Again they dropped into their trance, sagging, still unmoving, still with the same blank expression, eyes forever looking up, jaws open, hands white and cold.

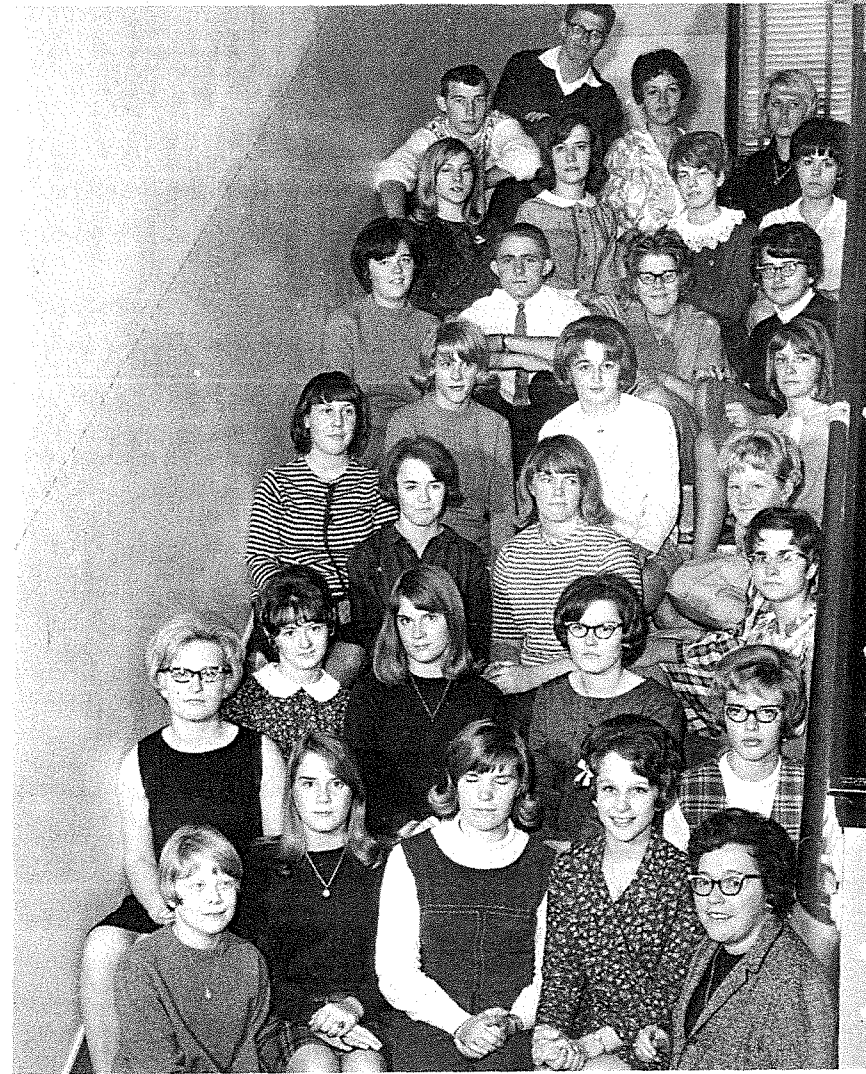

"Let's start at letter D again" is one of the many phrases heard every morning by Mr. Clark, better known as "boss" by band members.

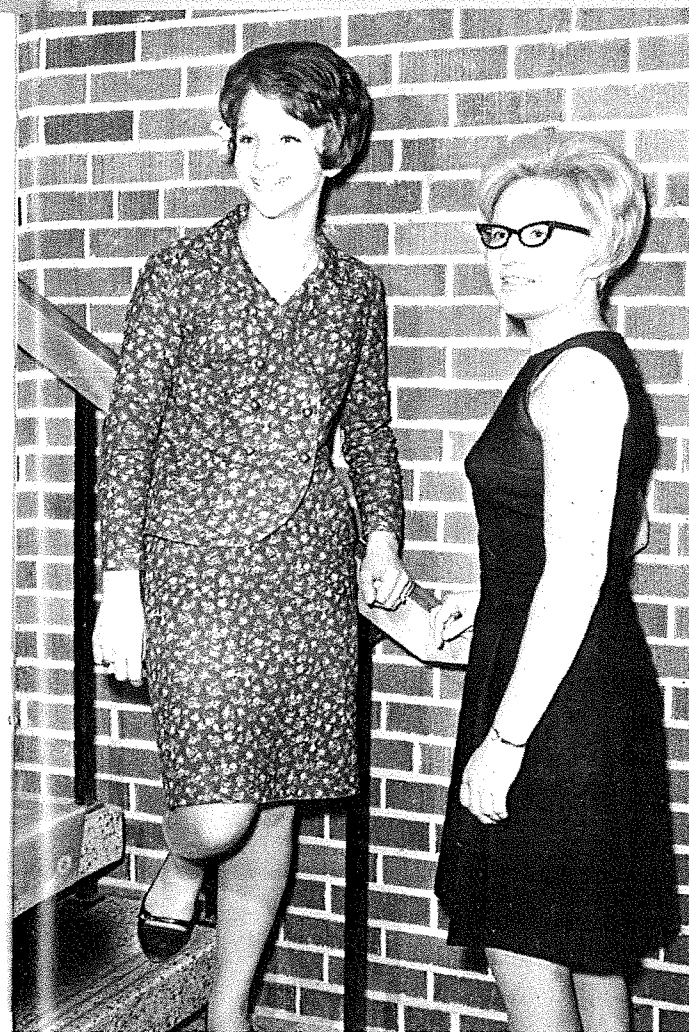
This year the band consists of students from both junior and senior high. Lessons are held once a week after the first 20 minutes of class.

New books accessioned and processed by student librarian helpers include 135 high school library books and 414 elementary library books. All books were purchased under Title II of the National Elementary and Secondary Educational Act through the approval of the South Dakota Department of Public Instruction. Additional library books will be purchased by the Deadwood Public School District.

Remodeling consisted of four double units of library shelving units 6' x 7' providing space for approximately 3,500 volumes of books. Some of this space will be used for magazine files that the student body uses for research.

Books were washed with detergents, cleaned inside where necessary and edges sanded for appearance and sanitation purposes. Also, new author cards, new pockets were added where necessary, and new lettering and classification numbers were placed on the book spines.

Additional storage for audiovisual materials, possible programmed learning files, and library supplies storage space is being planned.

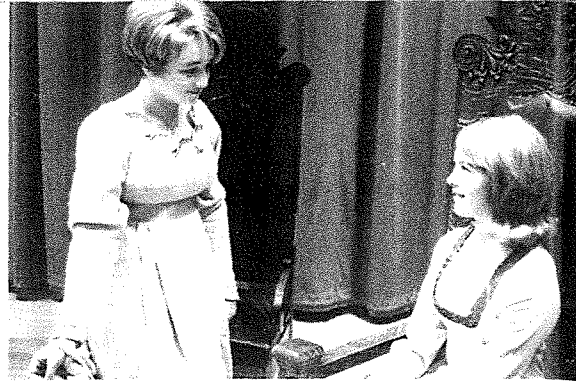

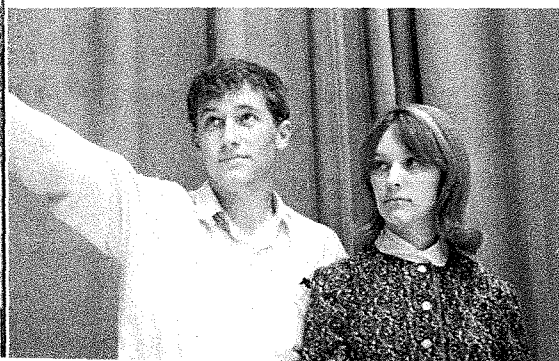

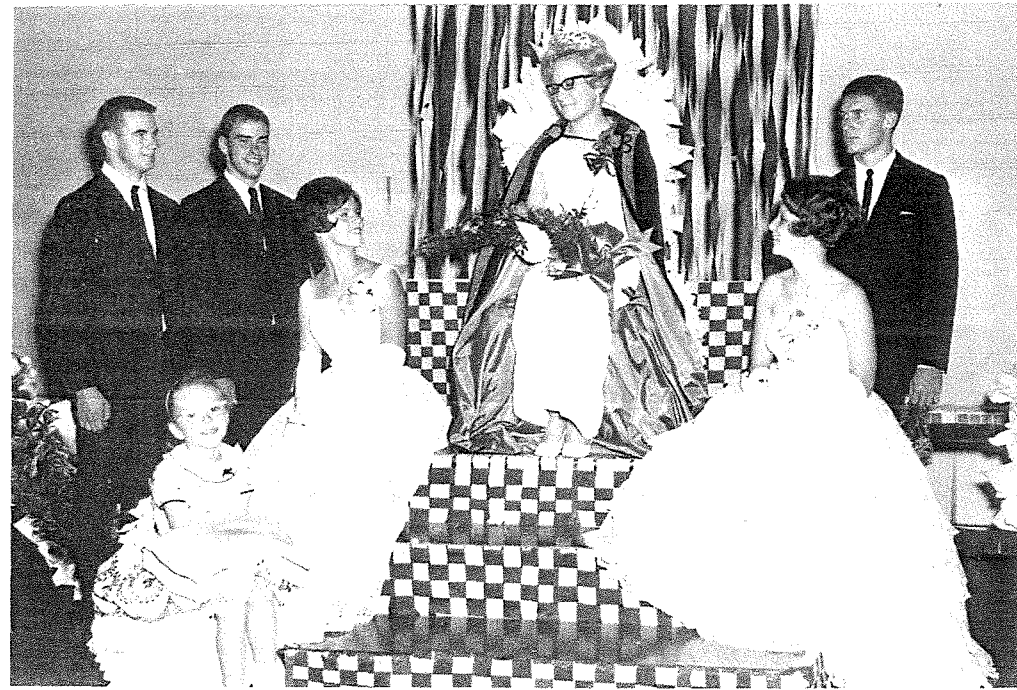

Queen Mary was then crowned by her escort and led up the steps to her throne. There, the thirty-second annual Bear Day Queen was presented with her royal orange and black cloak.

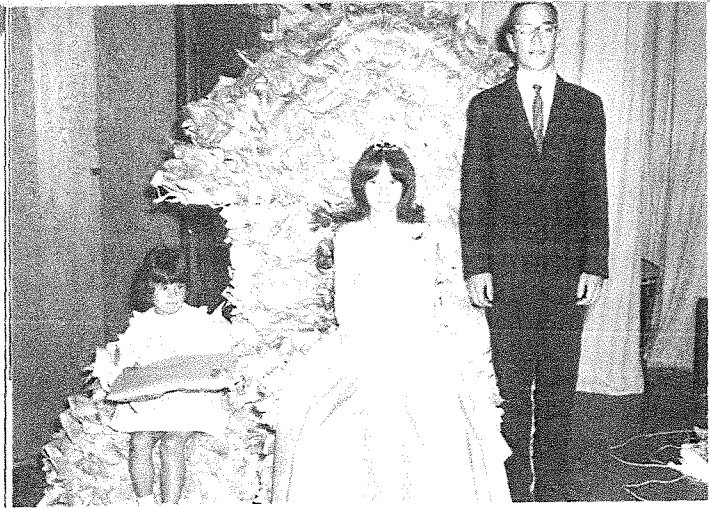

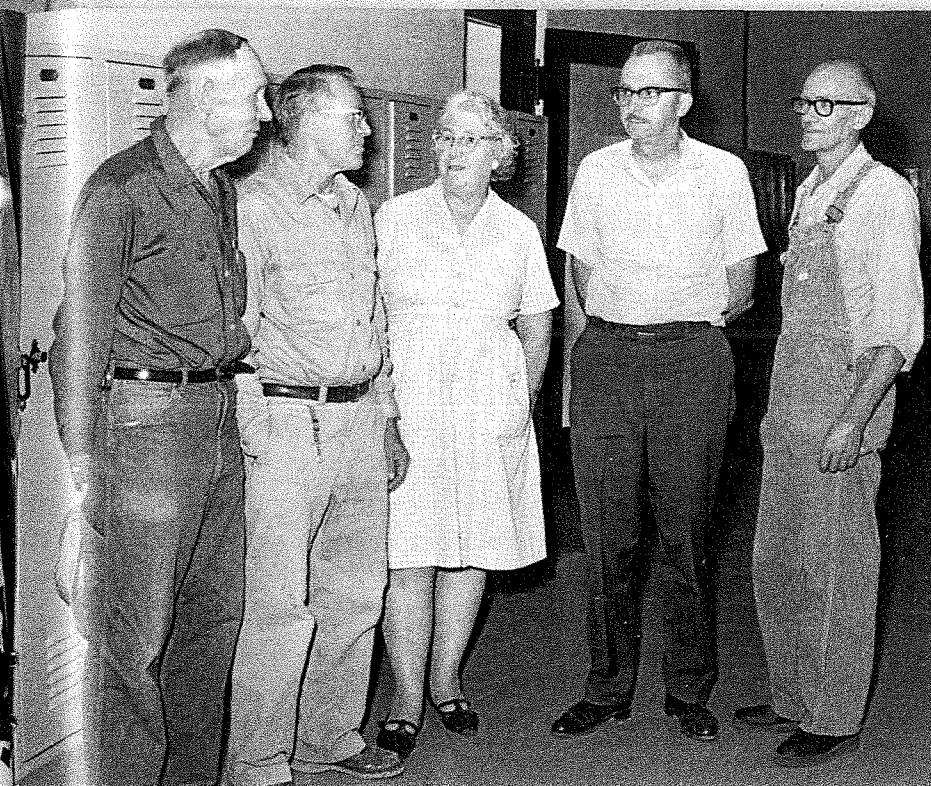
When these students started out they were overjoyed with the idea of being old enough to be able to go to school and to ride in the very impressive "big yellow bus."

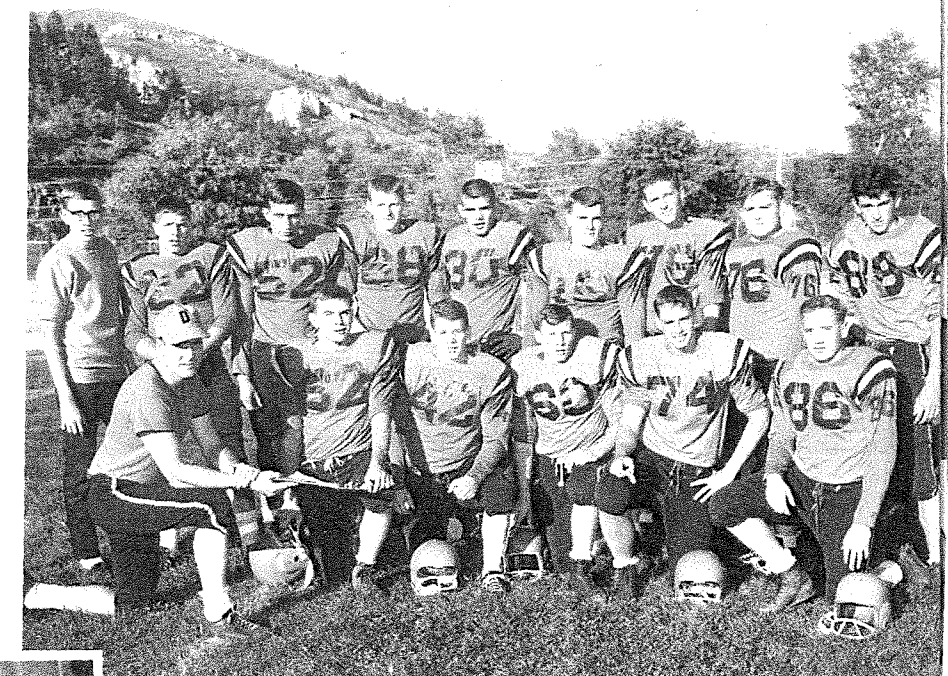
## Bears Have Successful Season
