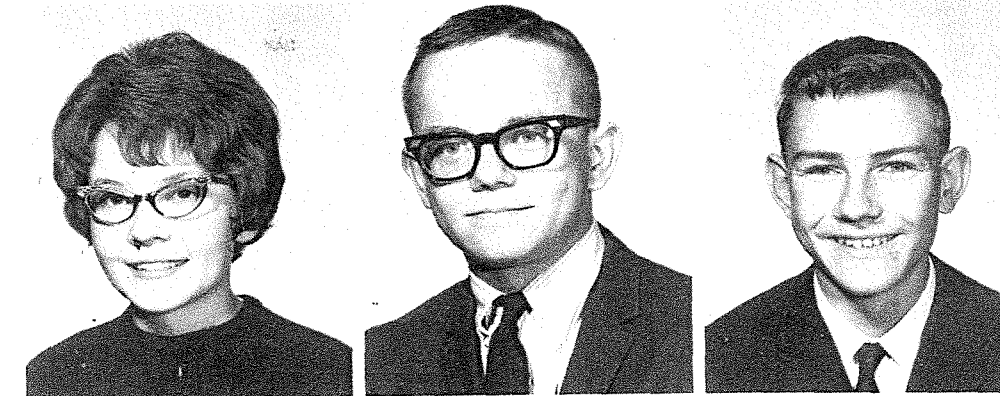

This years sophomore class officers are president Wayne Wagner, vice-president Diane Springer, and Rita Hansen secretary.

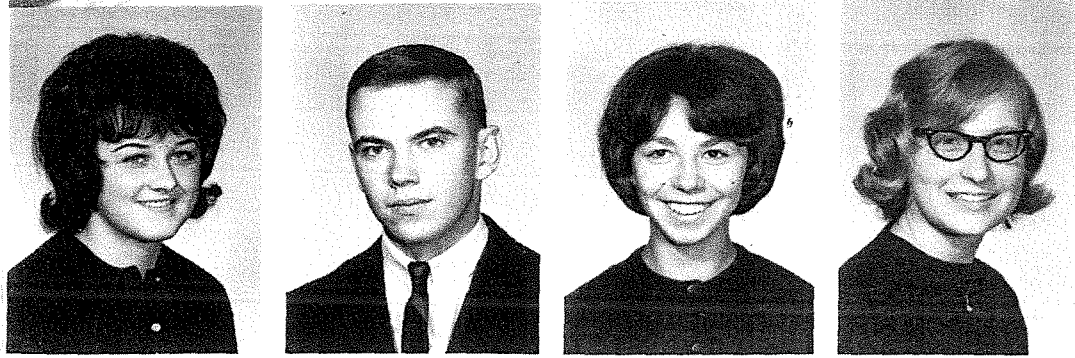

Sponsors for the class were Mr. Matson and Mr. Wiedmeier to whom the class would like to give their thanks.

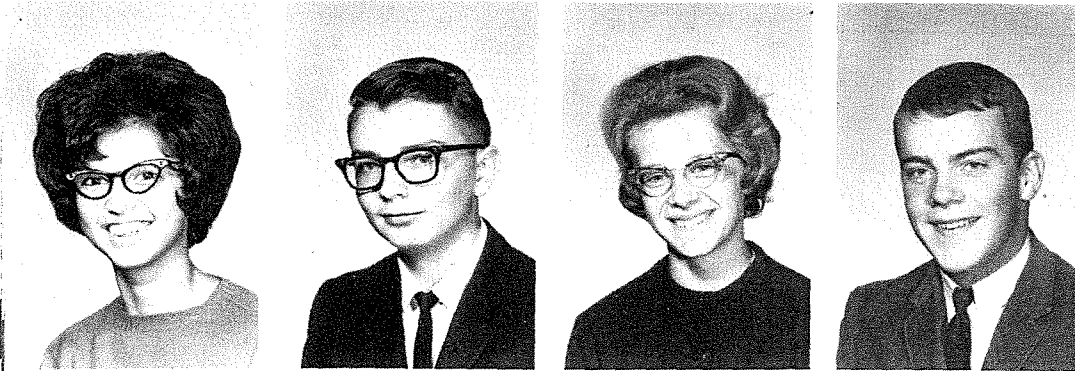

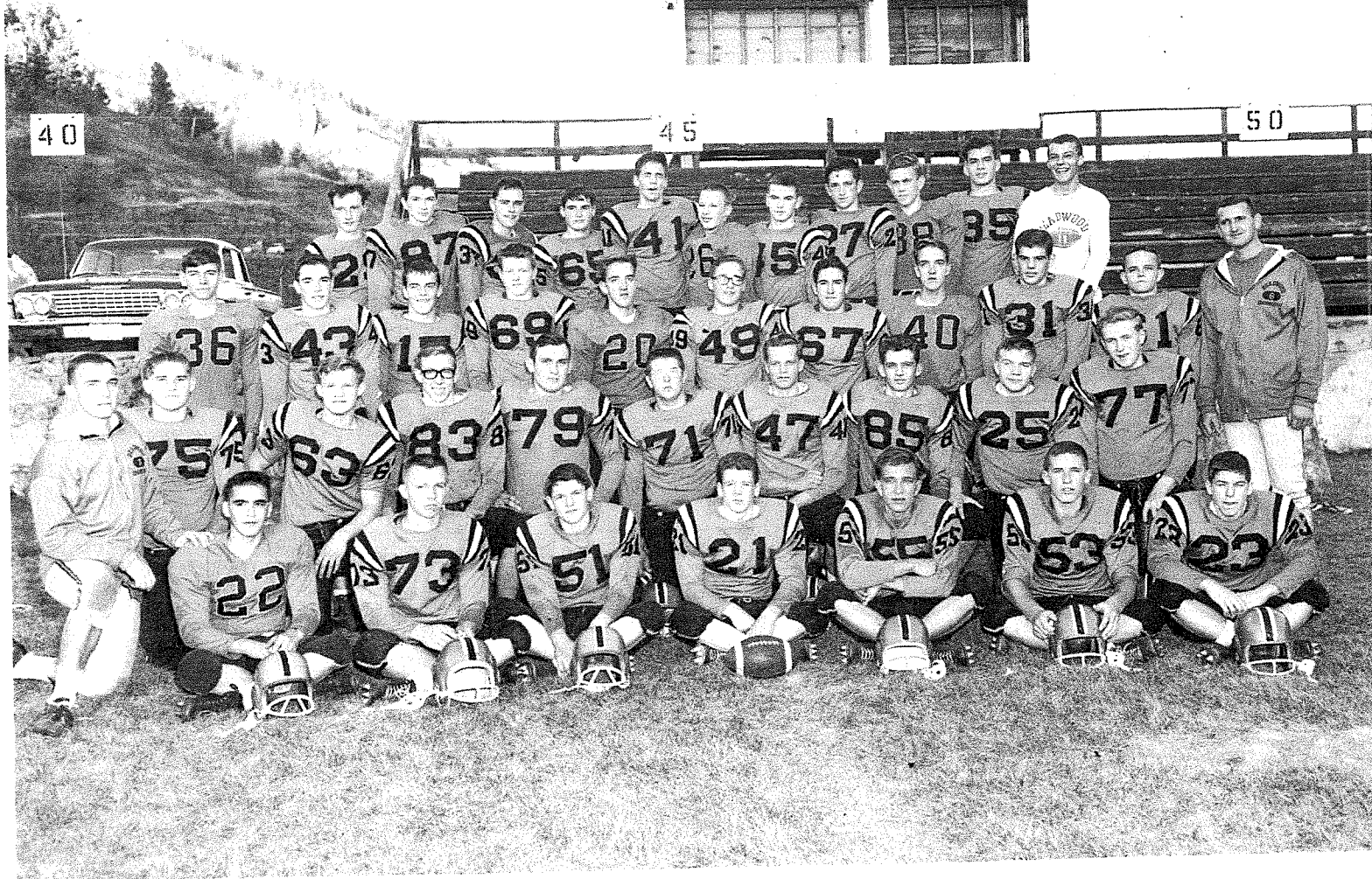

Hard Fighting Bears Finish Season

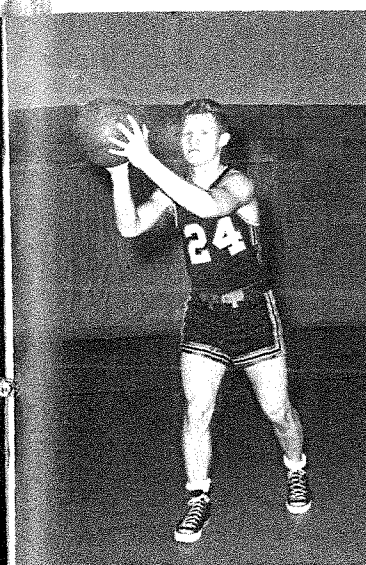

Entered in the B.H.S.C. Tournament late in January, the team received a trophy for first place in the Class B Debate.

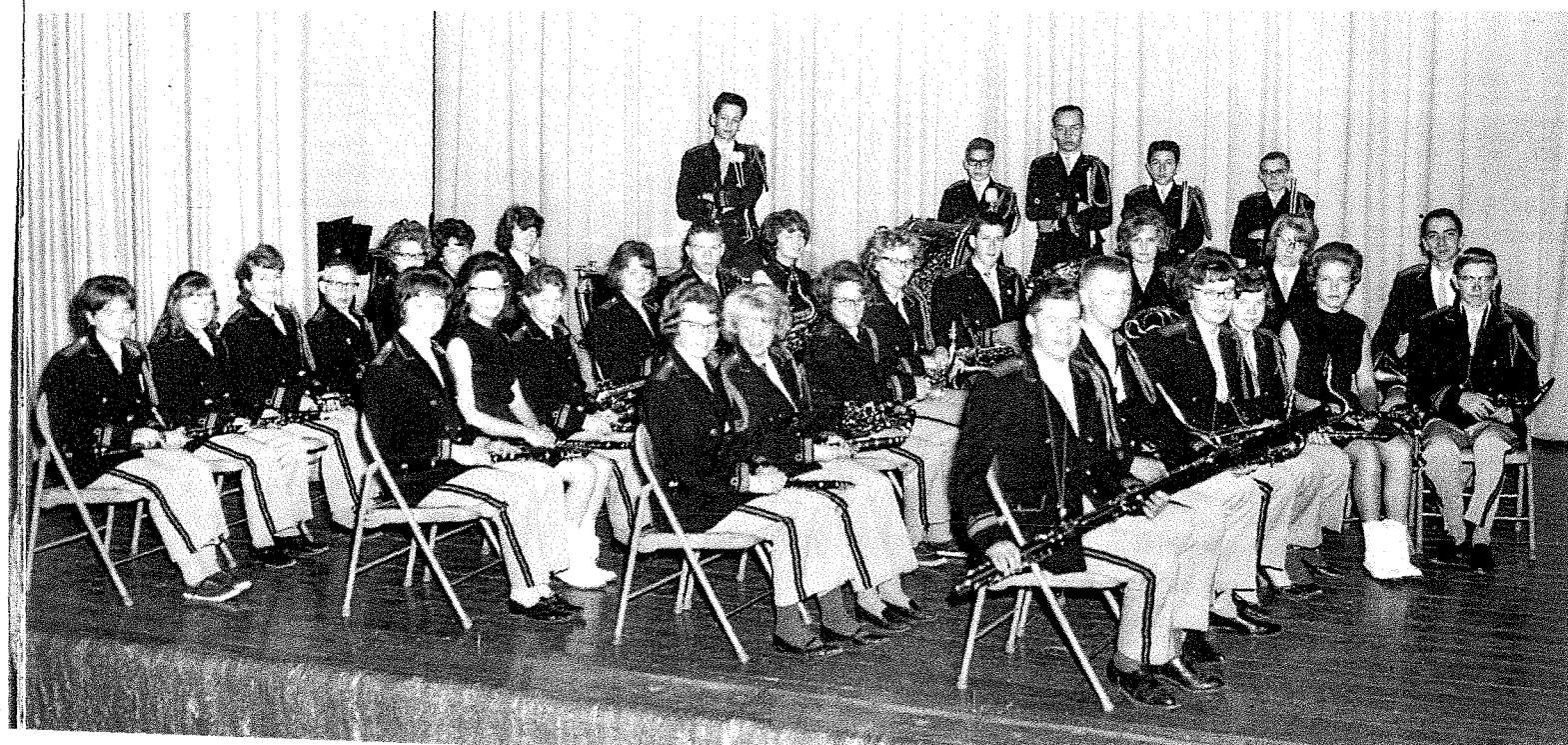
Deadwood band members met five days a week this year under the direction of Mr. Laverne Clark and a student director, Mr. Mitich.

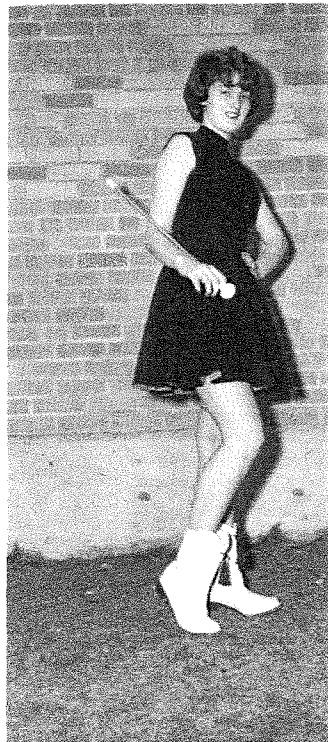

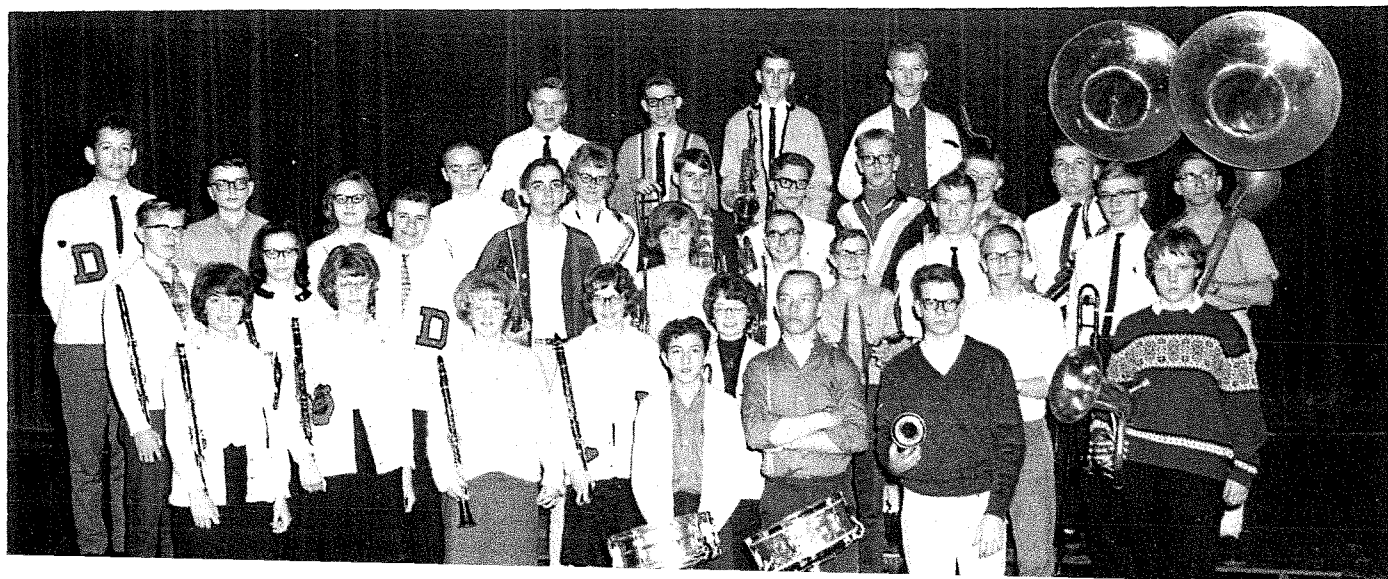

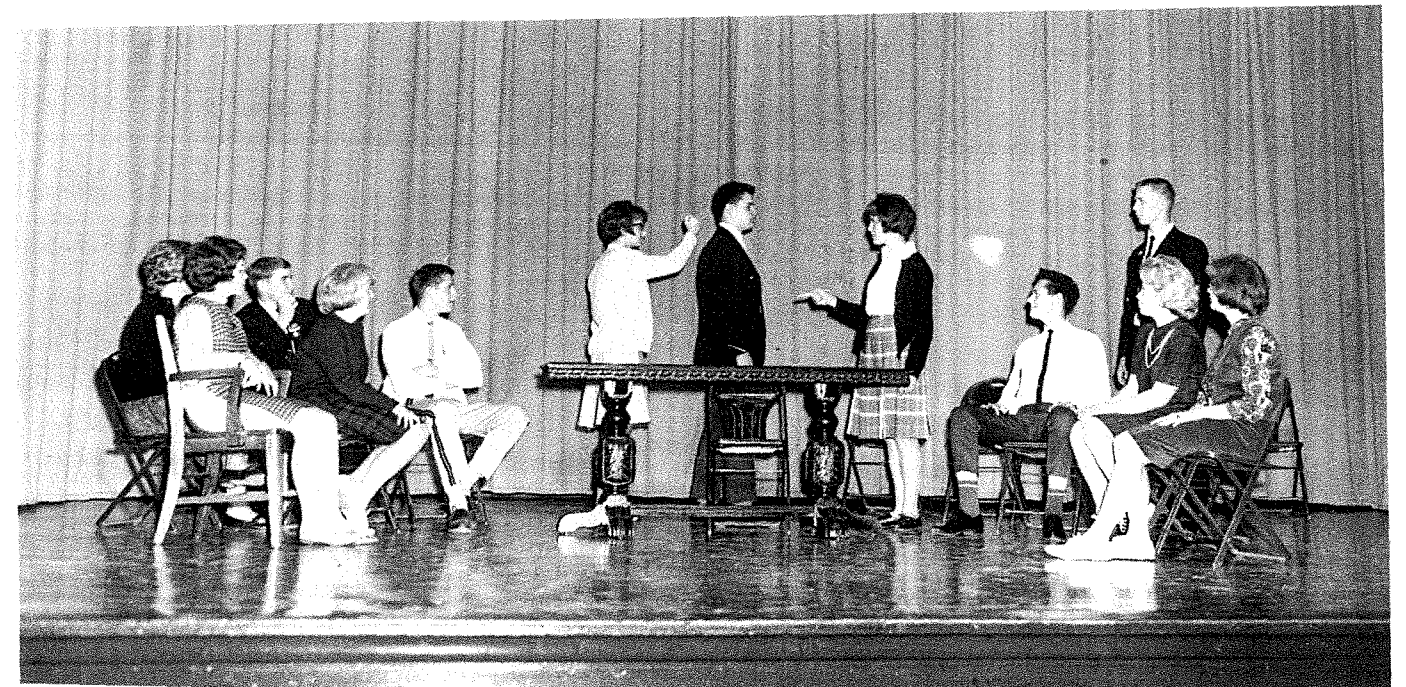
Junior Class Presents "The Jury Room"

This year's chorus group was the largest in many years. They made the two annual public appearances, a Spring Concert and a Christmas Concert.



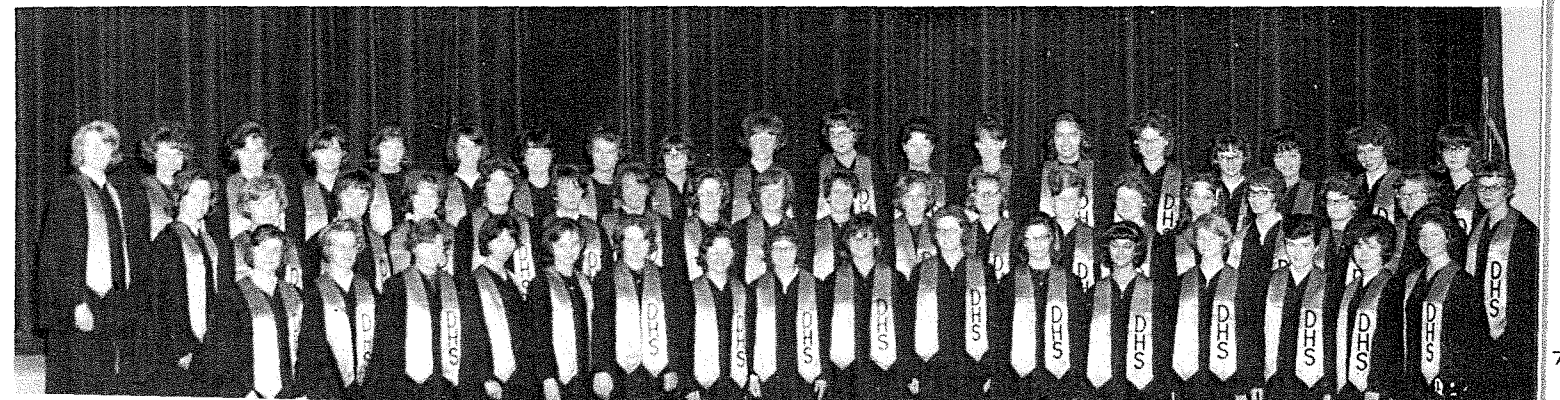

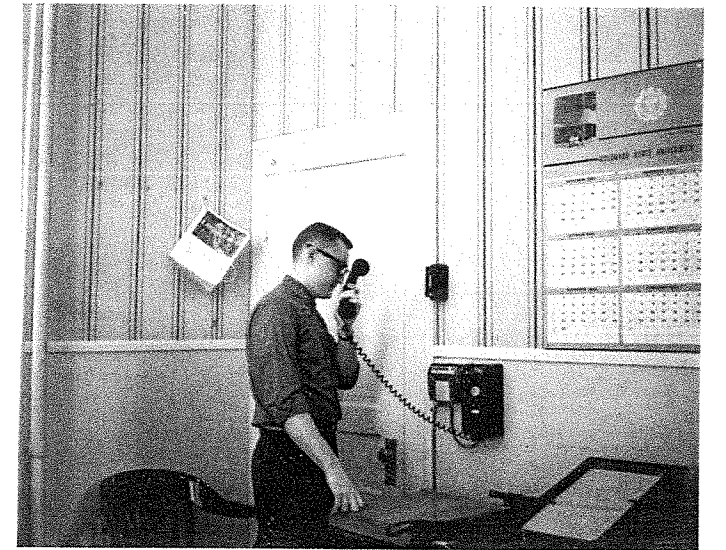
French Club Gains Popularity

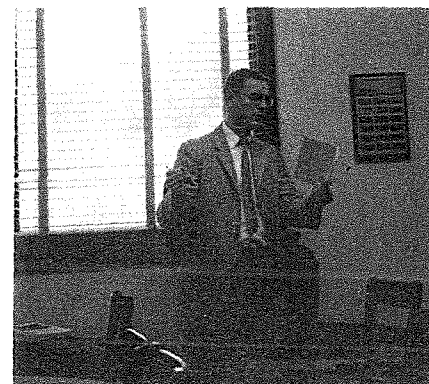

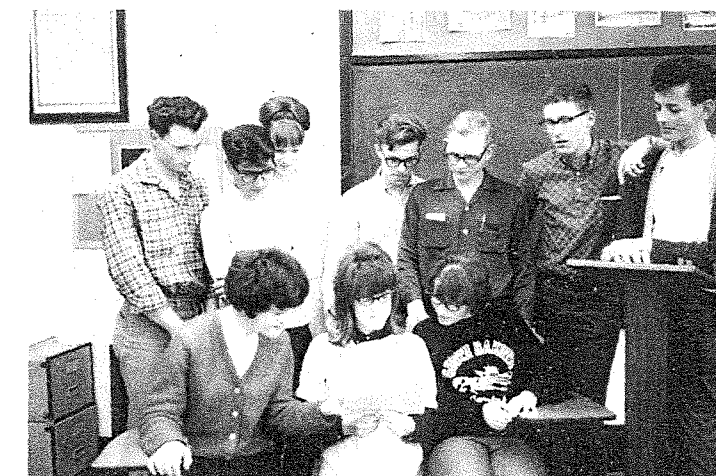


Dramatics Club Activities

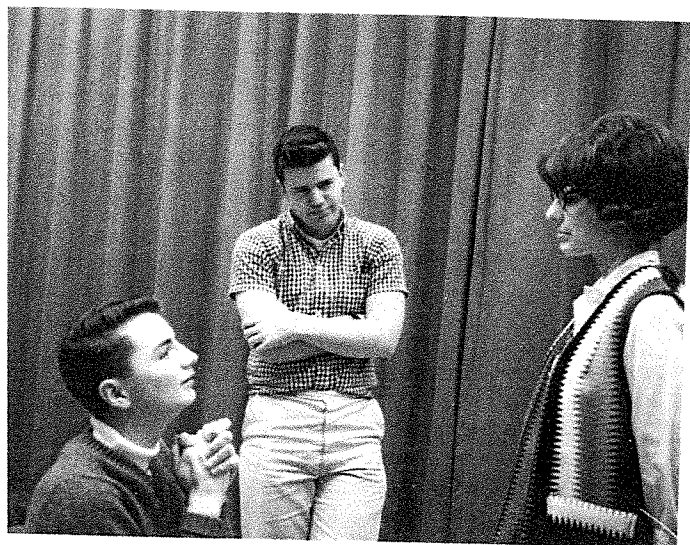
