# Administration Guides Students



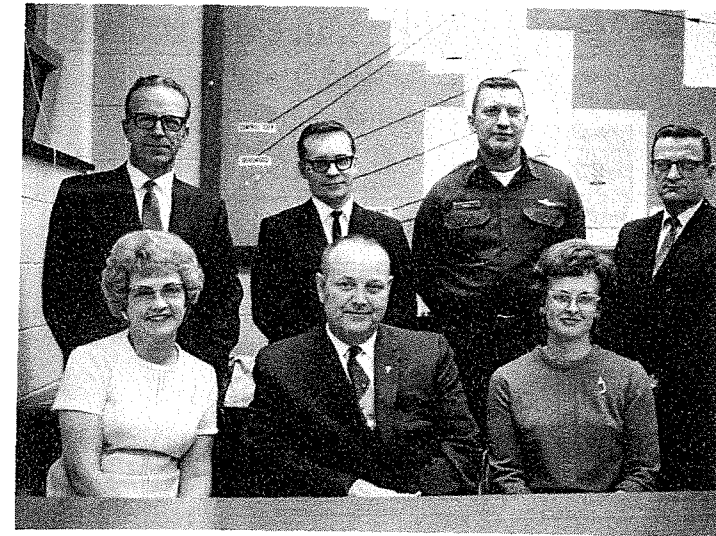
Robert D. Wright, High School Principal

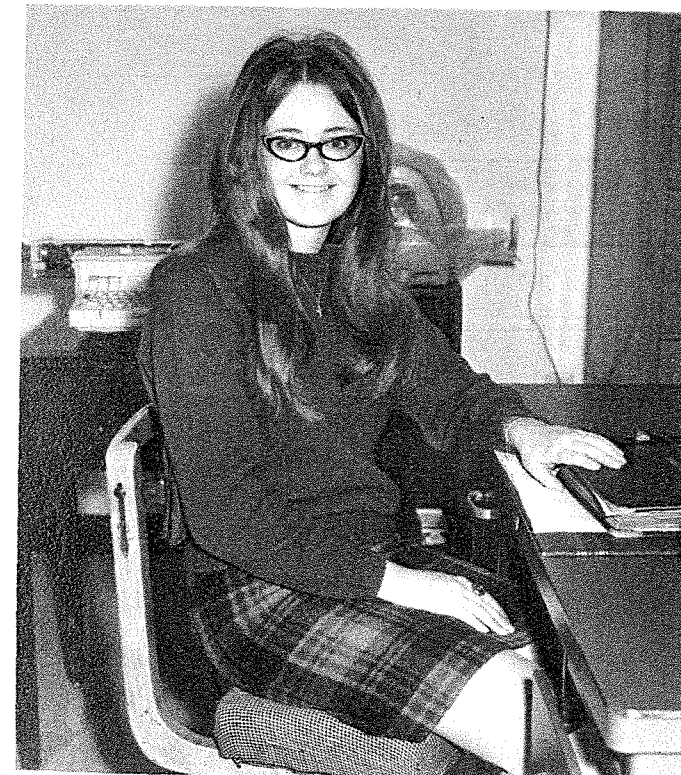

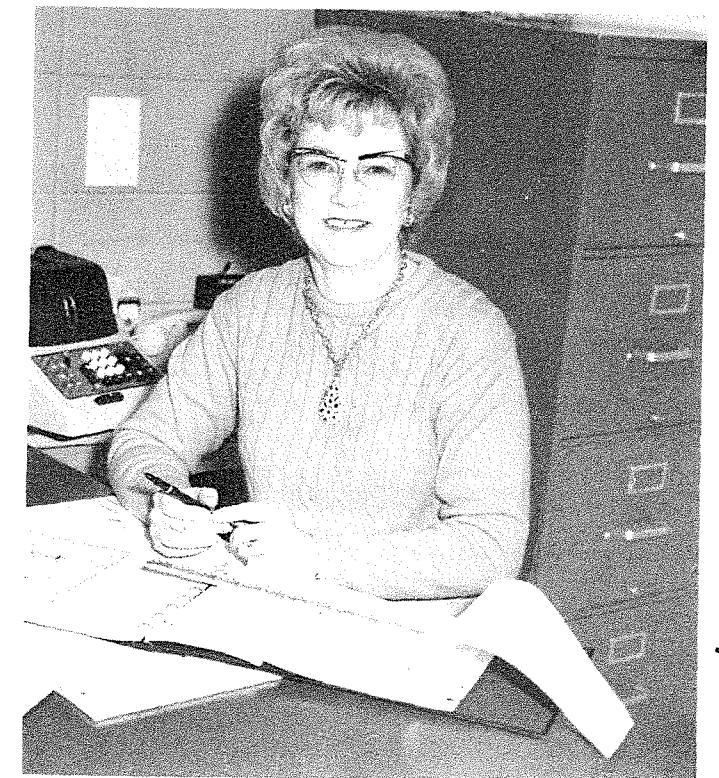

Approximately half of the faculty were graduates of Black Hills State College, Spearfish, South Dakota.

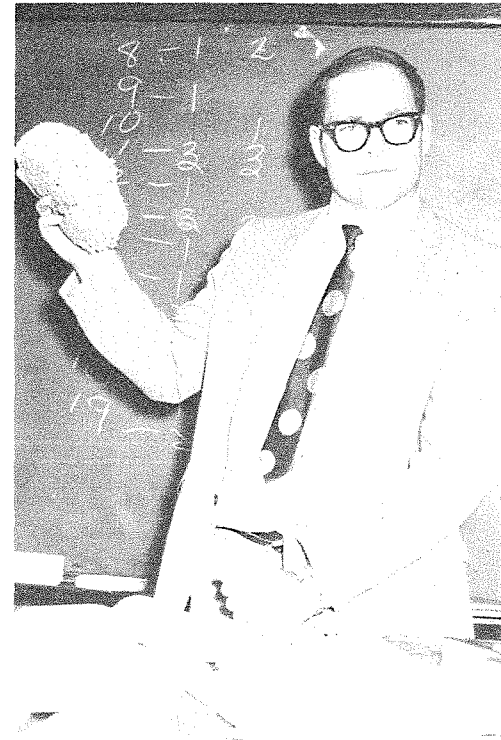

Appreciation is extended to those people who made it possible for Deadwood High School students to have hearty meals, a clean school of which to be proud, and transportation to and from school activities.

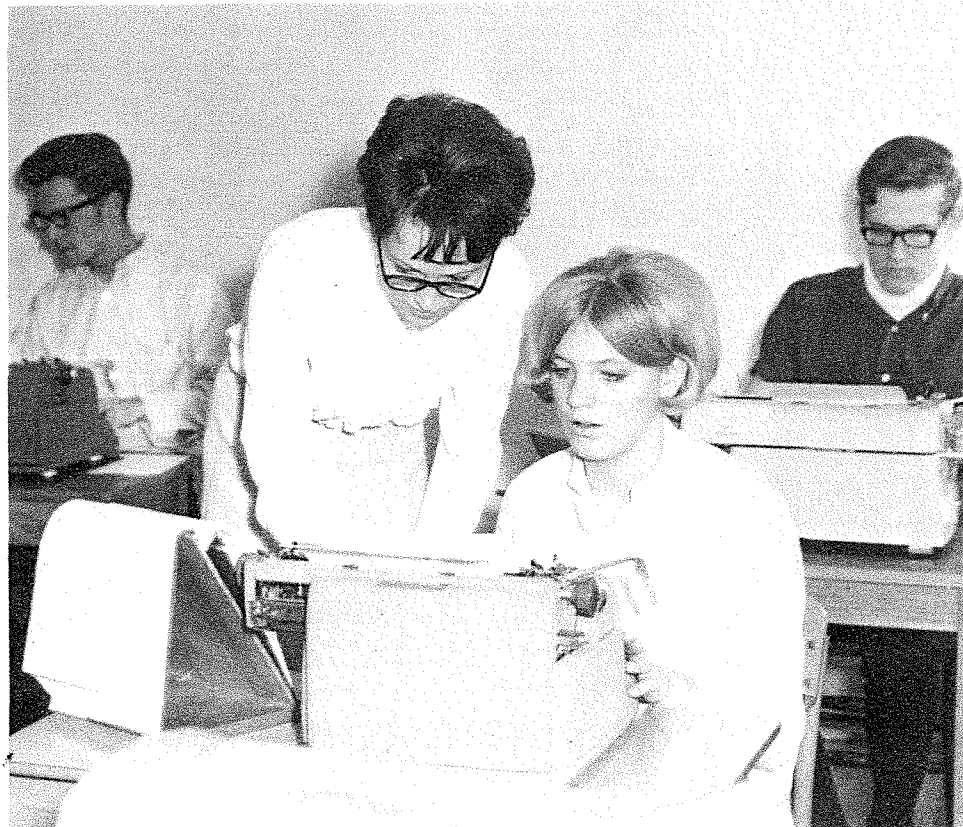

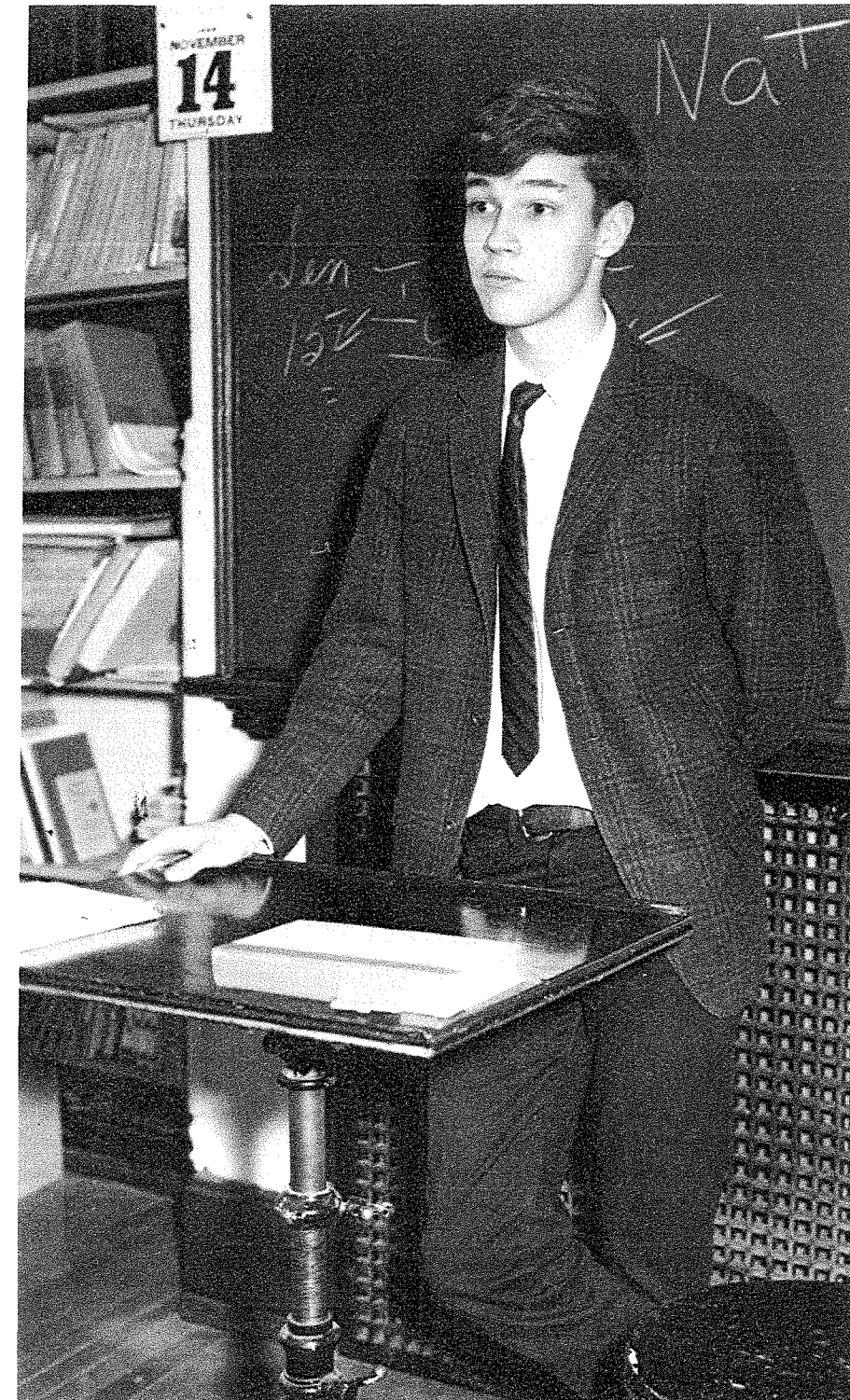

Curriculum is a big word but its definition is easy. The set of courses you take is your curriculum. Deadwood offers a wide range of studies for its students and for every course there's a taker. These courses range from physics and modern introductory analysis to general business and typing. Many subjects only run for one semester and half a credit is given for each one completed with a passing grade.



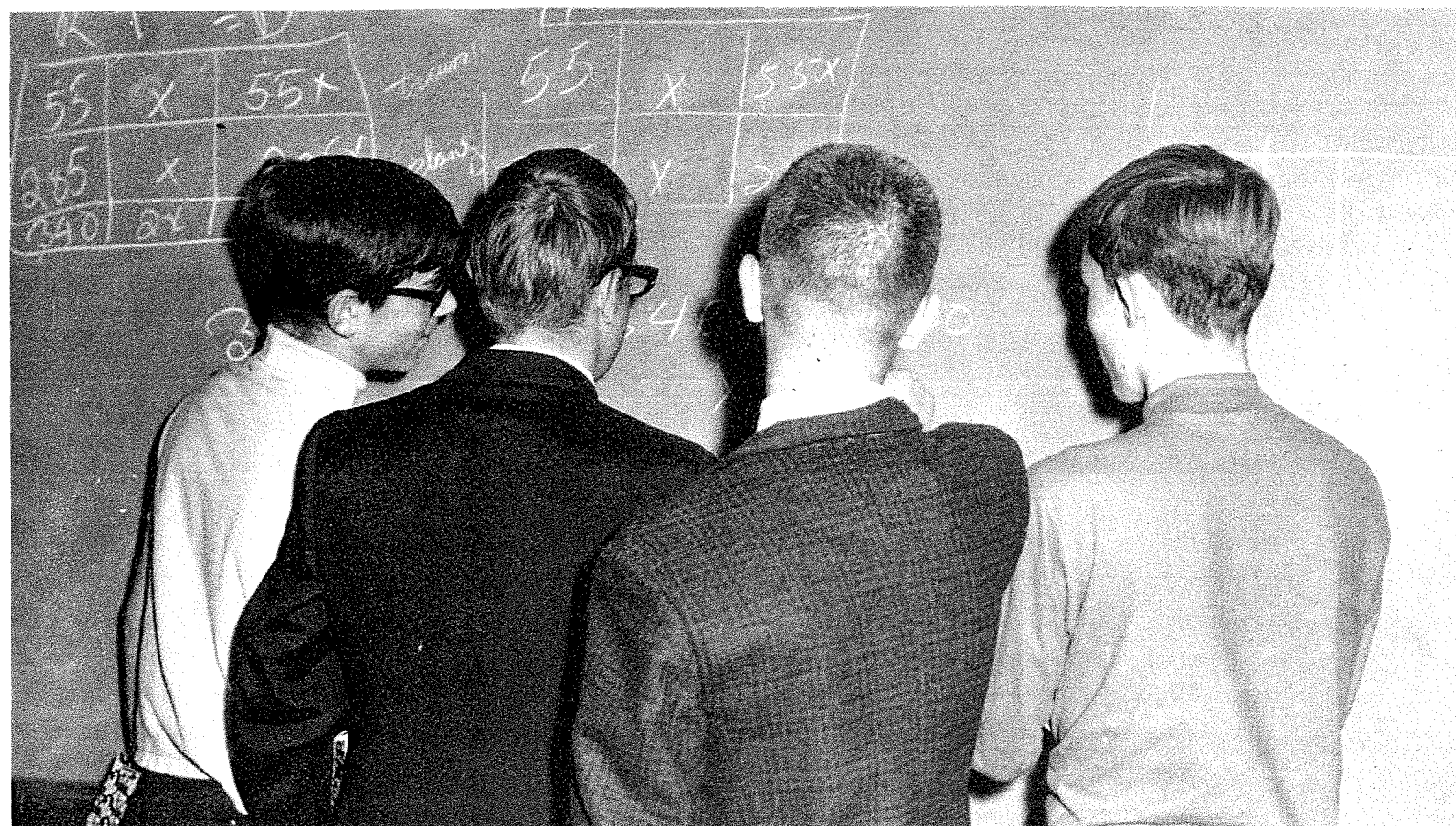

This might be an under-the-breath comment from a biology class member on a typical dissection day.

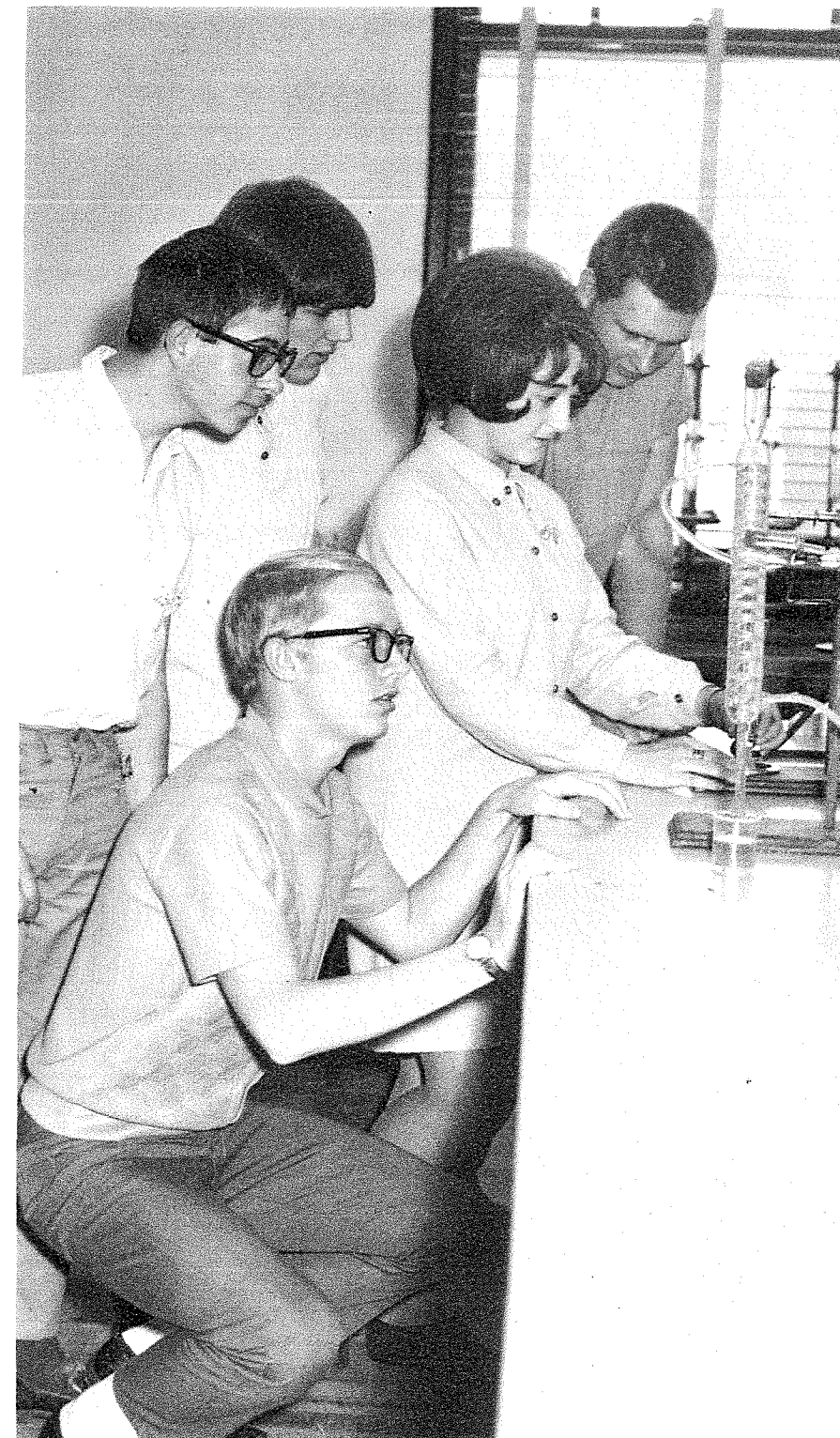
But more often than not, you'll find the science and math students working hard to learn what the courses have to offer them. All the branches of science and math attempt to give the student the basics and later the more advanced principles of scientific and mathematical knowledge.

General science students concentrated on gaining a basic knowledge of nature while biology students studied the function of plant and animal life. Chemistry students learned about the chemical composition of matter while physics students studied the laws governing matter and energy.

In the math classes where "There is only one right answer," algebra was the only required course. The more advanced and difficult math courses are recommended to students with special ability in those areas. These courses included geometry, advanced algebra, and senior math.

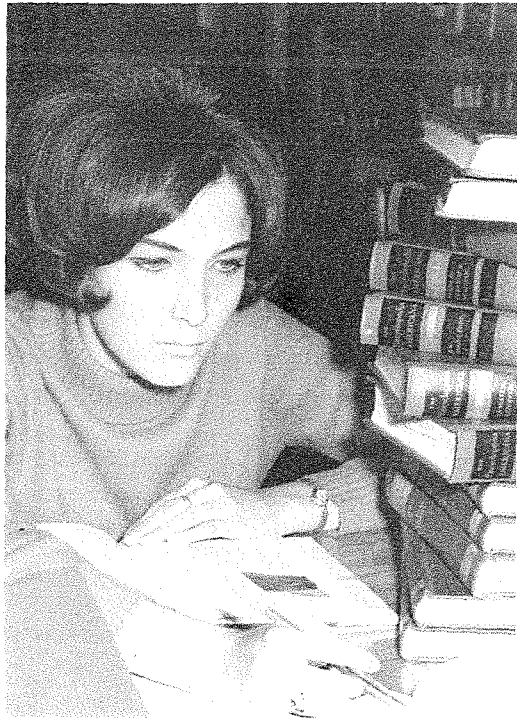

# Literature Germinates Thought



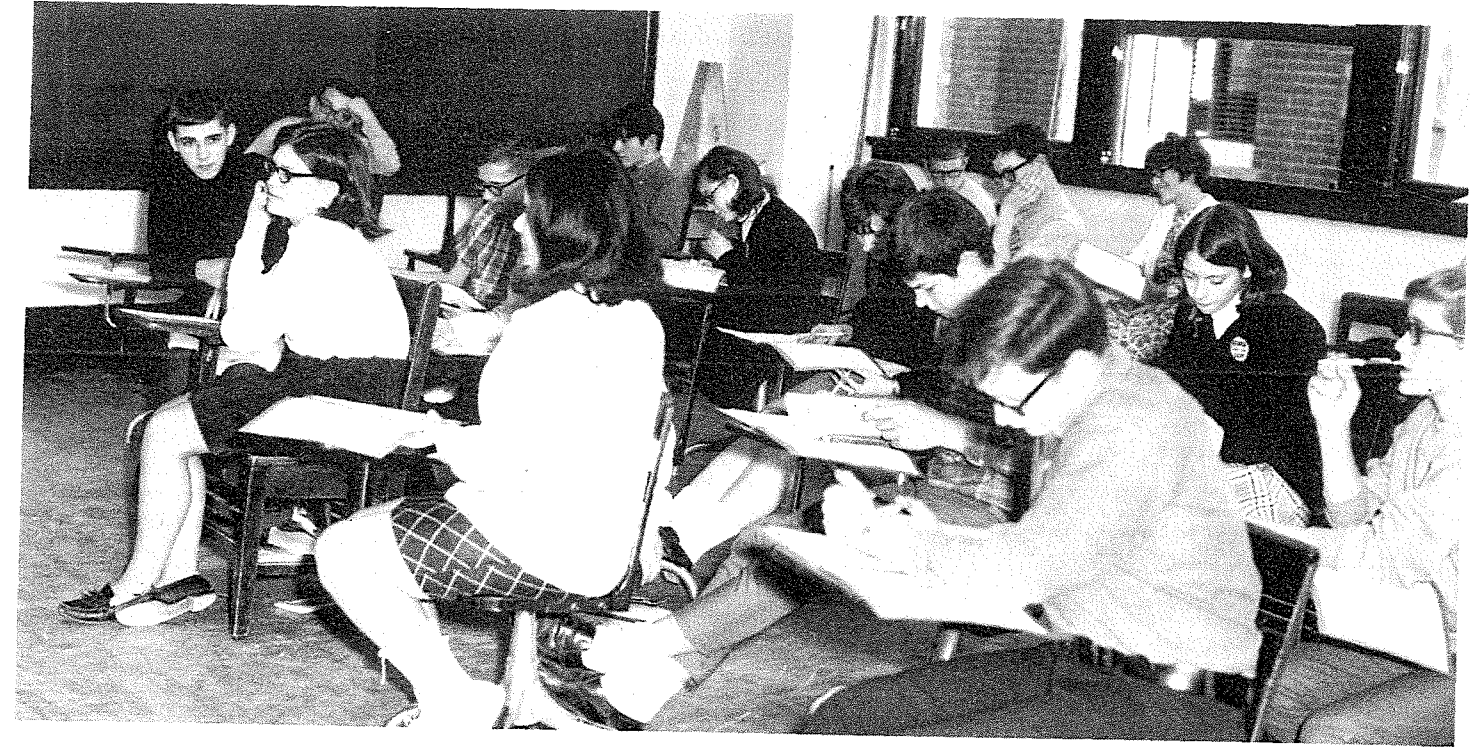
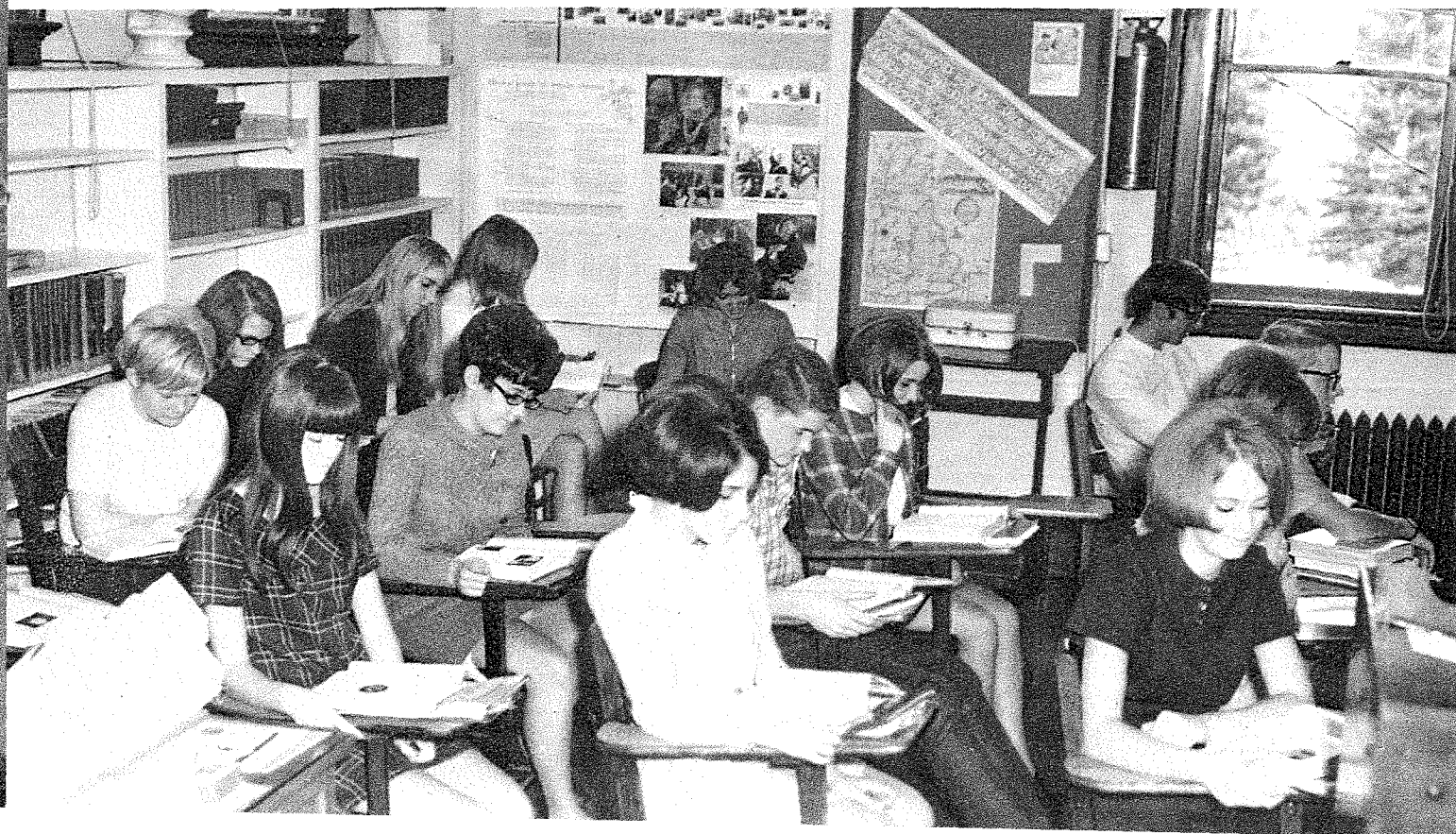

Speech, journalism, French, and English classes at Deadwood High School helped DHS students in the language department.

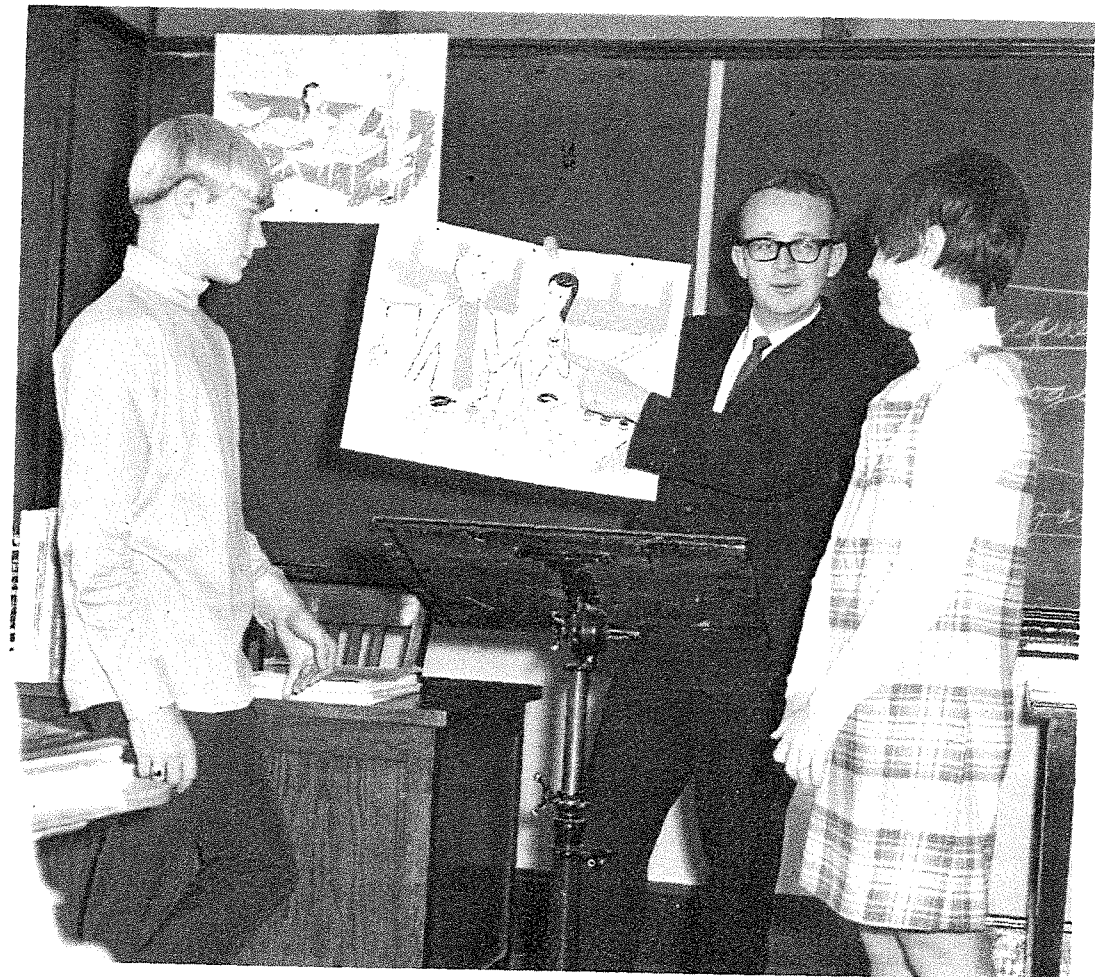
French classes offered students an opportunity to study a different language, country, and culture, while English classes studied grammar and various types of English, American, and world literature.

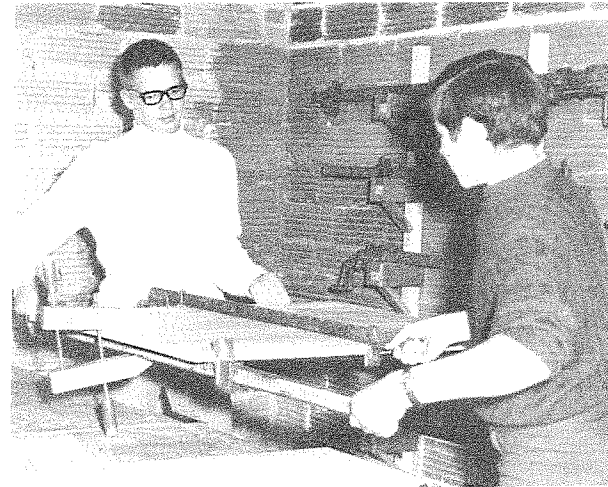
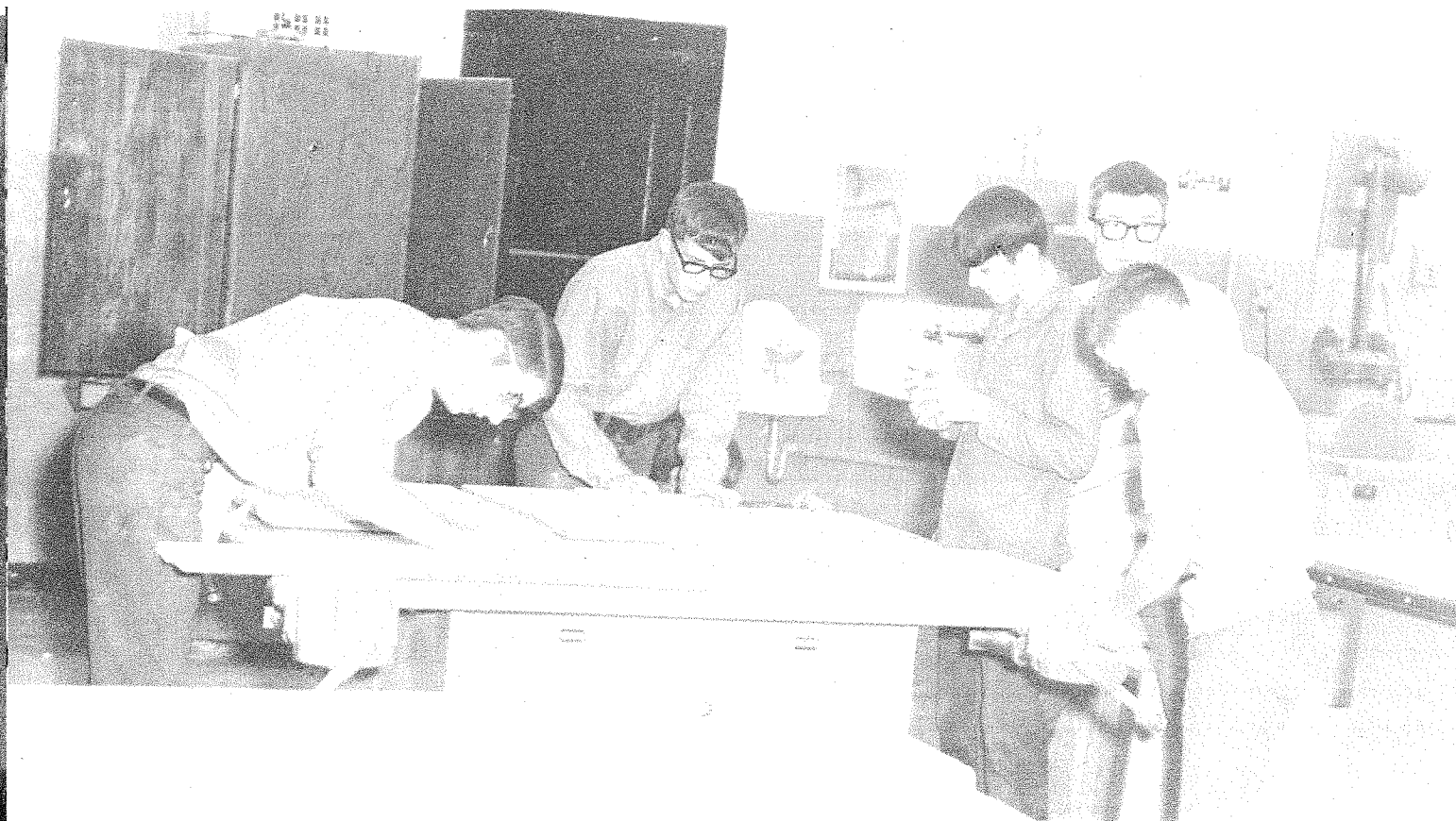

## Acquired Skills Bridge Gap to Future

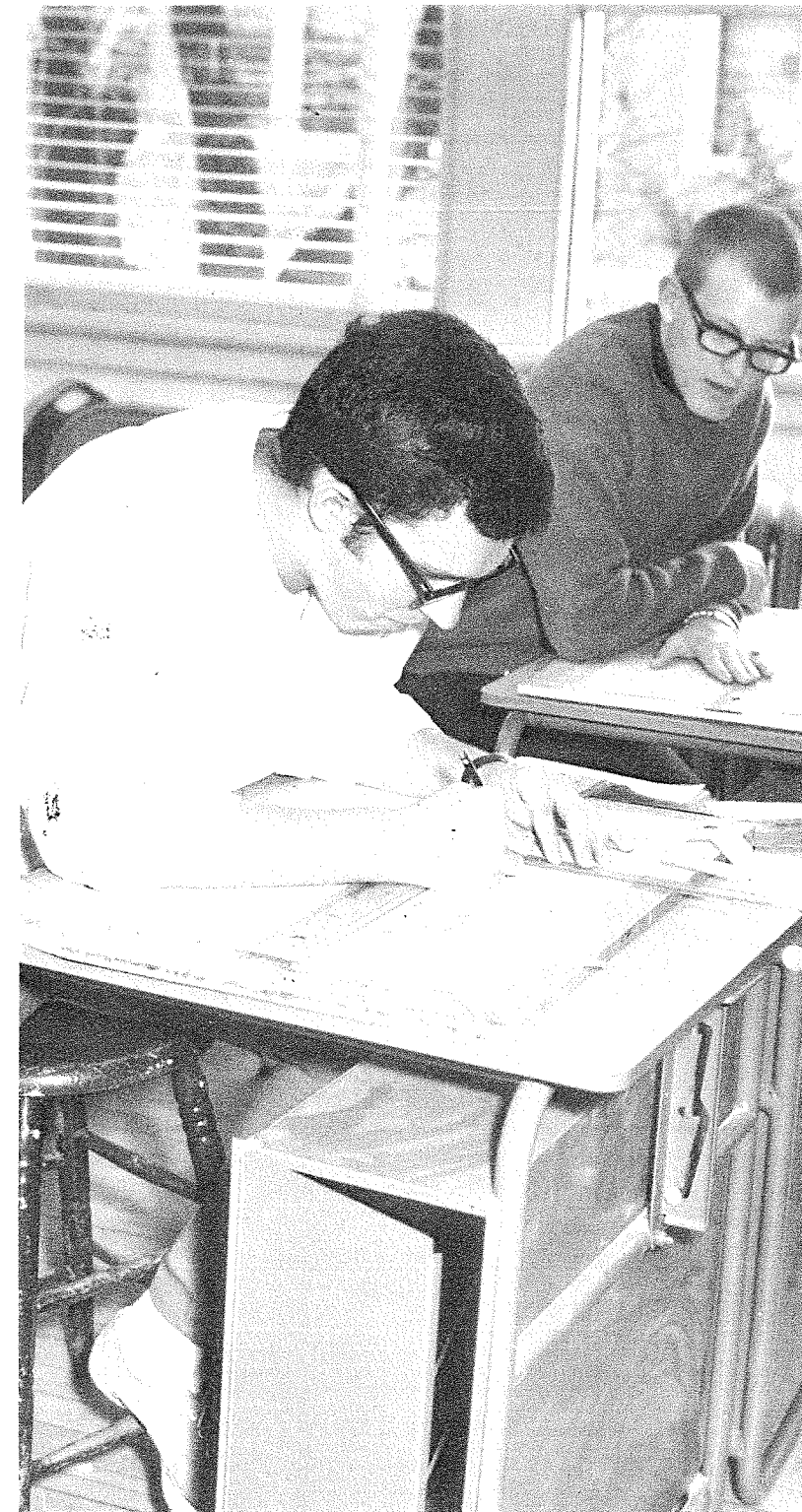
"I can't get these sleeves on right!"

Such were the complaints coming from the home economics classes. Girls were involved in sewing, cooking, and areas of family living, such as child development.

Freshmen girls made breakfast, quick breads, and lunches among other things. Making a dress or a two piece outfit out of wool or corduroy was required of the sophomore classes. Students in family living discussed clothing and grooming, home management, insurance, housing, and other related topics.

Cutting boards too short was just one of the many problems in the industrial arts classes. Students could take woodworking courses and mechanical drawing courses. In shop the freshmen first had to make a box and could then progress to other things. Sophomores started with a small project and then advanced to larger projects. Various kinds of cabinets, dressers, and stands could be made as well as other items. Drawing objects of various dimensions was a part of mechanical drawing projects.

In all of these classes, students gained practical skills which they can use in serving their home and their community.

"Nixon is our new President!"

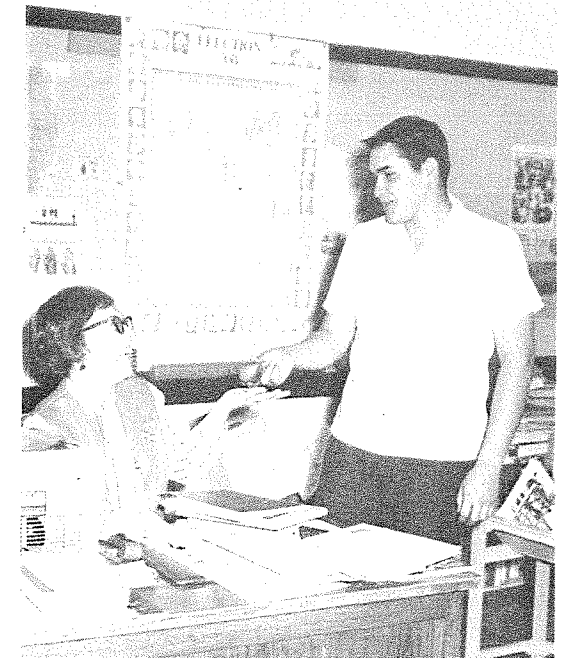

World history classes studied history of the past and history in the making. Students reported to their classes on topics ranging from life in ancient Rome to political figures of the present.

Classes in American history looked into our nation's past, a past containing bravery, from the signing of the Declaration of Independence to man's ventures into outer space; a past containing war, from the Revolutionary to the Cold War; and a past containing happiness, from the first Fourth of July to the annexation of a new state.

Sociology and psychology, corresponding semester courses, studied people as a society and as individuals. Sociology classes studied the society of man, American society as well as foreign cultures. Psychology students received their first formal look at the personalities of individual types of people.

Both classes also heard guest speakers, among them Sheriff McGrath of Lawrence County and Sheriff Best of Pennington County. They explained problems involving crime and drug use as well as possible solutions.

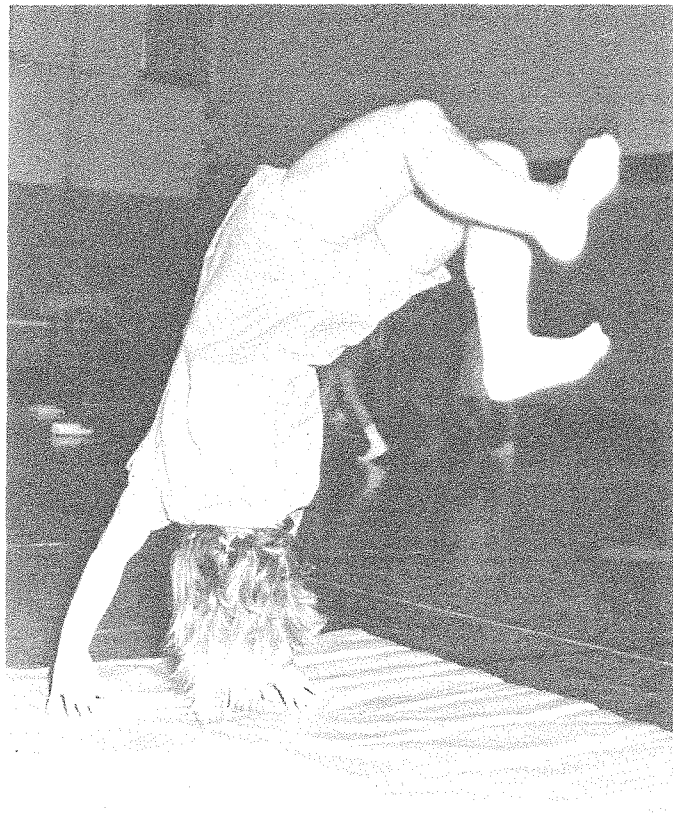

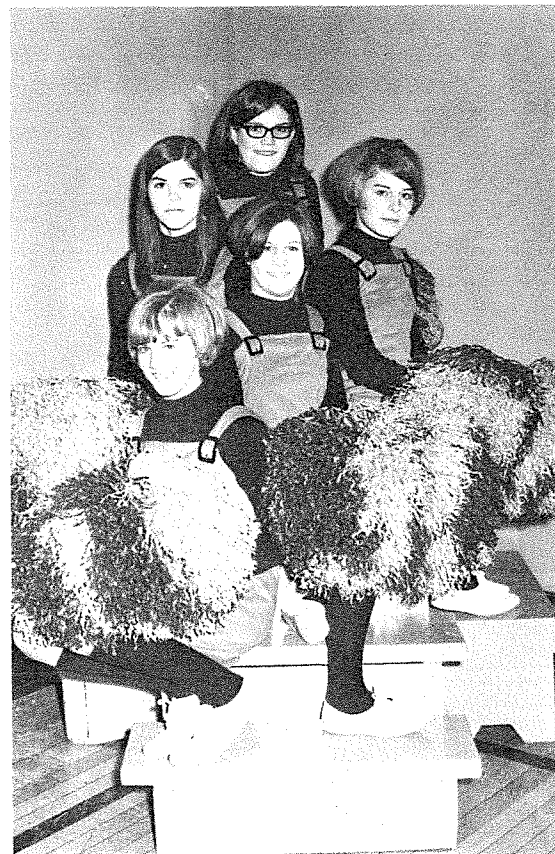

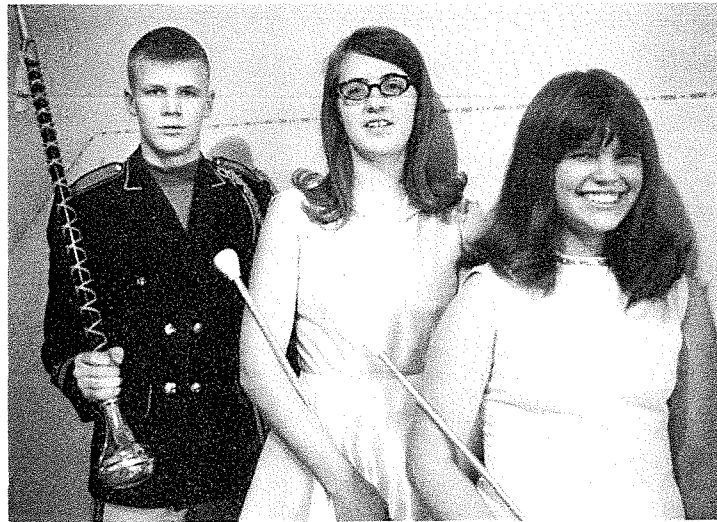

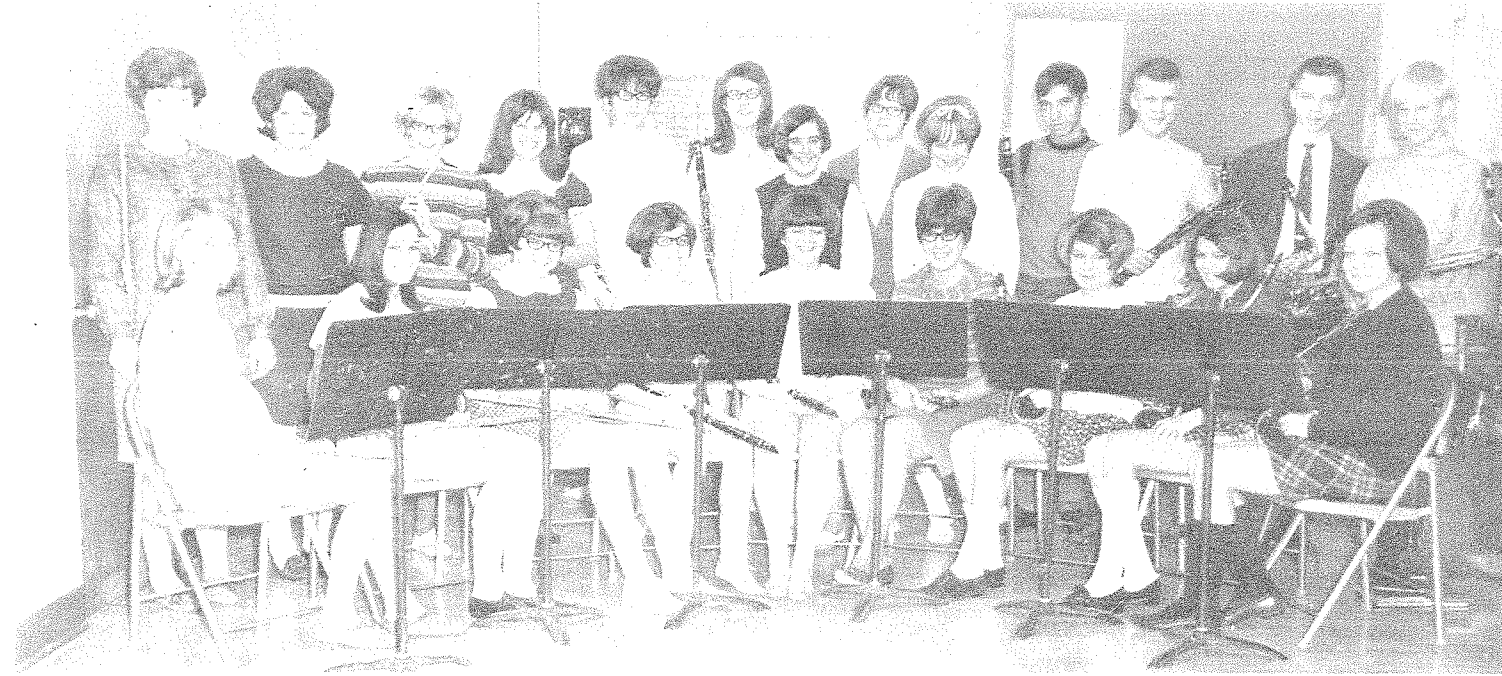

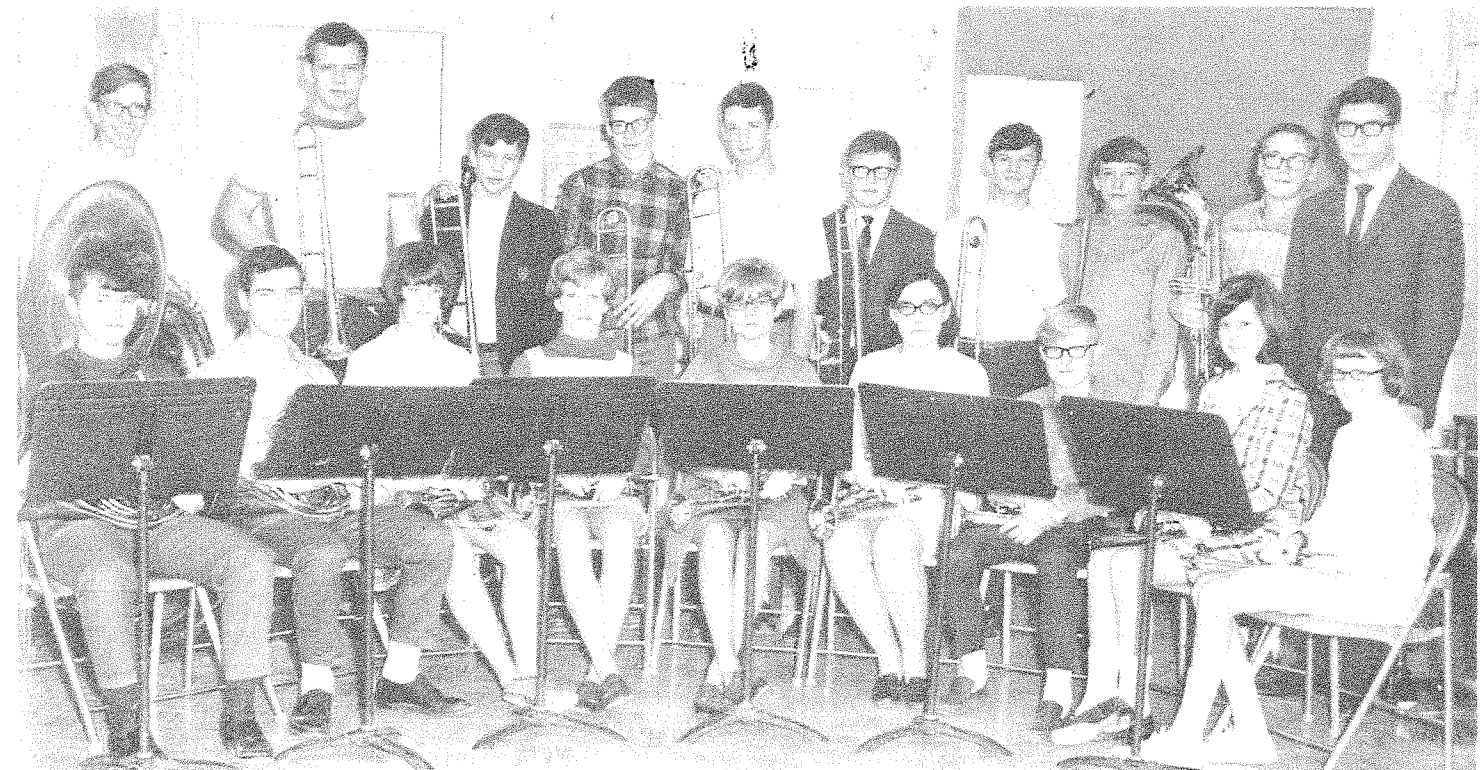
On Bear Day the band marched in the parade and performed during annual half time activities. Pepband played at the other home games.

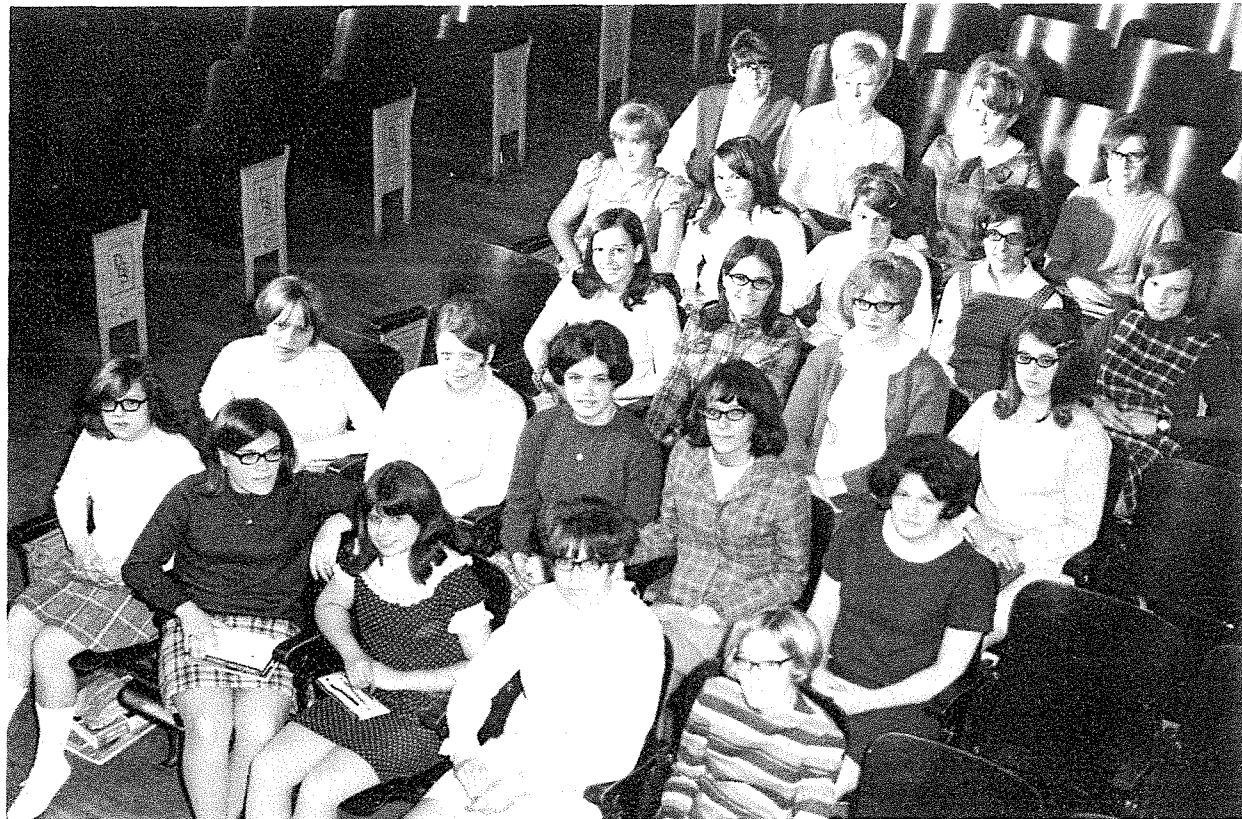

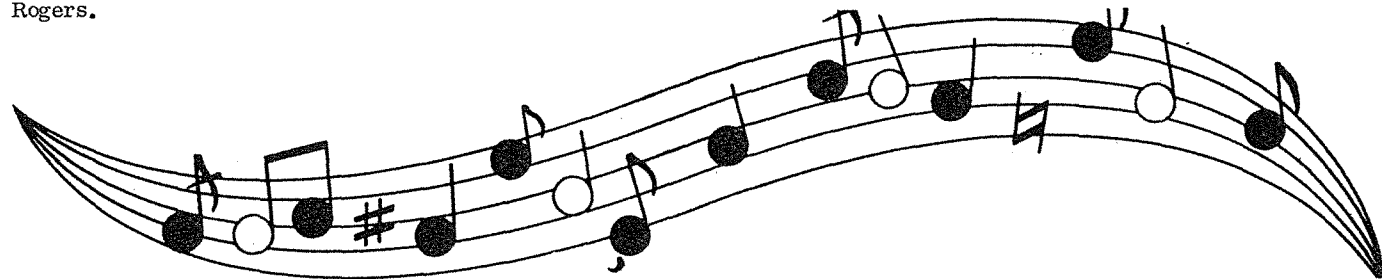

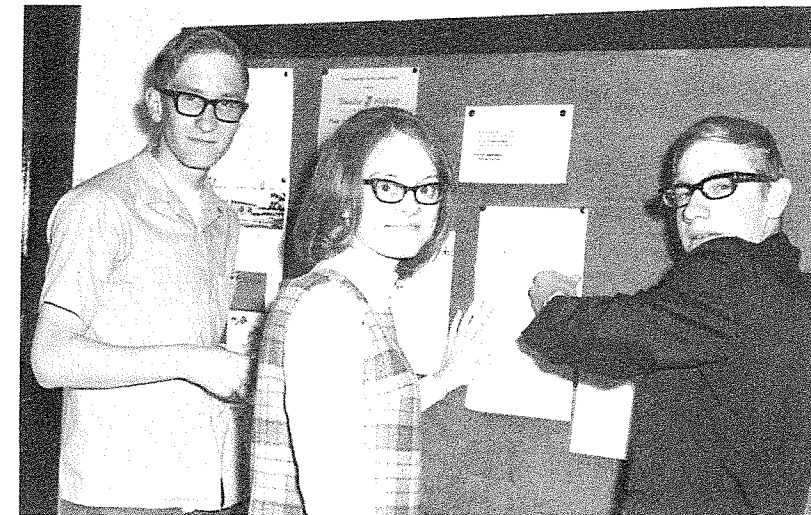
This was the Student Council in action. It worked for the student body, dealing with matters of current interest. They made rulings and guidelines for the student body and sponsored certain projects throughout the year.

## Everything's Coming up French



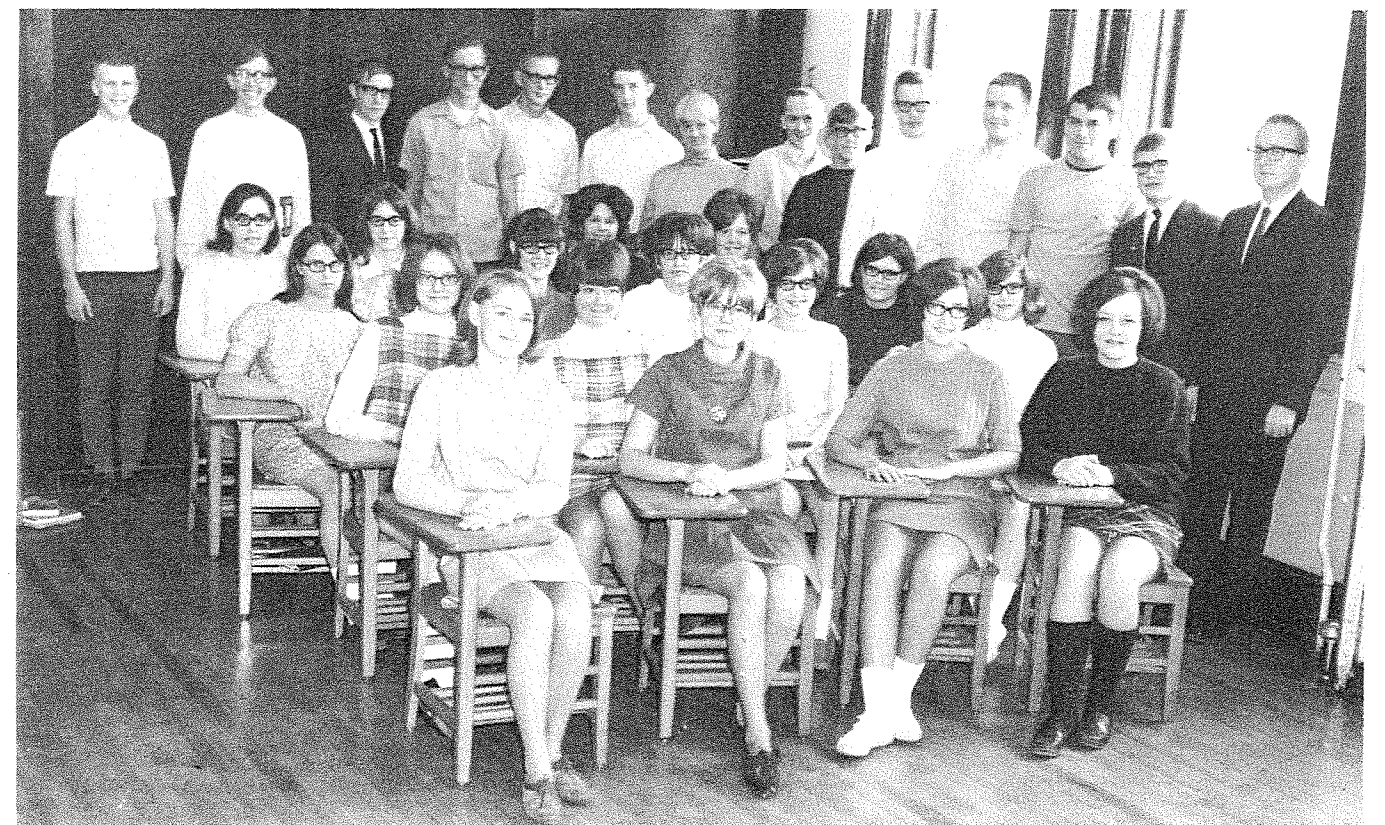

Wanda Simon was editor. Assistant editor was, Debbie Karas, and business manager was Cindy Ells. Mrs. Judy Marcoe was sponsor.

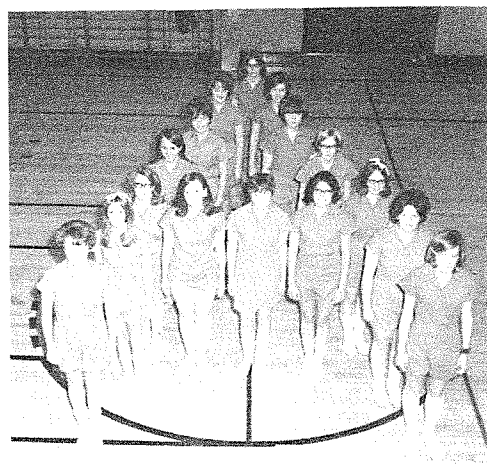
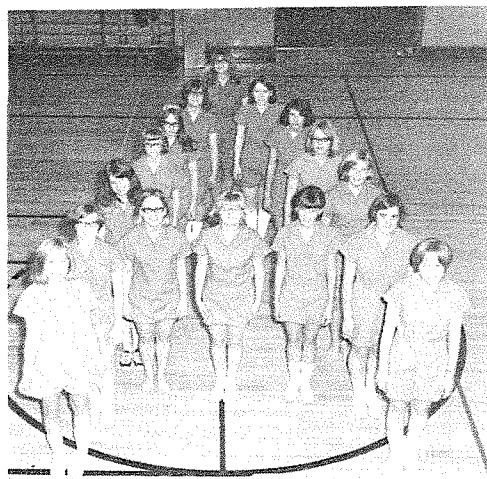

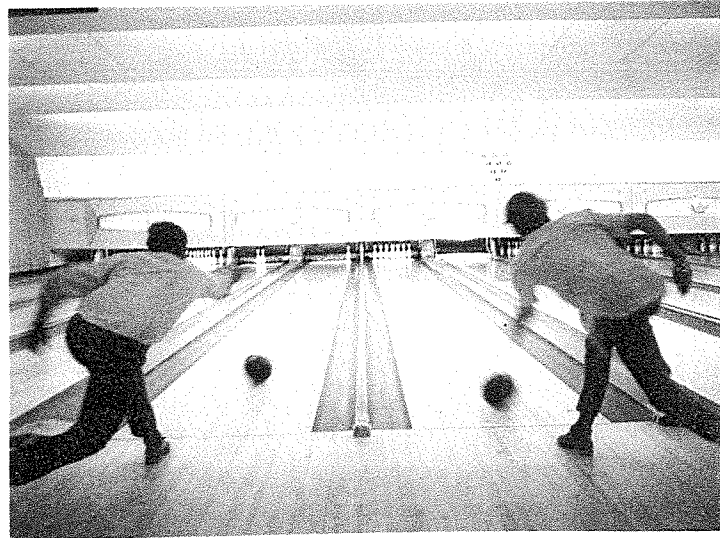
Running the concession stand during the football and basketball games was the main job of the Letterman's Club. Profits collected were used for sports equipment and other needed items.

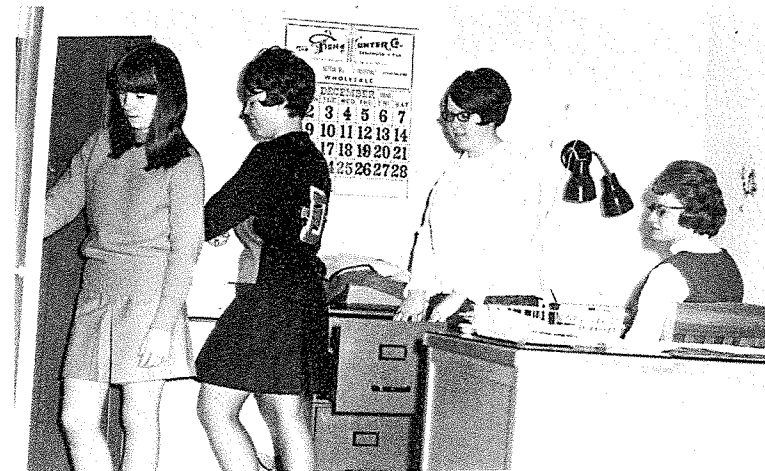

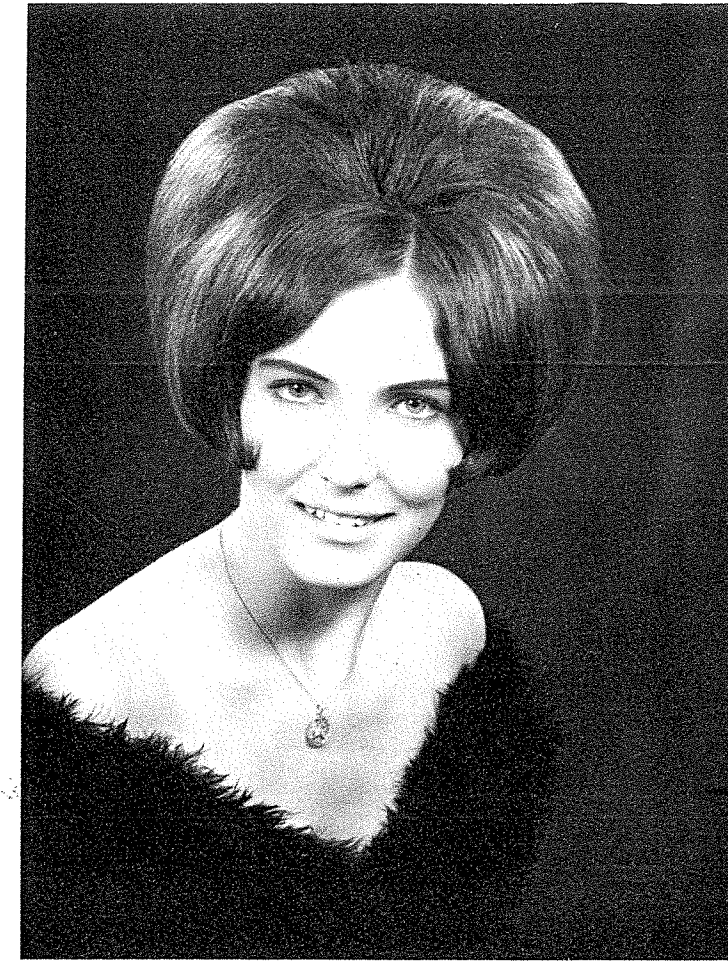

The traditional burning of the "D" was held during the football game. Spirits were dampened, however, by a loss to Douglas. A dance followed the game.

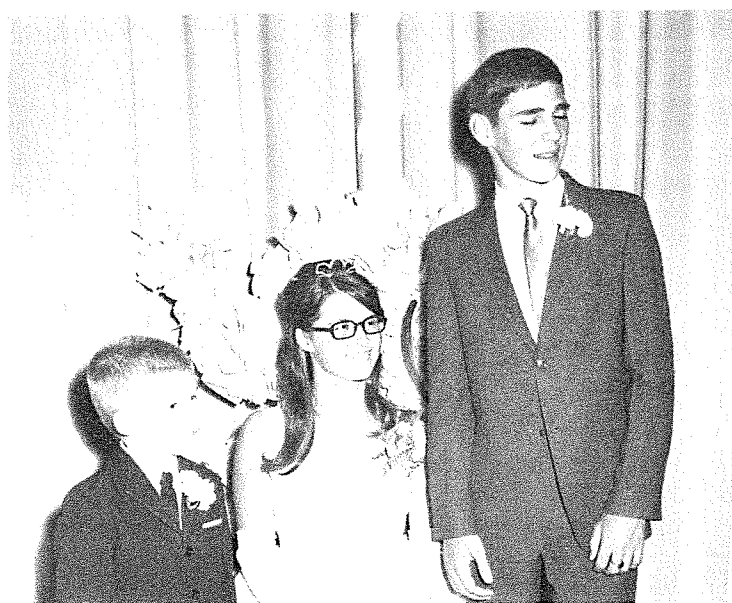

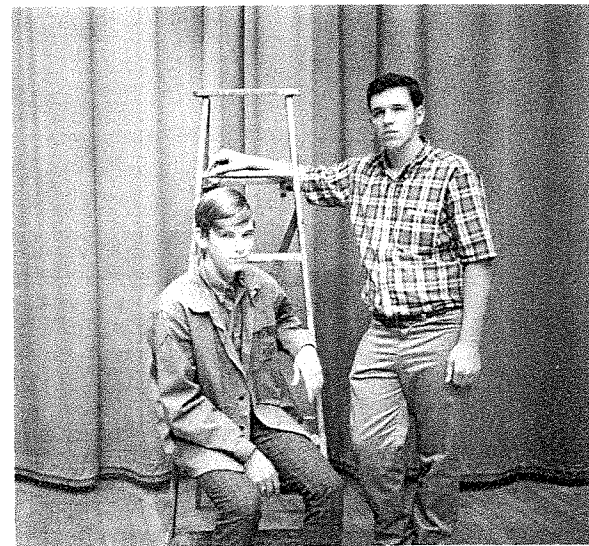

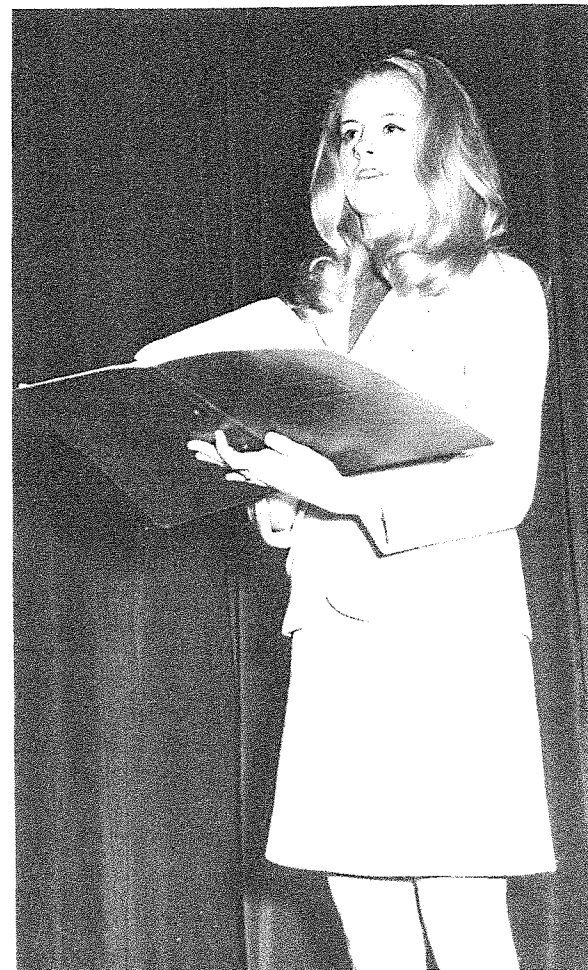

## Bears Dazzle Crowds

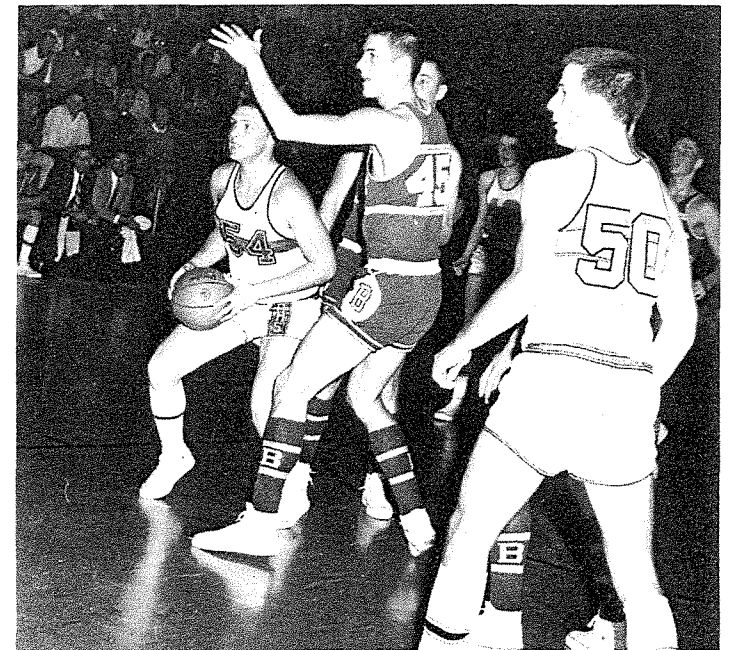
