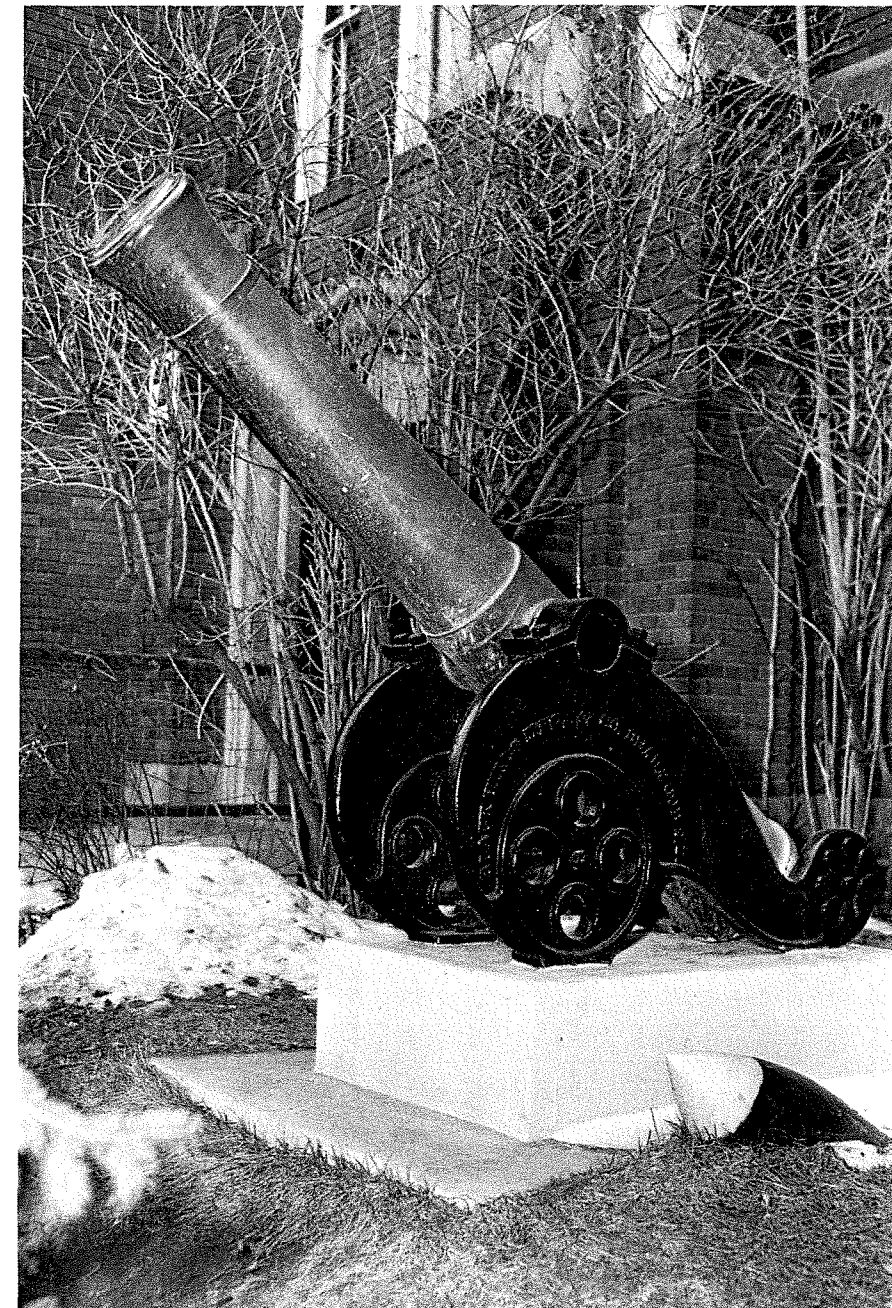

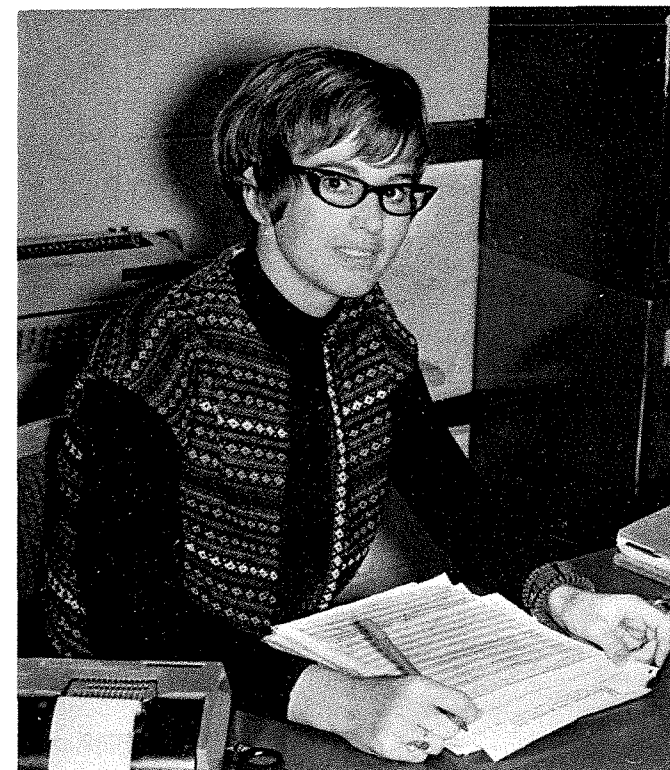

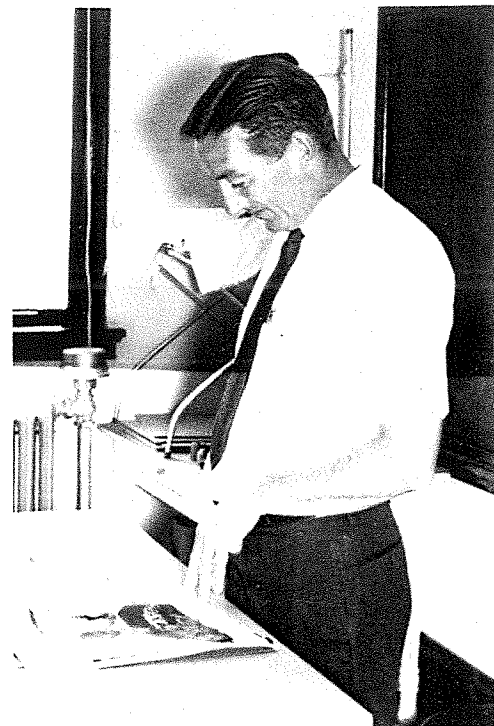


Faculty Promotes Student Learning

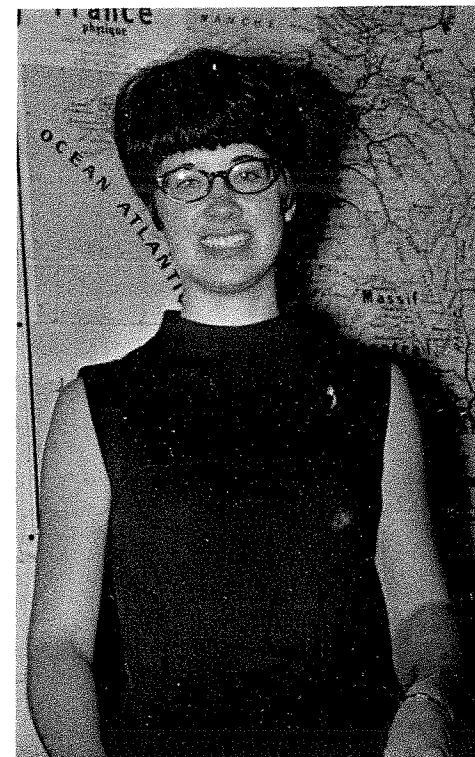

By the end of the year, however, the majority of the faculty had adapted to the conversion which provided new challenges for instructors.

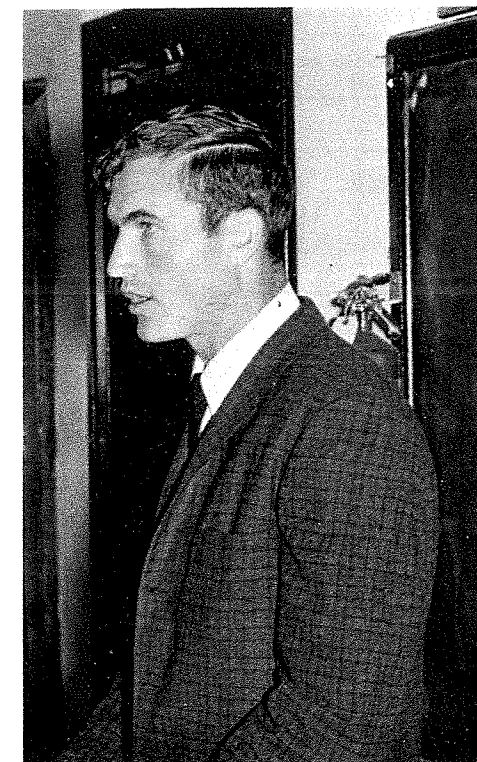

Maynard, Richard Cleveland and Elva Bowling handled the regular bus runs. "Bill" Tribble helped out with extra-duty driving.



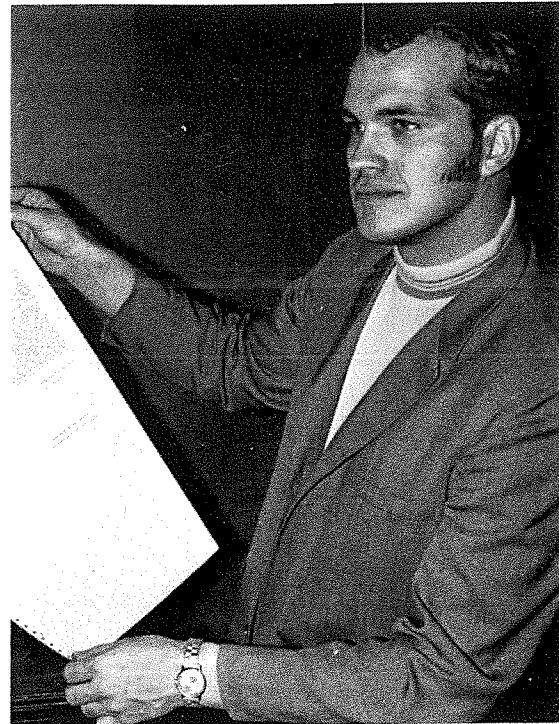

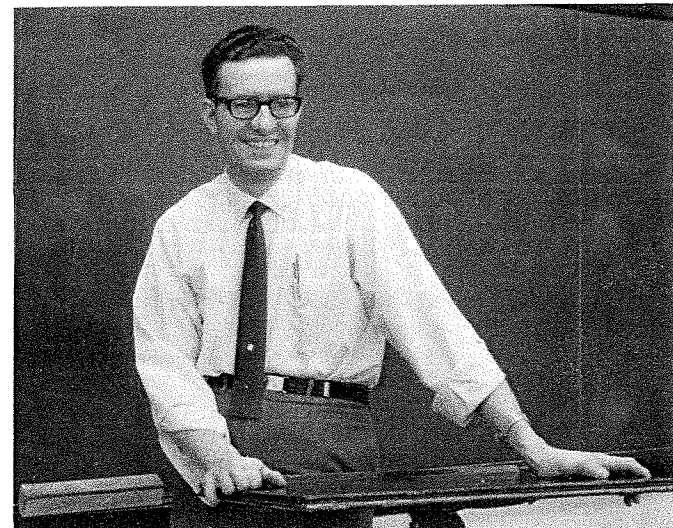

Several new courses were added to the English and speech offerings and incorporated into the new "Communications Department." A wider range of opportunity exists throughout the revised curriculum for students going into college and those entering the business world.

Students interested in employment immediately after high school were aided by the Distributive Education program, also new in the 1969-70 curriculum.

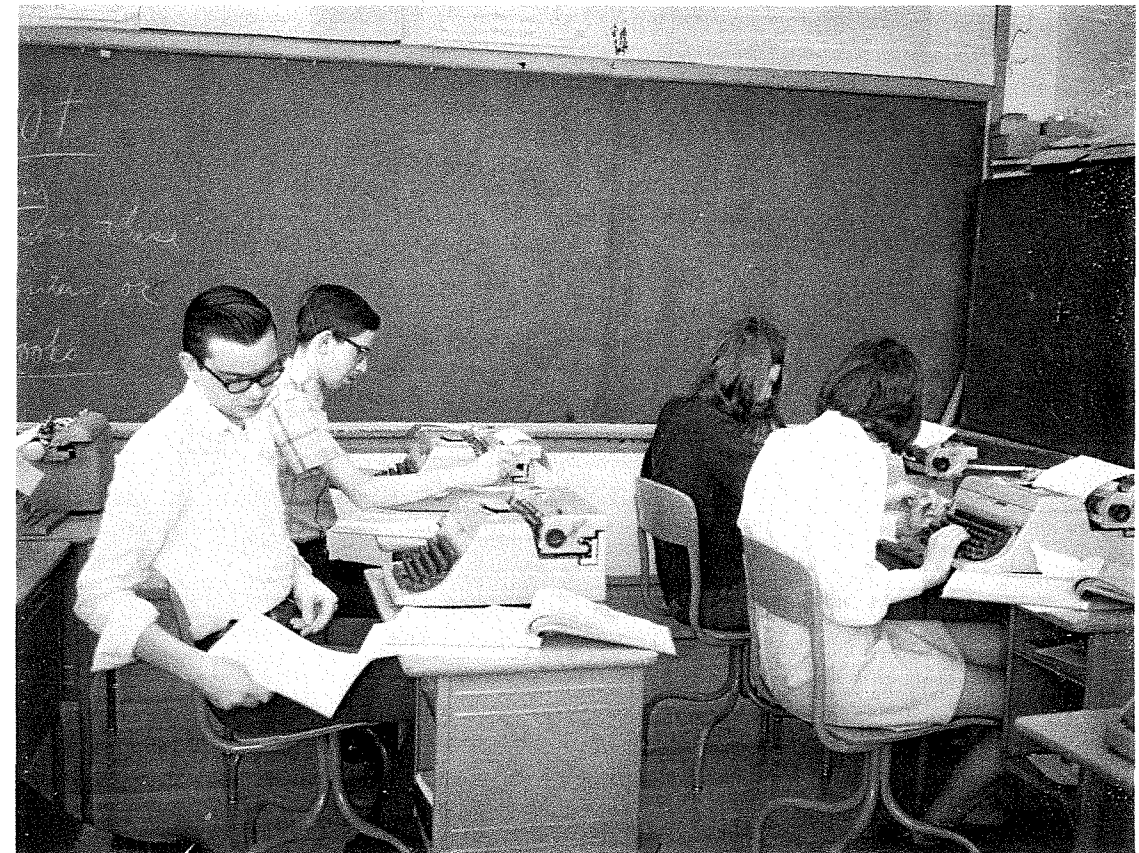

Providing assistance for faculty members were girls of Mrs. King's Secretarial Practices class who typed, filed, and performed a variety of duties to help prepare them for business careers.

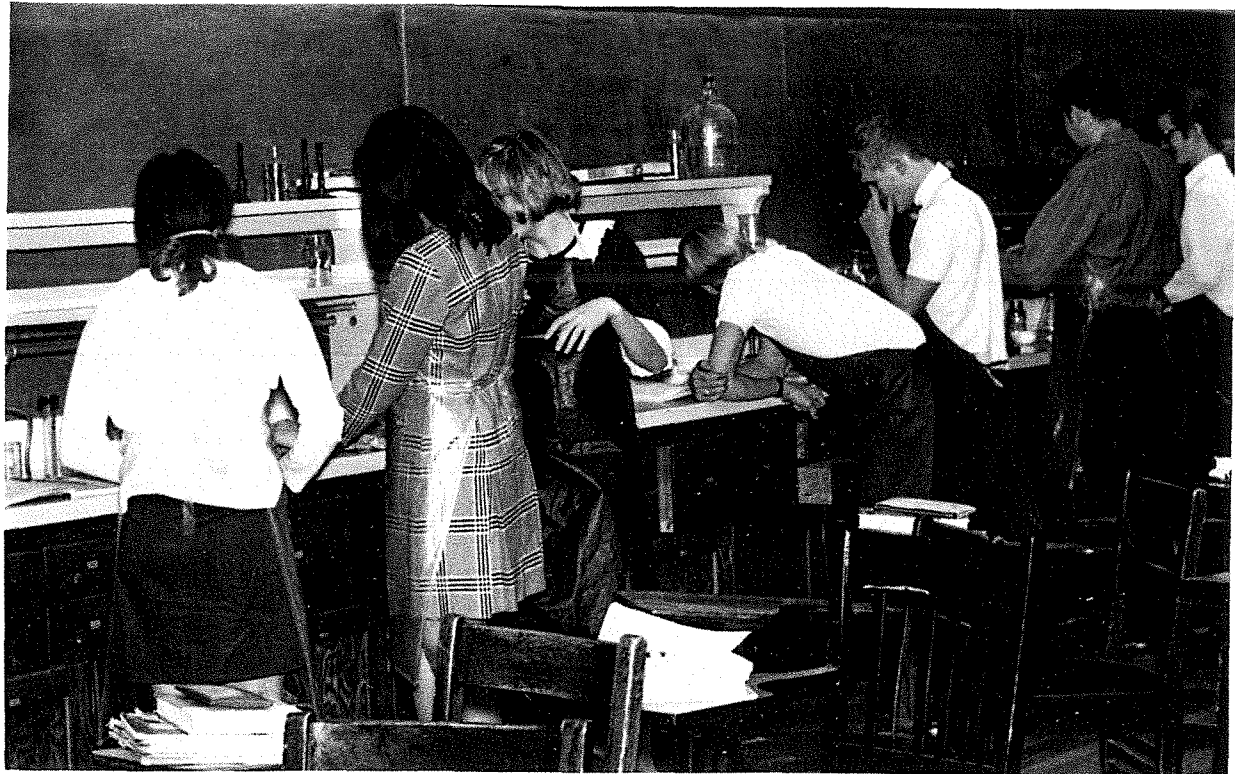

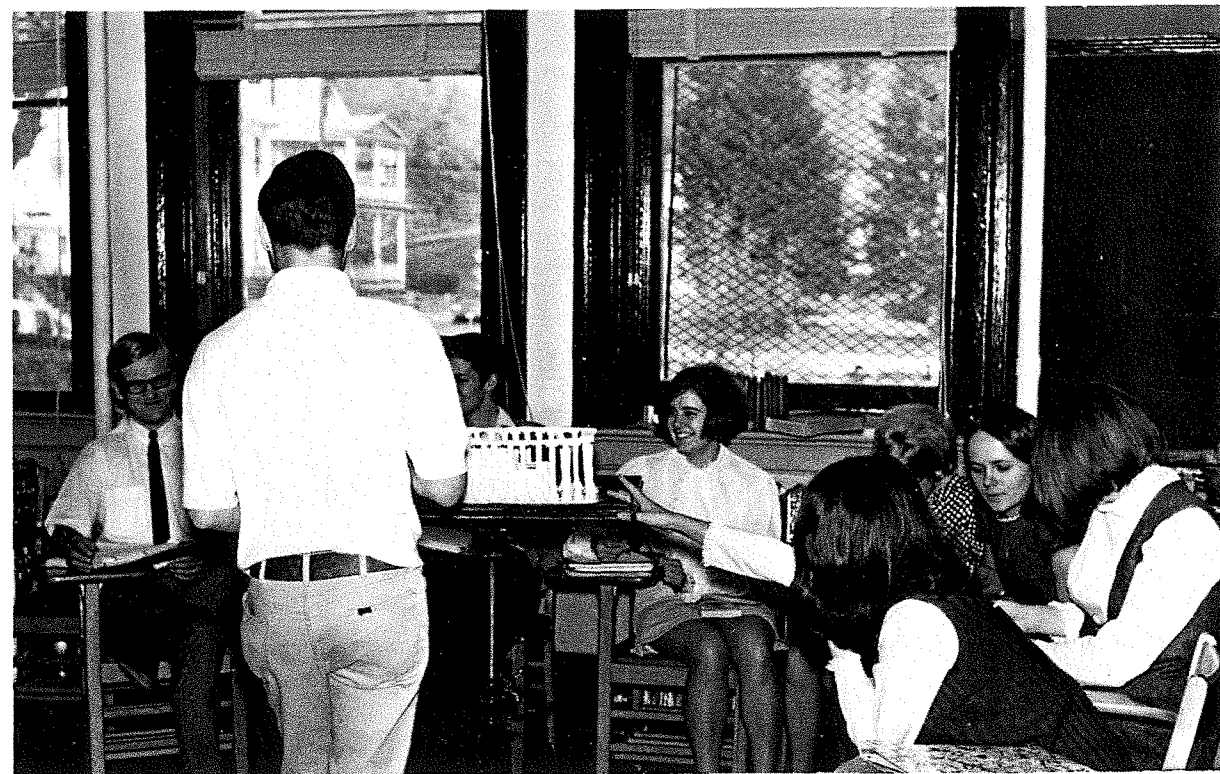

Communications Department Stresses Individual Effort

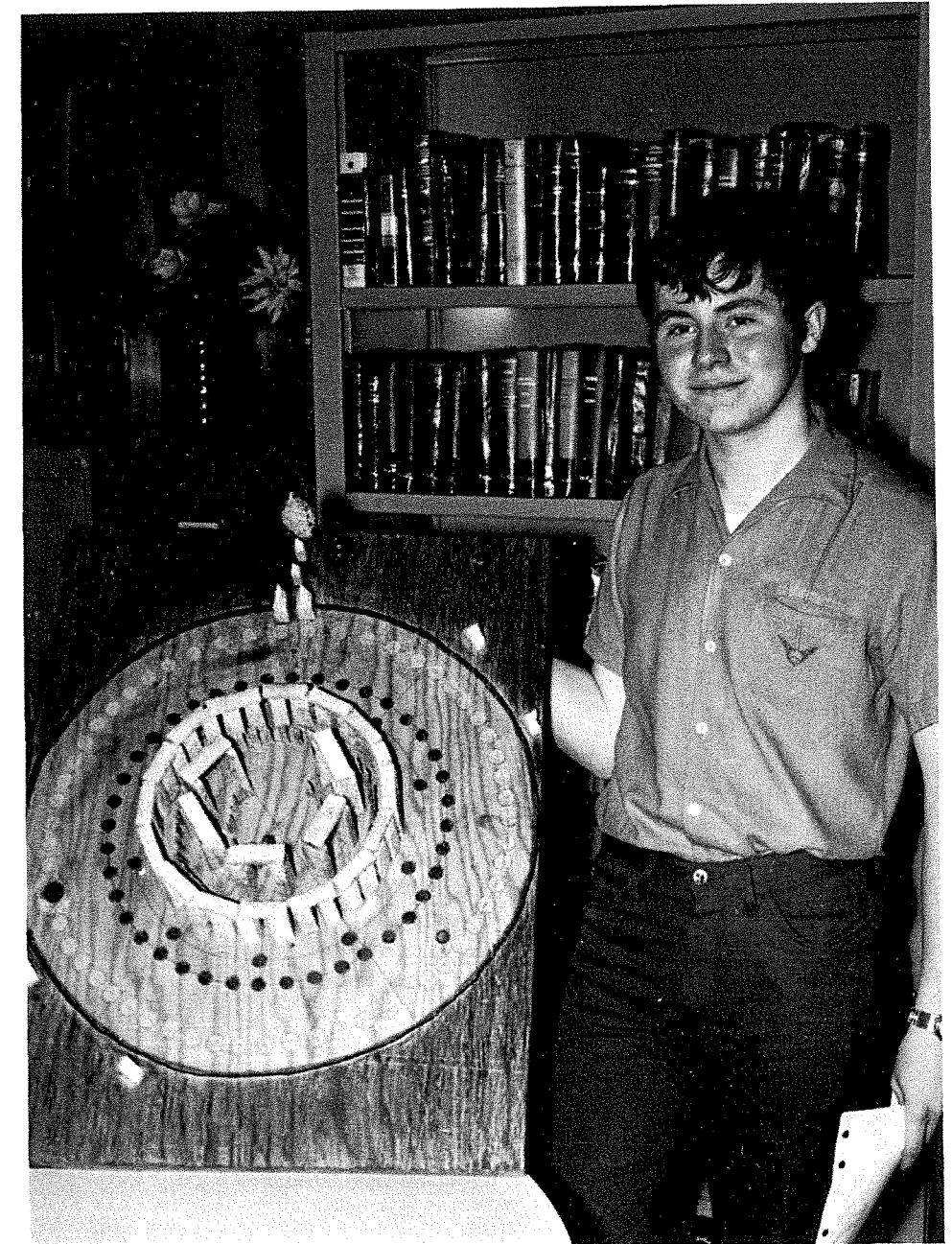
Opening of school last fall found all classes in the general field of English were grouped together into the newly formed Communications Department, headed by N. E. Wick, veteran Deadwood High School educator.

Another special project was preparing and circulating a survey of manners questionnaire. Senior cap and gown measurements were taken by Mrs. Wright.

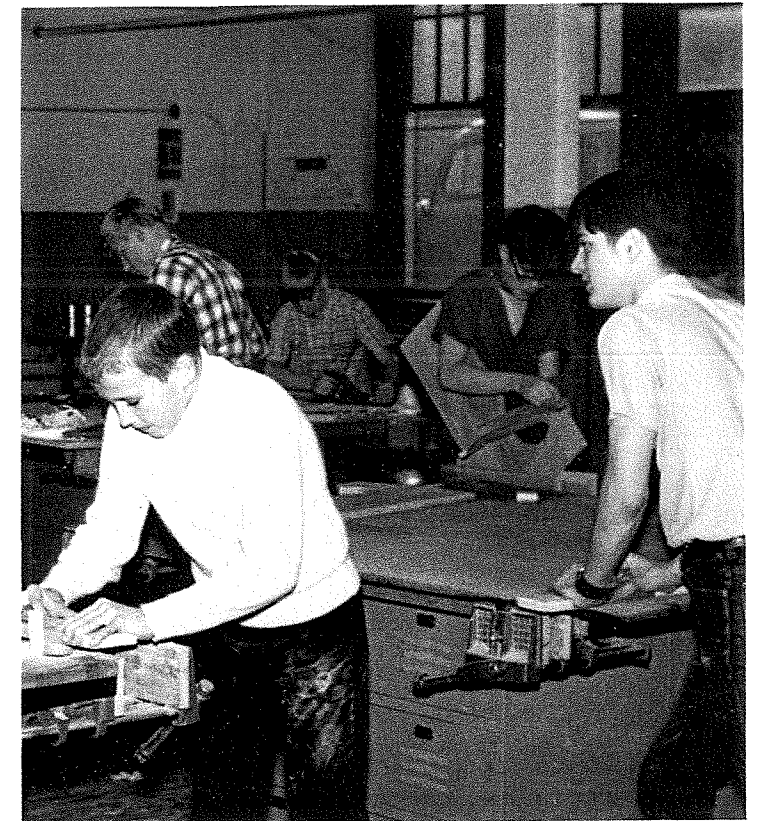
Arts and Crafts Joins Curriculum

Shop students constructed different types of cabinets, chests, and stands during their classes. After the finishing touches these projects were displayed in the gymnasium in the spring.

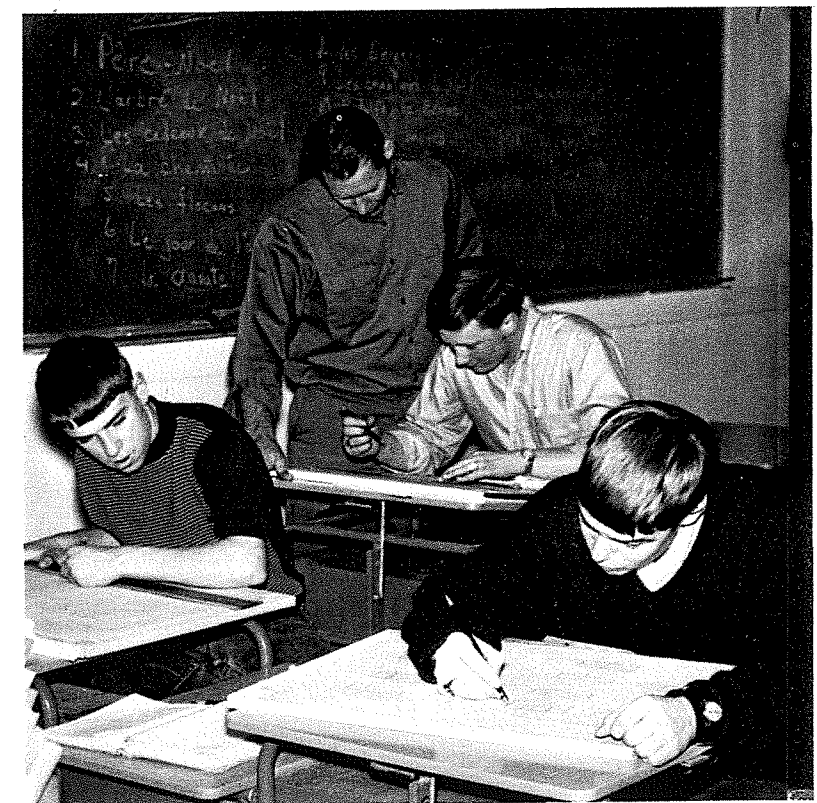

Clustered around their accompanist are members of the All-State Chorus except for LeAnn Thoreson who was unable to be present.

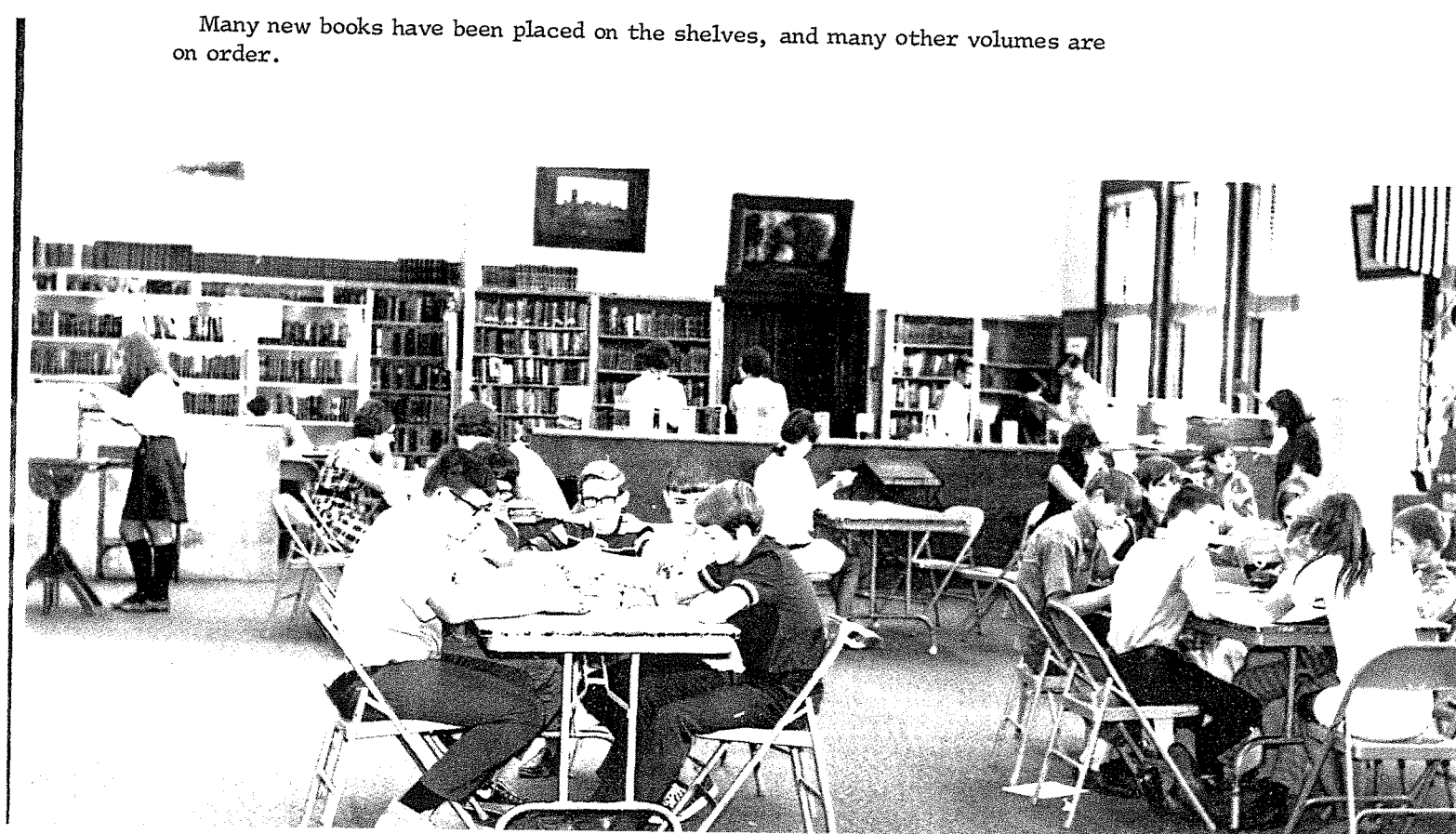
Spring was brought in by the chorus performing a medley of spring songs in concert.

On the Bruin, in addition to news writing, students learned to type to reproduction specifications for the mimeographing, make dummies, type stencils, and operate the mimeograph.

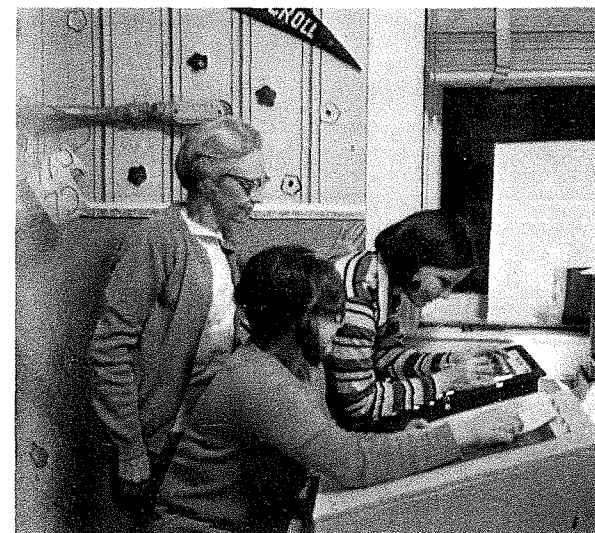
Bear Log experiences included preparing attractive page layouts, making reductions and enlargements of photographs, and selling and delivering the annuals.

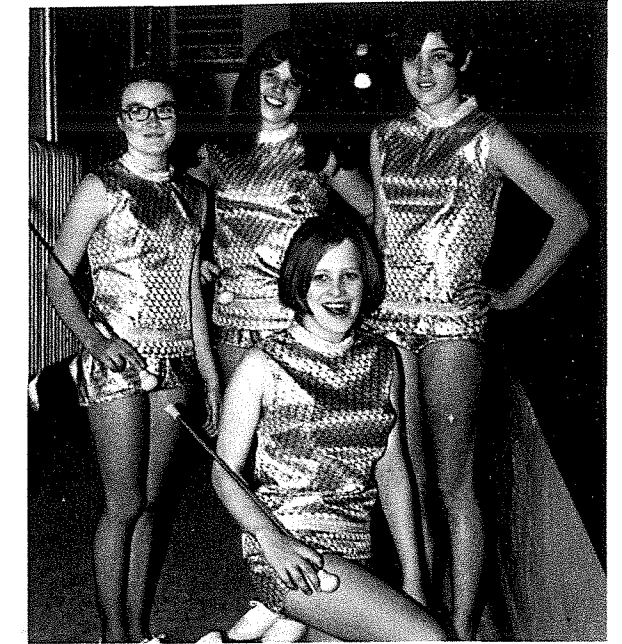

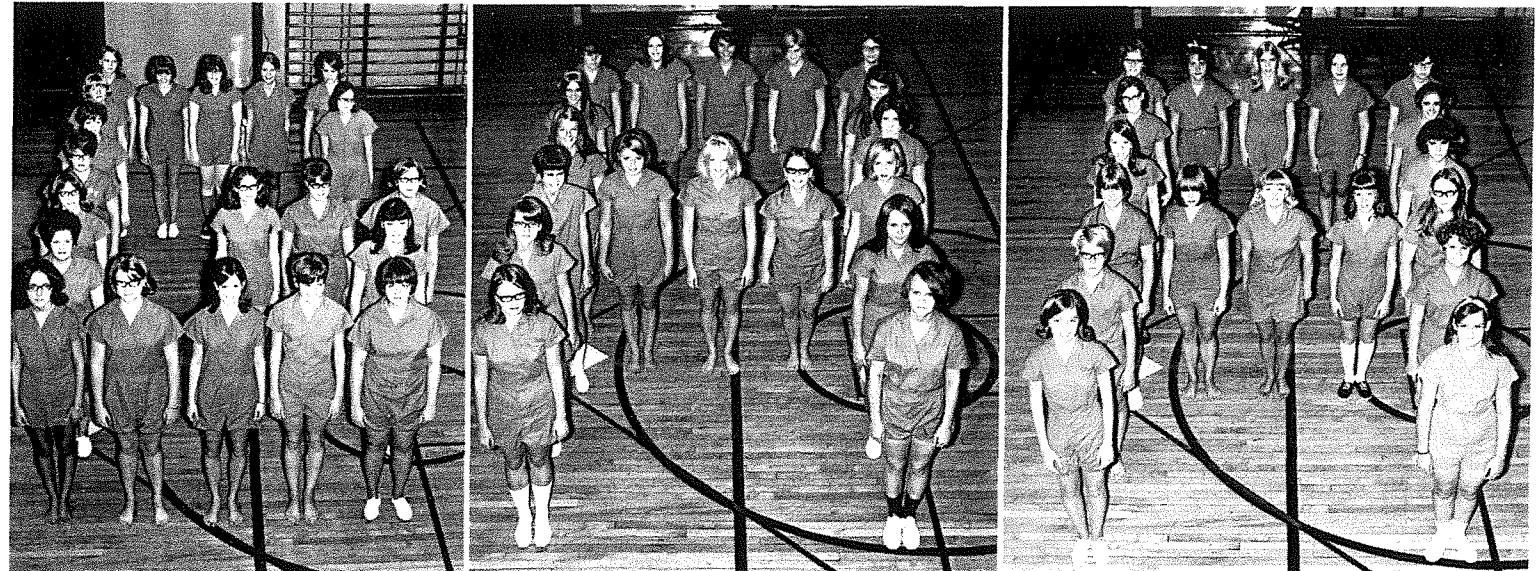

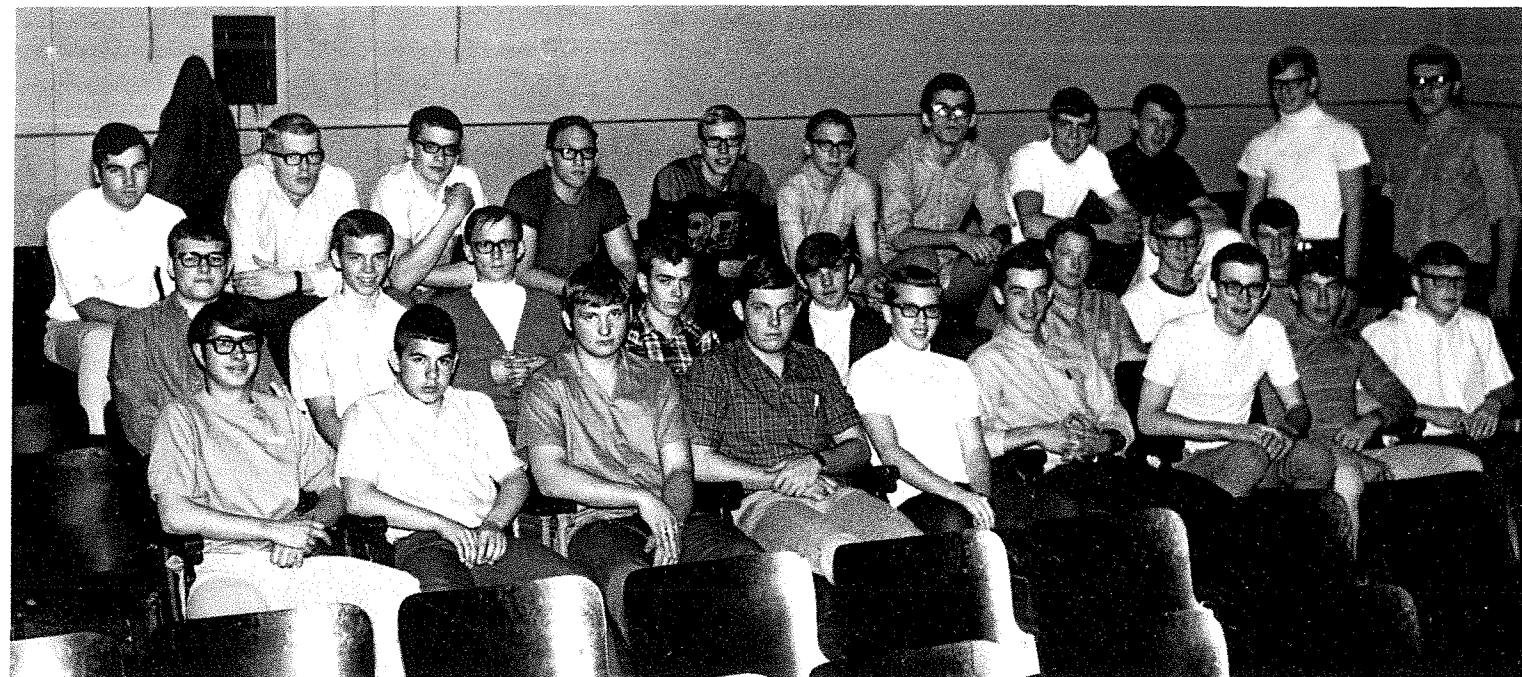

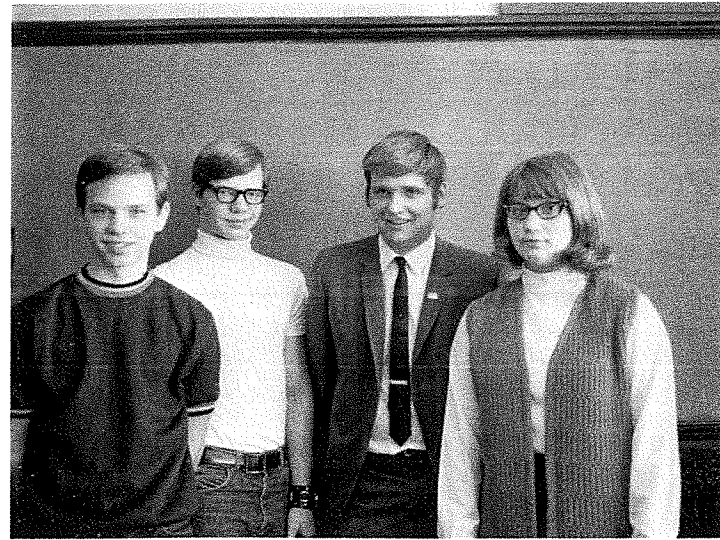

President Carol Vancas headed the club and was assisted by secretary, Doug Stratton.

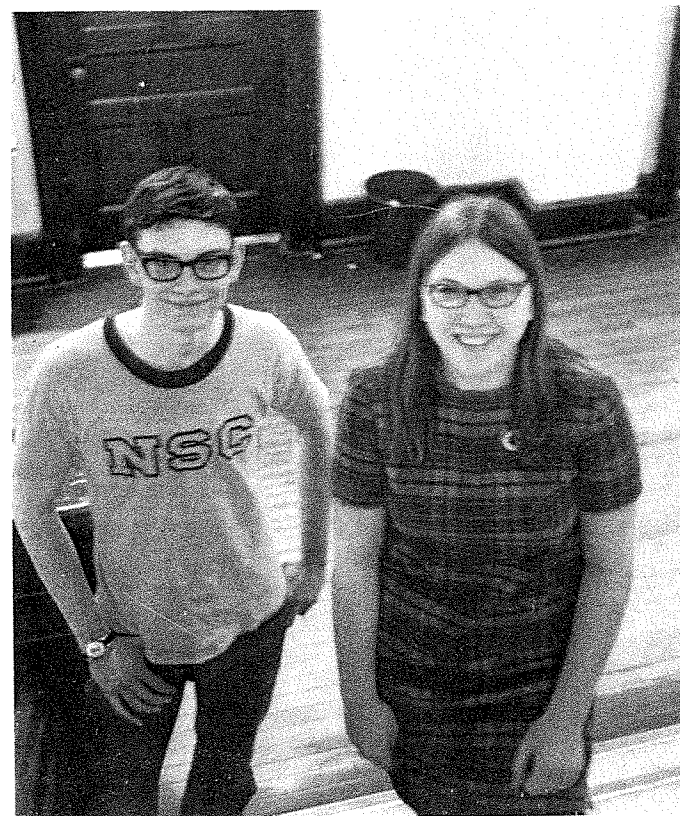
Students Broaden Horizons

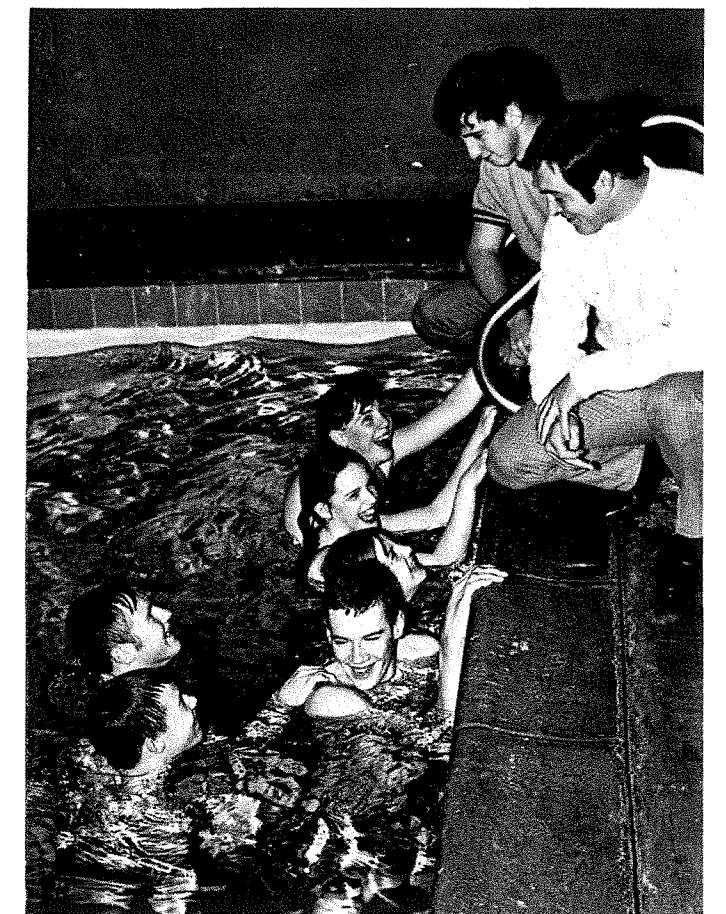


Two areas of involvement for the students were Ski Club and Swim Club.

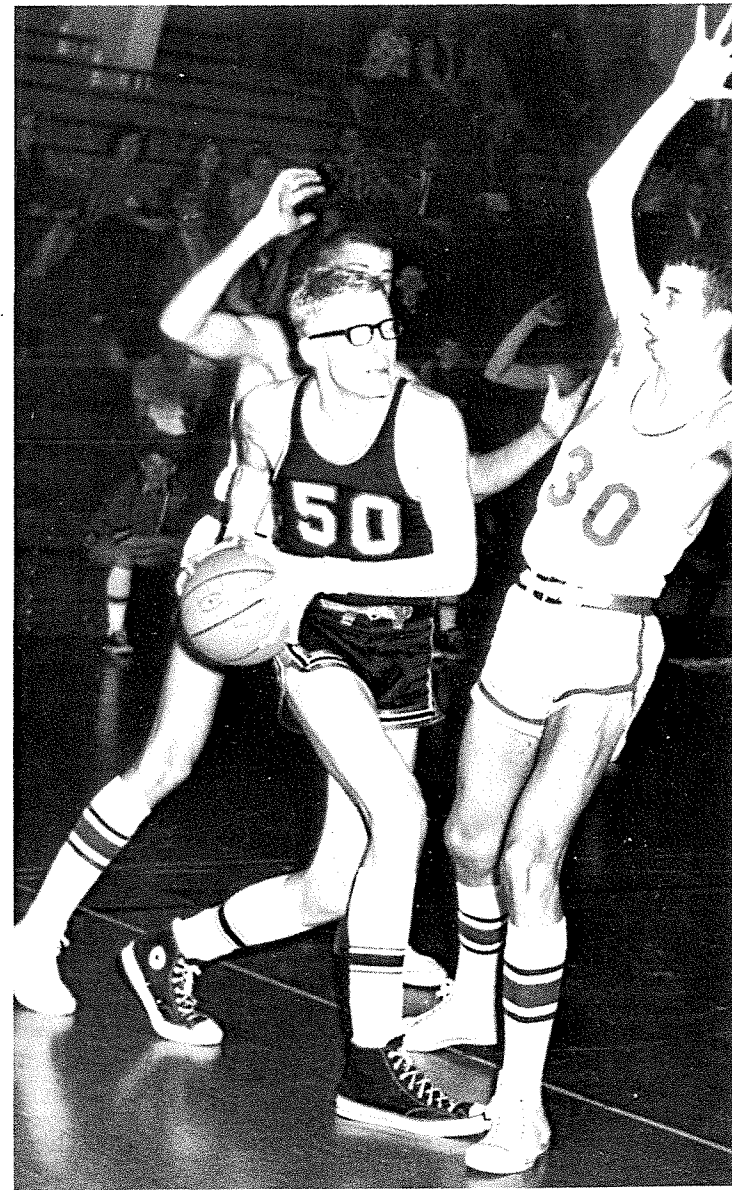

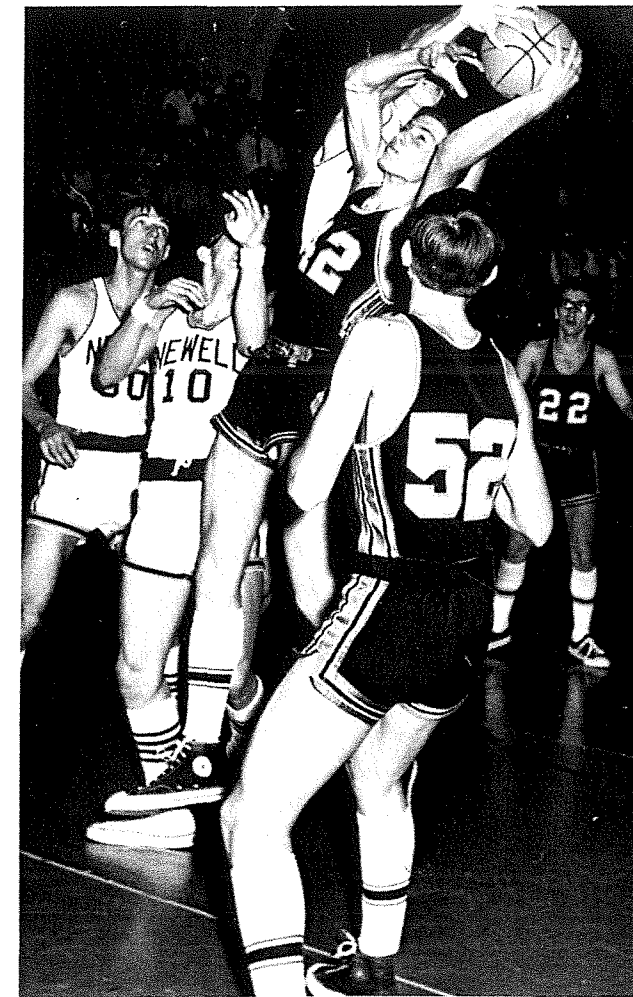

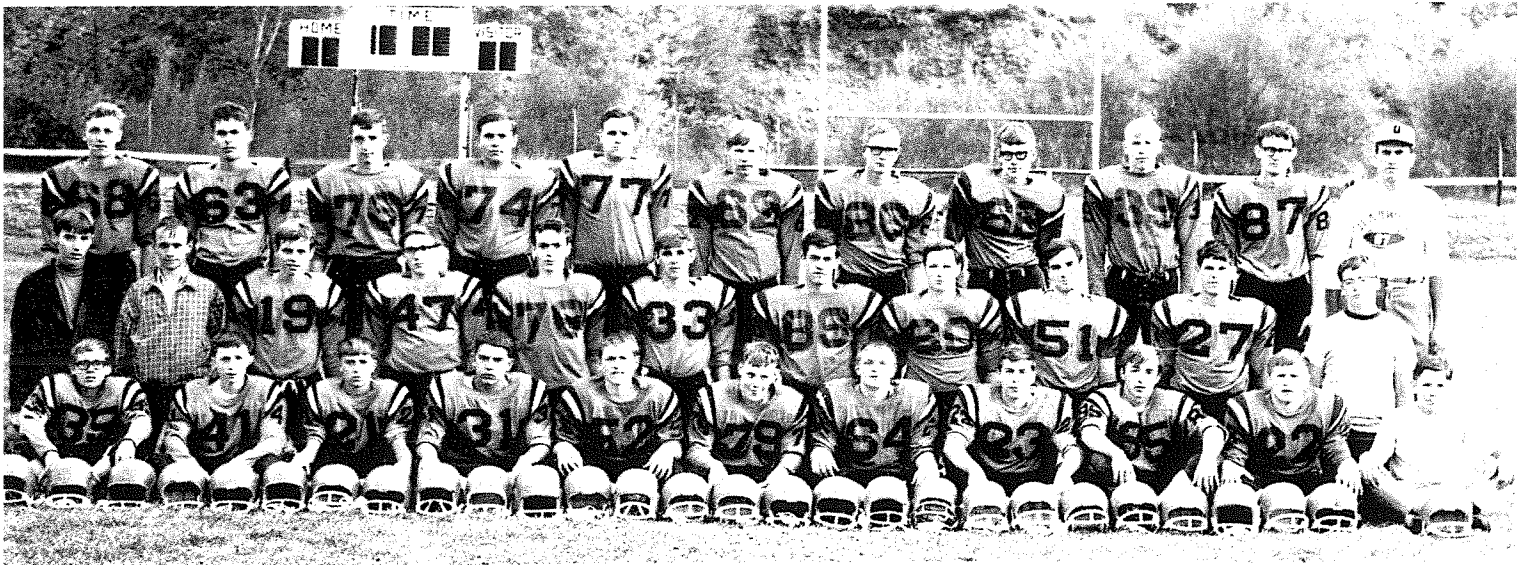

Bears placed low on the rating charts at the end of the 1969 football season but rated high in their display of good sportsmanship and team cooperation in the face of repeated losses.

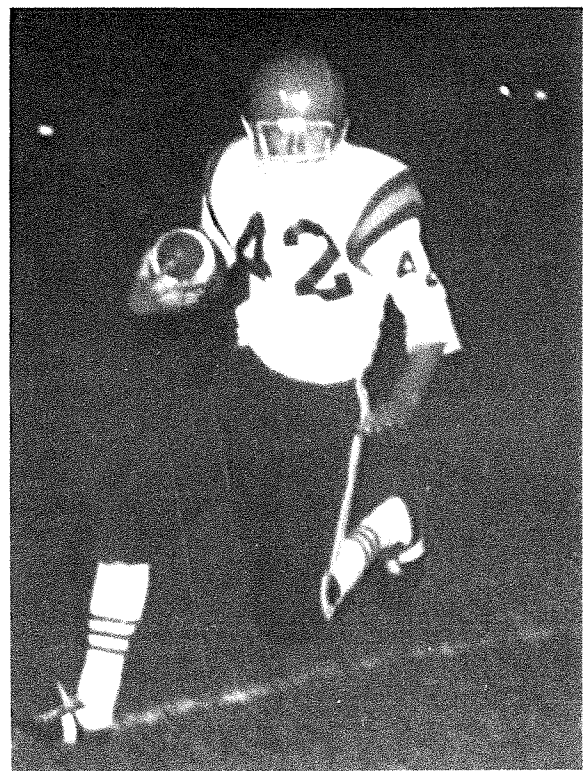
"B" Squad fared better than the Bears "A" team and were described by Coach Bill Phillips as "a bunch of dedicated players who never gave up."

Cesar listed football, swimming, and soccer as sports of which he has participated. He was also a boxing and basketball enthusiast.

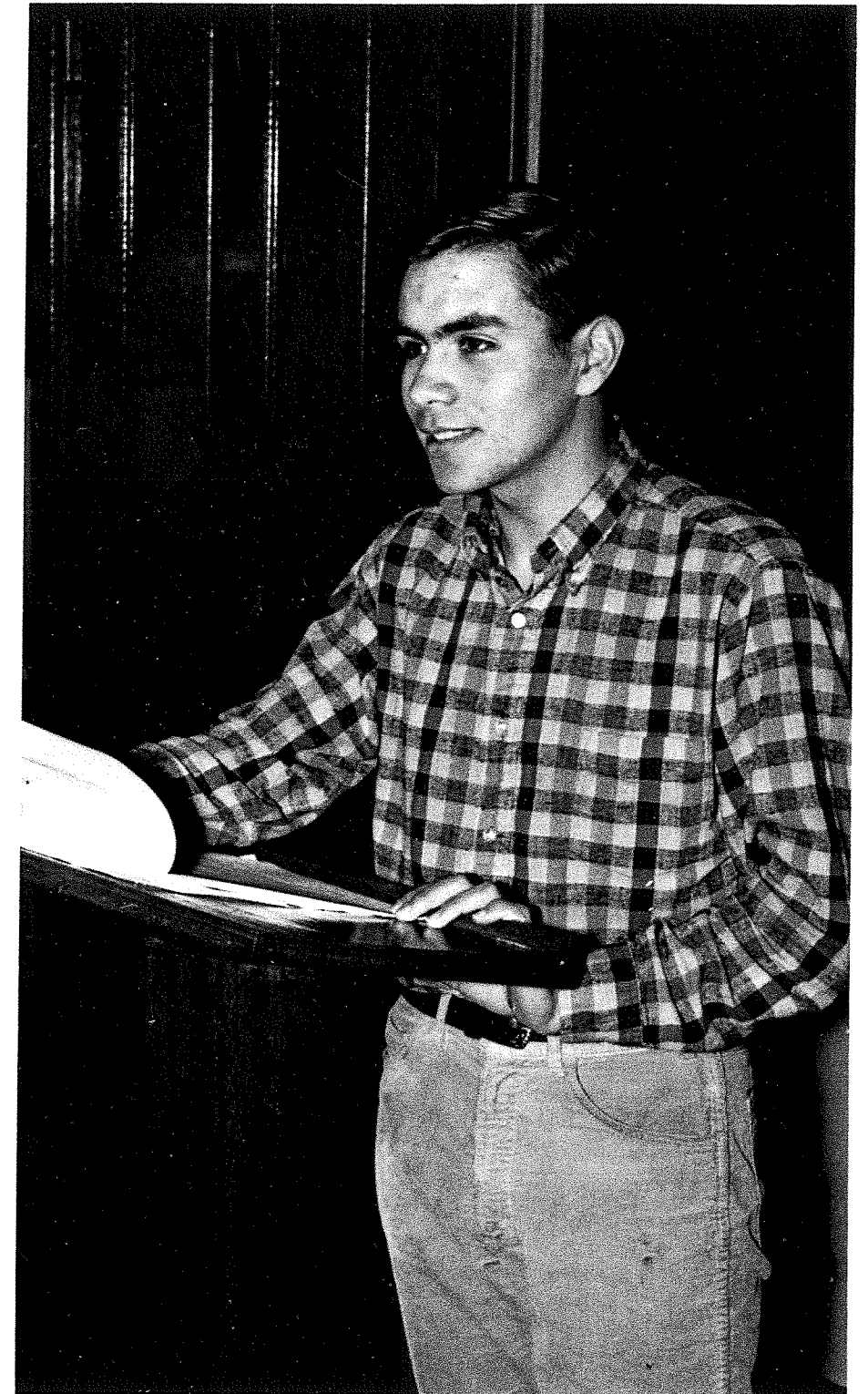
Reading, bowling, listening to music, and playing chess were included in Cesar's hobbies.
