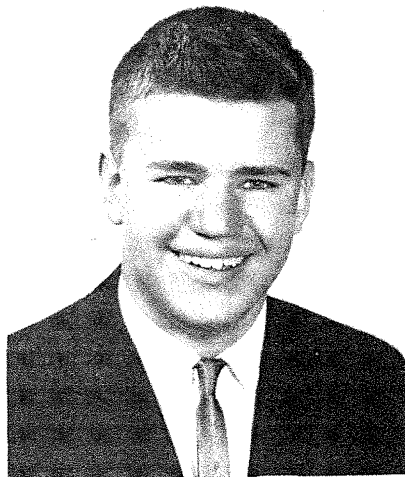
Linda Collins reigned as senior queen for the Bear Day festivities. In the parade she rode upon the float entitled "Slay the Scoopers."

The seniors extend their "thanks" to the class sponsors, Mrs. Burrington and Mr. Wick, for helping them this past school year.



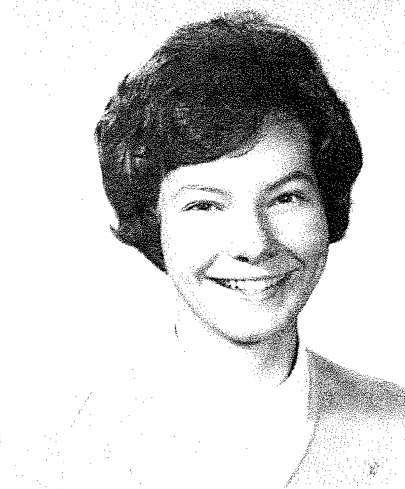

The Howe Scholarship Cup was given to the high school student with the highest scholastic grades in all subjects. This cup is only given once to anyone.



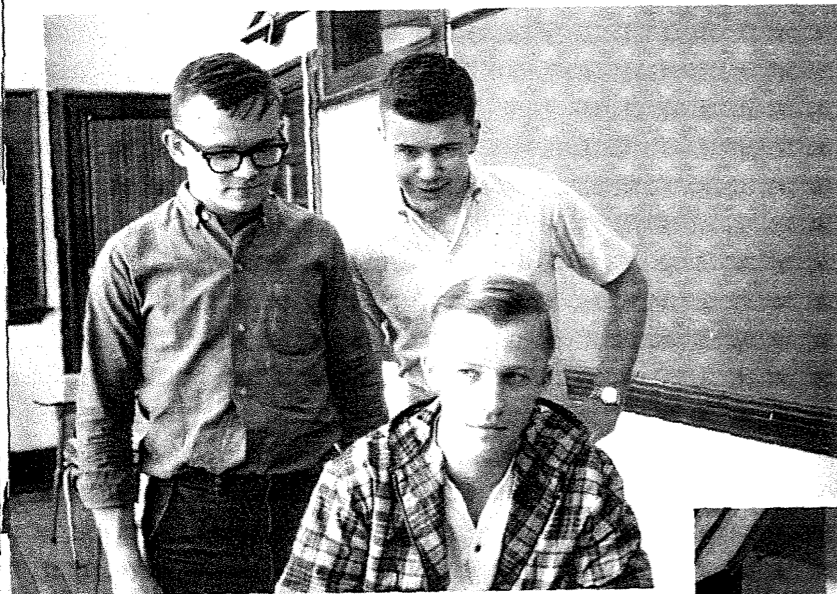

The Holst Award is given to the student with the highest scholastic grades in all math subjects. This award can only be won by a student once in their high school careers.



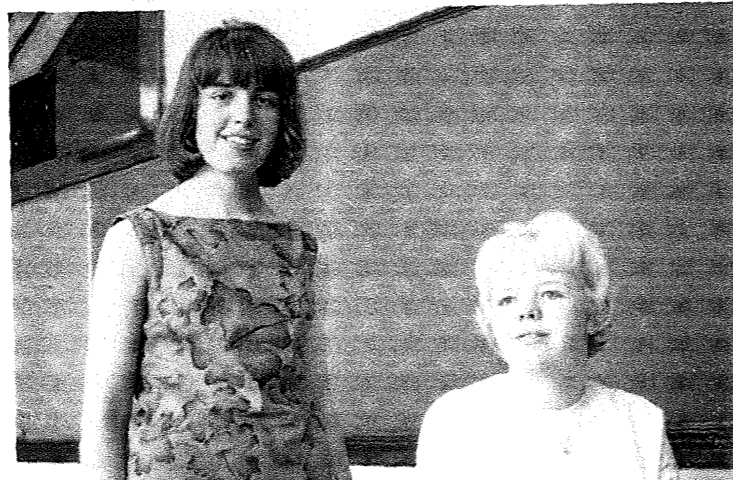

The chorus enjoyed an active year under the direction of Mrs. Hartman and are looking forward to the coming year.

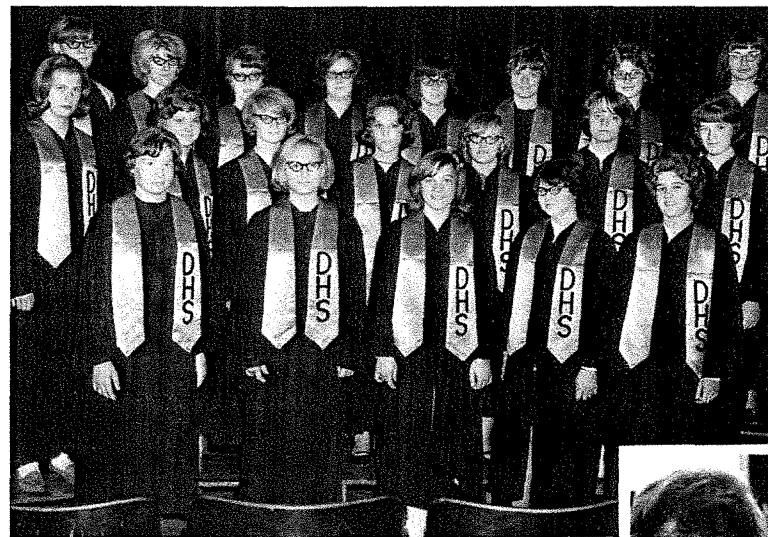
They presented a Christmas Concert on December 16, and a cantata "The Christmas Song" by Roy Ringwald was featured.

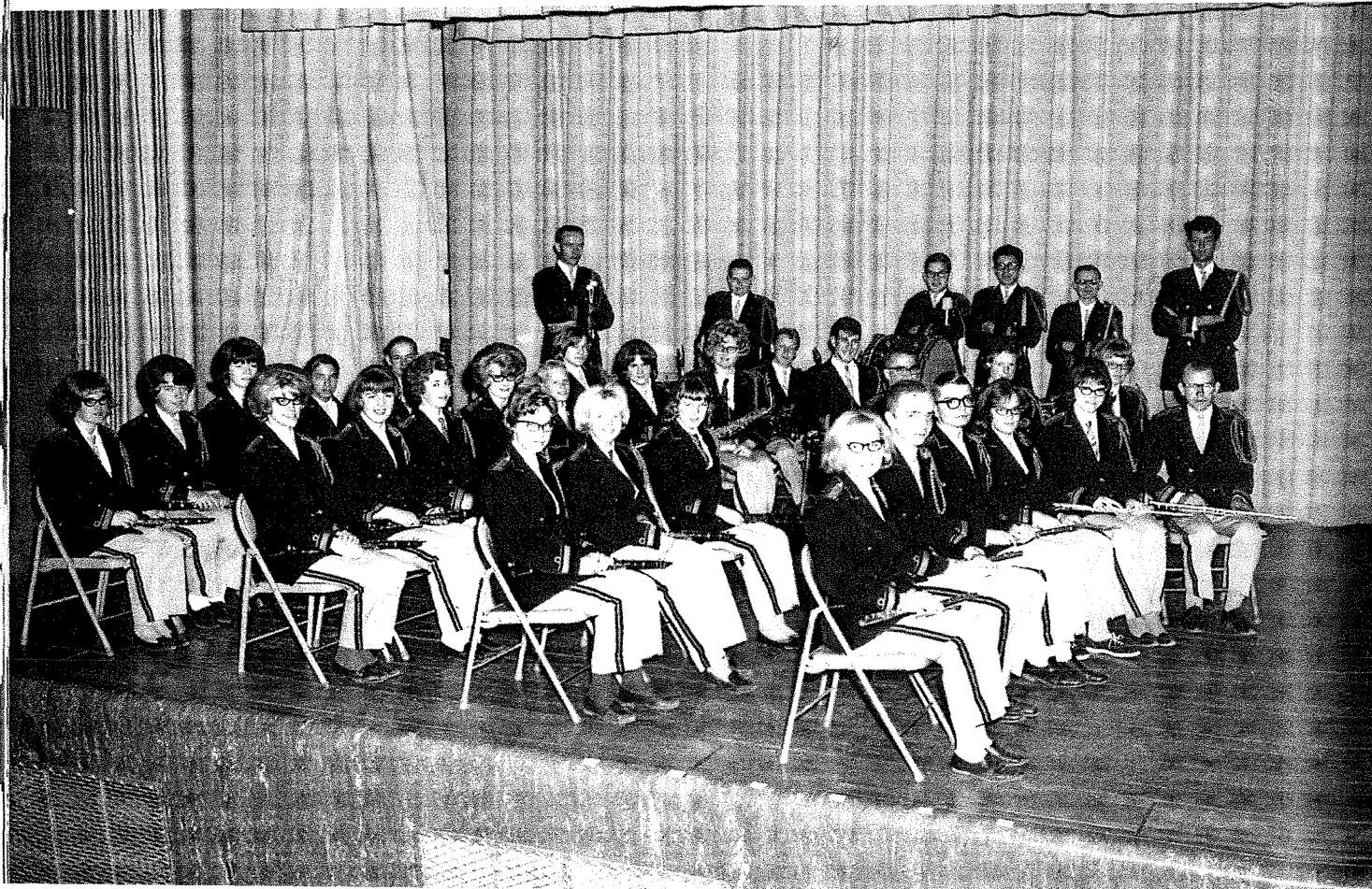

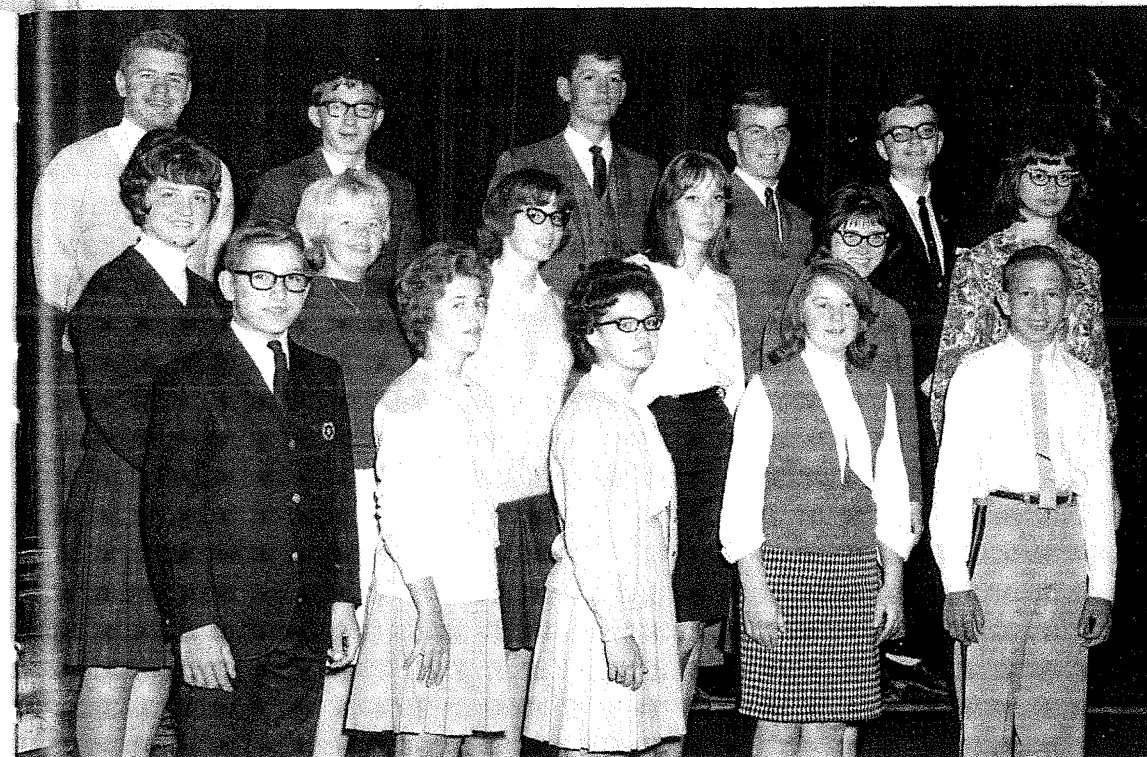
Parlez- Vous Francais?

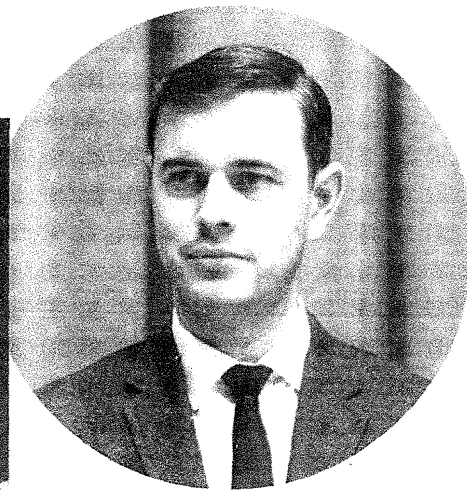
Declam Students Have Triumphant Year

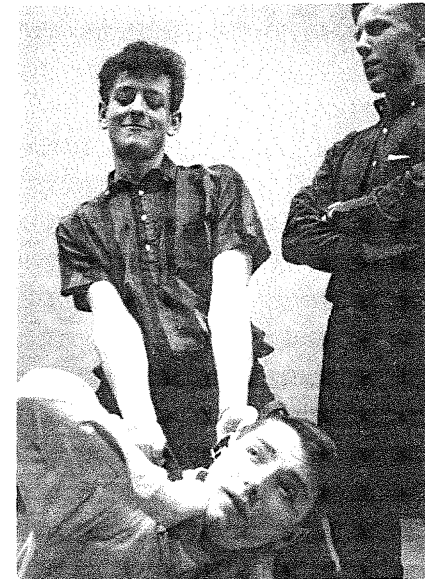

Nancy and Billy also encounter difficulties springing from Nancy's incorrigibly flirtatious habits.

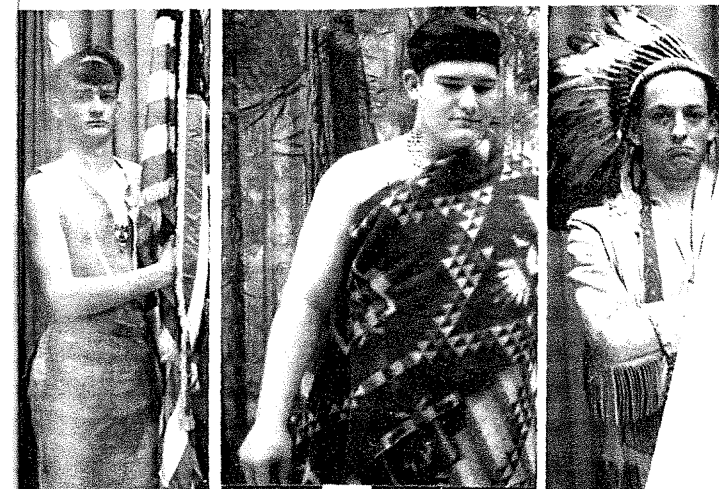

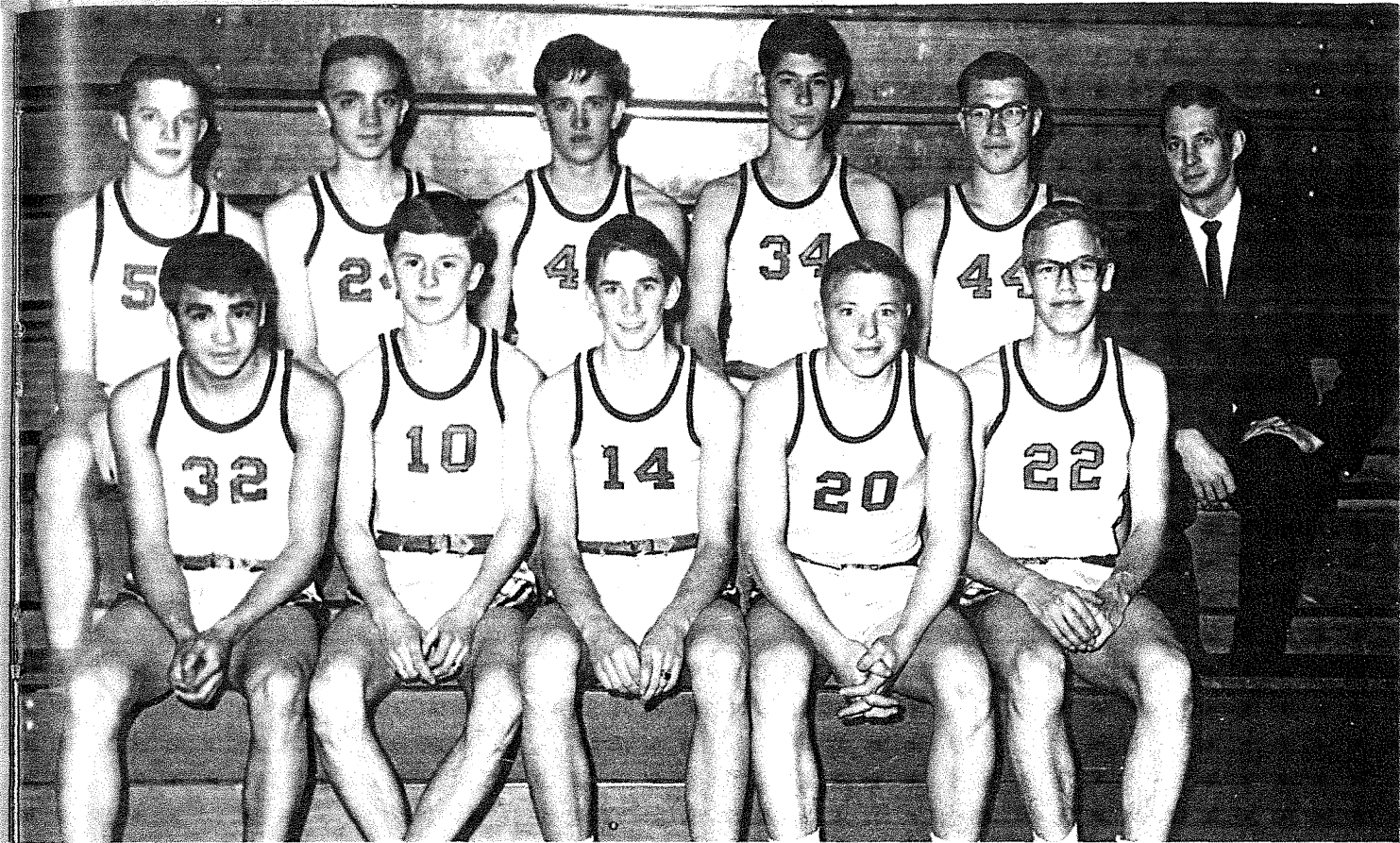
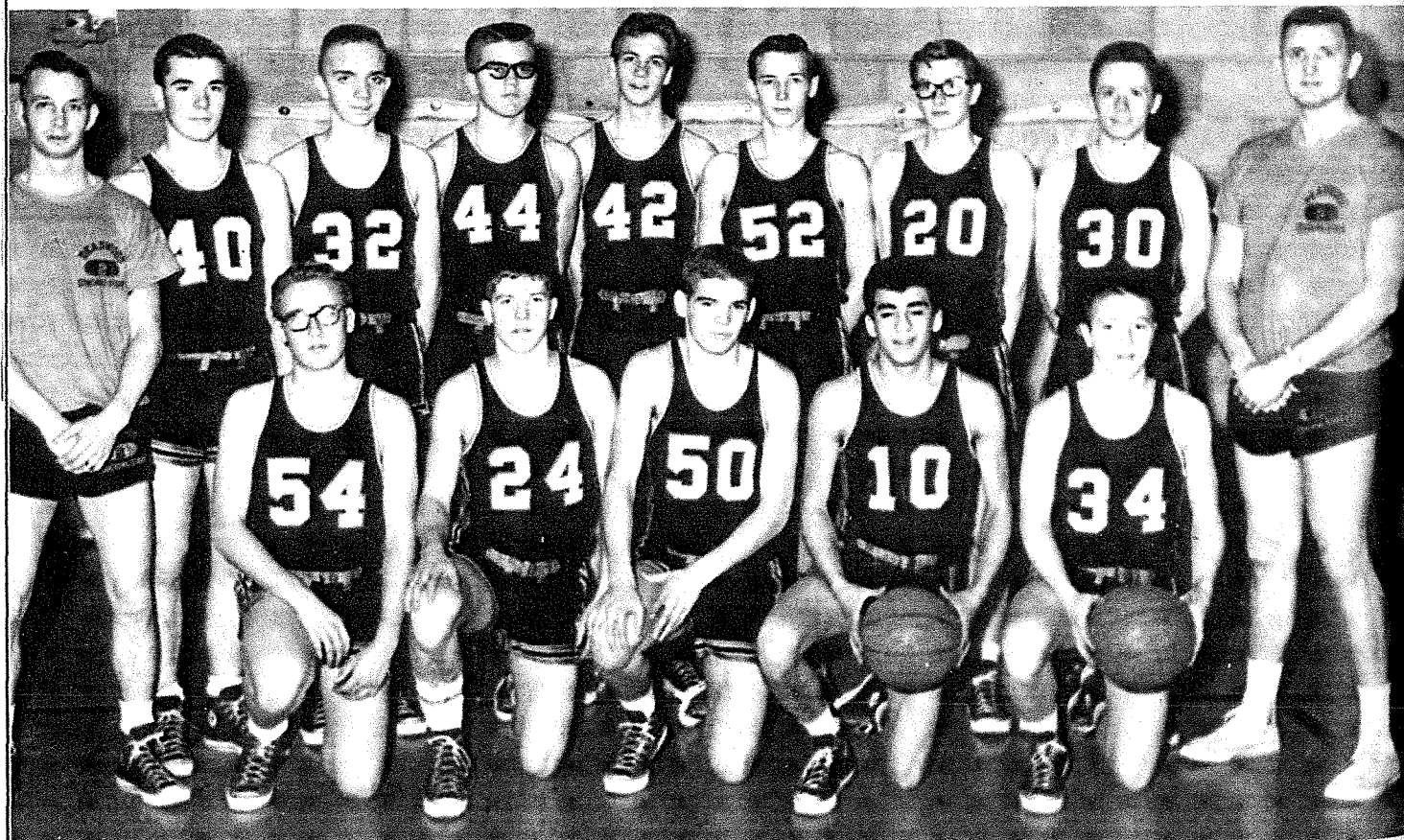
Although the Bears had a discouraging season statistically, they had many exciting games. Throughout the season the team displayed good sportsmanship whether they won or lost.

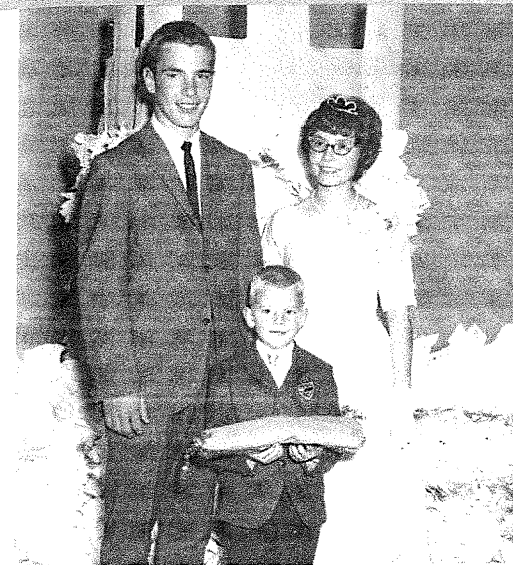

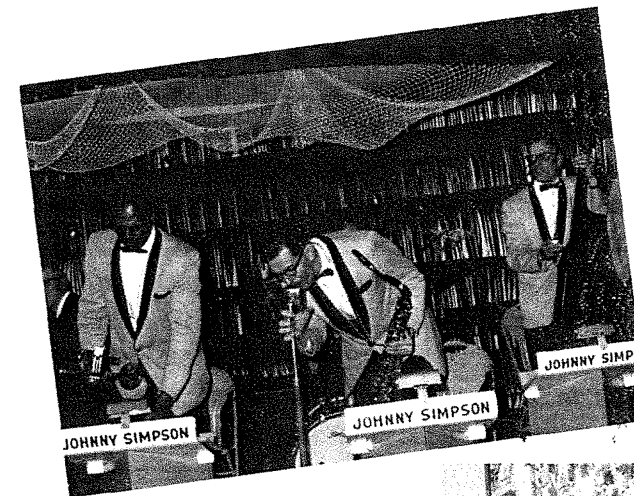
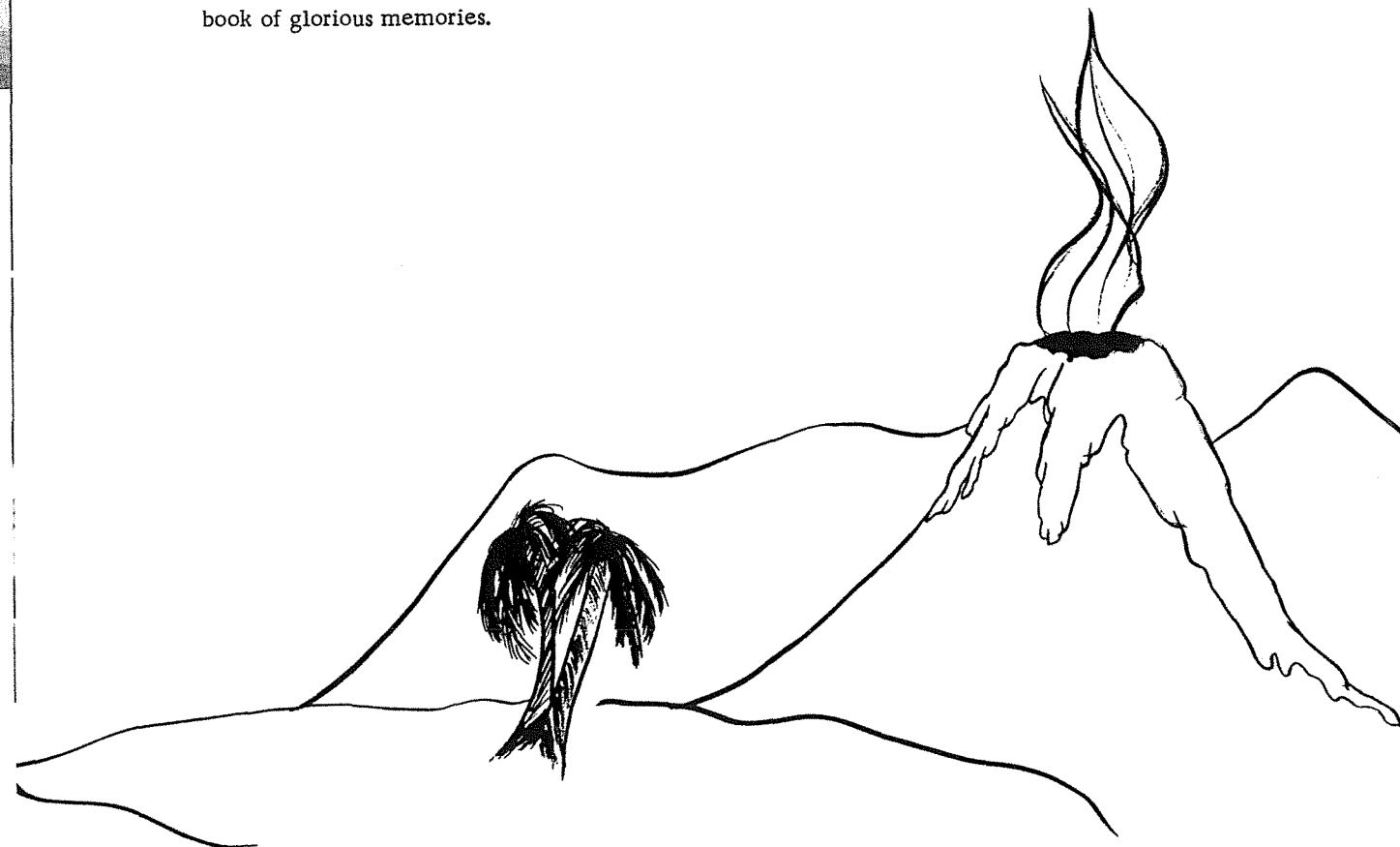
Orchids, the senior class flower, were handed out by Scott Berry, Mike Griffin, senior class president, gave the farewell.

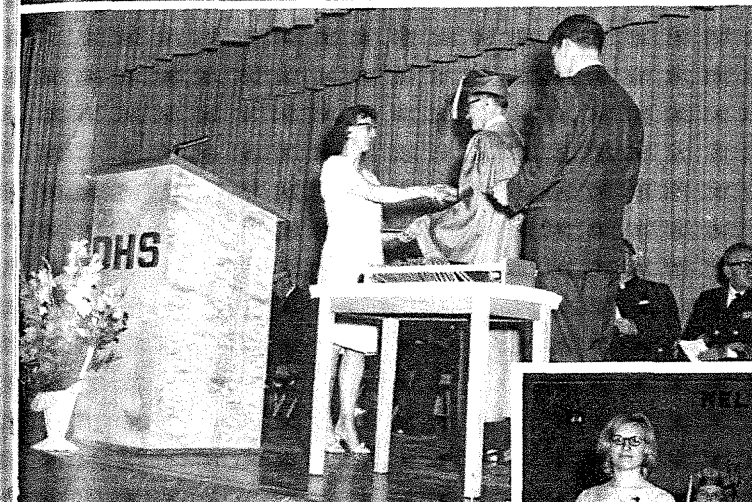
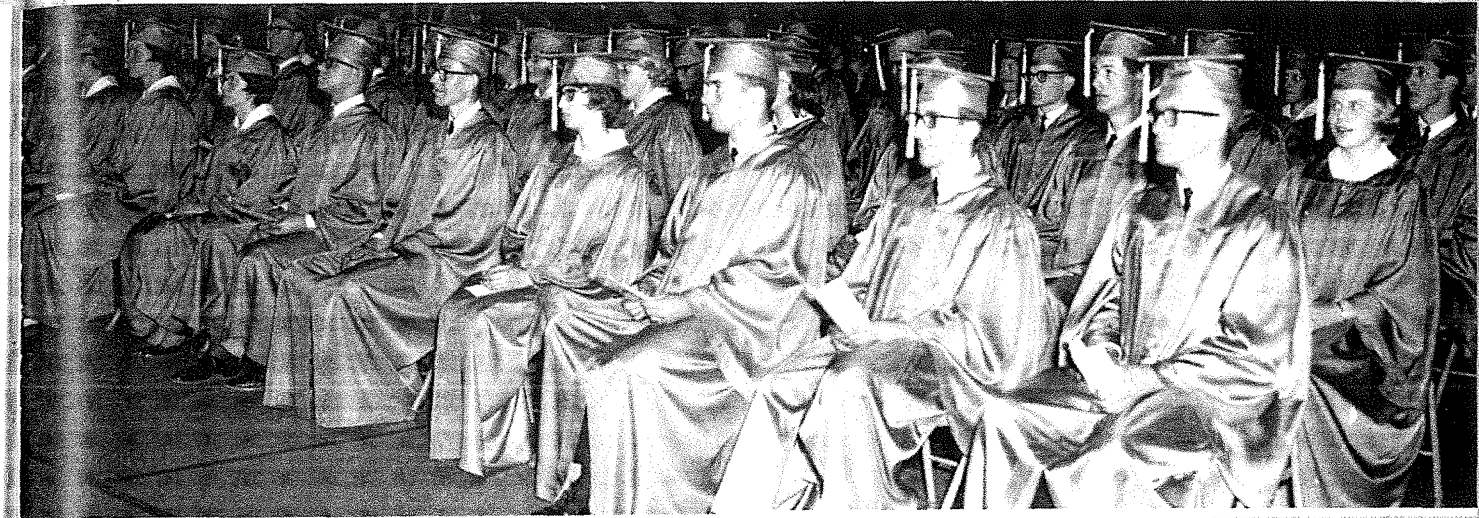
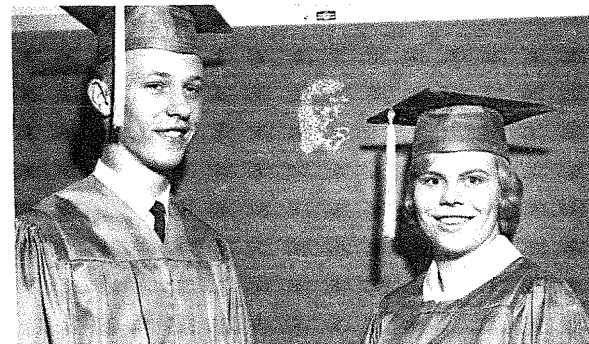

Mrs. James Mattox presented the newly initiated Board of Education scholarship.

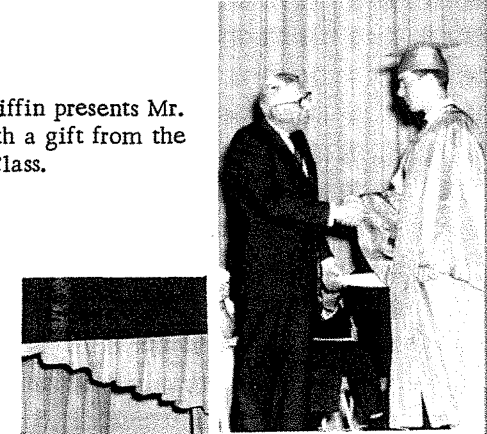
